EXECUTIVE ORDER

WHEREAS, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. summoned the best qualities that guide and sustain the American spirit and our nation's commitment of equality and justice, freedom, and peace; and

WHEREAS, he awakened the necessary goodness of our people and led a nonviolent movement that enriched our moral purpose as a nation; and

WHEREAS, this human rights movement advocated nonviolent methods of social change in the struggle for justice, equality, and freedom; and

WHEREAS, he raised the consciousness of our country through his personal dream of a nation where all people are judged, not by the color of their skin, but by the content of their character; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. was recognized on November 2, 1983, by the United States Congress and the President in the enactment of legislation establishing the third Monday in January as a national holiday in celebration of Dr. King's birthday, beginning in 1986; and

WHEREAS, the State of Utah recognizes the significance of Dr. King's life and accomplishments and the State Legislature passed S.B. 17 in 1986, which set aside the third Monday in January to observe as the anniversary of the birth of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., known as Human Rights Day; and

WHEREAS, the Martin Luther King Jr. Human Rights Commission was created by executive order on July 1, 1991;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Michael O. Leavitt, Governor of the State of Utah, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of the State of Utah, do hereby reauthorize the Martin Luther King Jr. Human Rights Commission as follows:

- 1. There is created the Martin Luther King Jr. Human Rights Commission.
- 2. The Martin Luther King Jr. Human Rights Commission shall promote Human Rights Day holiday by:
- A. Encouraging appropriate ceremonies and activities commemorating the federal holiday which occurs on the third Monday of January each year.
 - B. Provide advice and assistance to governments and private organizations on the observance of this federal holiday.
- C. Coordinate efforts with Americans of diverse backgrounds and with private organizations on the observance of the holiday.
 - D. Seek to involve all sectors, private and public, in a conscious effort to promote diversity, equity, and human rights.
 - 3. The Martin Luther King Jr. Human Rights Commission shall promote the principles of human rights by:
 - A. Working diligently to promote education and awareness of the principles of human rights for all.
 - B. Conducting workshops and training in human rights to be utilized by public and private sectors and school systems.
- C. Partnering with Public Education to assist public schools in promoting appropriate events to honor human rights and the holiday.
 - D. Promoting training in the principles of nonviolence.
 - E. Serving as a resource for state government so it can increase or improve its level of responsiveness to human rights.
 - 4. The Commission shall be organized as follows:
- A. The Commission shall consist of fifteen (15) members representing the diversity of the State of Utah appointed by the governor to four year terms. The governor may adjust the length of terms to ensure that the terms of board members are staggered so that approximately one half of the board is appointed every two years.
 - B. The members of the Commission may not serve more than two consecutive four year terms.
- C. When a vacancy occurs in the membership for any reason, the replacement shall be appointed by the governor for the unexpired term.
 - D. The governor shall appoint one of the members as chair.
- E. The Commission shall meet at least quarterly or more often if necessary as determined by the Commission chair or at the request of the governor.
 - F. Eight members of the Commission constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
- G. Members of the Commission shall receive no compensation or benefits for their services, but may receive per diem and expenses incurred in the performance of the member's official duties at the rates established by the Division of Finance under Utah Code Sections 63A-3-106 and 63A-3-107. Members may decline to receive per diem and expenses for their service.
 - 5. The Commission shall forward an annual report to the governor.
- 6. The Division of Community Development shall provide oversight and administrative support to the Commission contingent upon appropriations from the Legislature.

7. This supersedes all previous Executive Orders related to this Commission.

NOTICES OF PROPOSED RULES

A state agency may file a PROPOSED RULE when it determines the need for a new rule, a substantive change to an existing rule, or a repeal of an existing rule. Filings received between <u>December 16, 1999, 12:00 a.m.</u>, and <u>December 30, 1999, 11:59 p.m.</u>, are included in this, the <u>January 15, 2000</u>, issue of the *Utah State Bulletin*.

In this publication, each PROPOSED RULE is preceded by a RULE ANALYSIS. This analysis provides summary information about the PROPOSED RULE including the name of a contact person, anticipated cost impact of the rule, and legal cross-references.

Following the RULE ANALYSIS, the text of the PROPOSED RULE is usually printed. New rules or additions made to existing rules are underlined (e.g., example). Deletions made to existing rules are struck out with brackets surrounding them (e.g., [example). Rules being repealed are completely struck out. A row of dots in the text (•••••) indicates that unaffected text was removed to conserve space. If a PROPOSED RULE is too long to print, the Division of Administrative Rules will include only the RULE ANALYSIS. A copy of rules that are too long to print is available from the filing agency or from the Division of Administrative Rules.

The law requires that an agency accept public comment on PROPOSED RULES published in this issue of the *Utah State Bulletin* until at least <u>February 14, 2000</u>. The agency may accept comment beyond this date and will list the last day the agency will accept comment in the RULE ANALYSIS. The agency may also hold public hearings. Additionally, citizens or organizations may request the agency to hold a hearing on a specific PROPOSED RULE. Section 63-46a-5 (1987) requires that a hearing request be received "in writing not more than 15 days after the publication date of the PROPOSED RULE."

From the end of the public comment period through <u>May 14, 2000</u>, the agency may notify the Division of Administrative Rules that it wants to make the PROPOSED RULE effective. The agency sets the effective date. The date may be no fewer than 31 days nor more than 120 days after the publication date of this issue of the *Utah State Bulletin*. Alternatively, the agency may file a CHANGE IN PROPOSED RULE in response to comments received. If the Division of Administrative Rules does not receive a NOTICE OF EFFECTIVE DATE or a CHANGE IN PROPOSED RULE, the PROPOSED RULE filing lapses and the agency must start the process over.

The public, interest groups, and governmental agencies are invited to review and comment on PROPOSED RULES. Comment may be directed to the contact person identified on the RULE ANALYSIS for each rule.

PROPOSED RULES are governed by *Utah Code* Section 63-46a-4 (1996); and *Utah Administrative Code* Rule R15-2, and Sections R15-4-3, R15-4-4, R15-4-5, R15-4-9, and R15-4-10.

RULE ANALYSIS

PURPOSE OF THE RULE OR REASON FOR THE CHANGE: Rule R131-1 establishes procedures for the procurement of architectural and engineering services by the State Capitol Preservation Board as required by H.B. 300 (1998).

(DAR Note: H.B. 330 is found at 1998 Utah Laws 285, and was effective July 1, 1998.)

SUMMARY OF THE RULE OR CHANGE: To provide for the procurement of architectural and engineering services for the State Capitol.

(**DAR Note:** A corresponding 120-day (emergency) rule that is effective as of December 16, 1999, is under DAR No. 22571 in this *Bulletin*.)

STATE STATUTORY OR CONSTITUTIONAL AUTHORIZATION FOR THIS RULE: Section 63C-9-301

ANTICIPATED COST OR SAVINGS TO:

- ♦ THE STATE BUDGET: This rule implements requirements for the procurement of architectural and engineering services which are substantially similar to the rules previously promulgated and enforced by the Division of Facilities Construction and Management (DFCM). Therefore, there is no change in cost or savings to the state budget.
- ♦LOCAL GOVERNMENTS: This rule implements requirements for the procurement of architectural and engineering services which are substantially similar to the rules previously promulgated and enforced by DFCM. Therefore, there is no change in cost or savings to the local government.
- ♦OTHER PERSONS: This rule implements requirements for the procurement of architectural and engineering services which are substantially similar to the rules previously promulgated and enforced by DFCM. Therefore, there is no change in cost or savings to other persons.

COMPLIANCE COSTS FOR AFFECTED PERSONS: There will be no change to DFCM. In Subsection 63C-9-301(4) it states that the board shall adopt procurement rules substantially similar to the requirements of Title 63, Chapter 56, Utah Procurement Code.

COMMENTS BY THE DEPARTMENT HEAD ON THE FISCAL IMPACT THE RULE MAY HAVE ON BUSINESSES: There will be no additional fiscal impact by this rule. The Capitol Preservation Board will be essentially adopting DFCM rules.

R131. Capitol Preservation Board (State), Administration. R131-1. Procurement of Architectural and Engineering Services.

R131-1-1. Purpose and Authority.

- (1) As provided by Subsection 63-56-14(1), this rule establishes procedures for the procurement of architectural and engineering services by the State Capitol Preservation Board.
- (2) The Board's authority to adopt rules is provided according to Subsection 63C-9-301(3).
- (3) As required by Subsection 63C-9-301(4), procurement of architectural and engineering services shall be conducted in accordance with this rule, the provisions of Title 63, Chapter 56, or of Title 63A, Chapter 5 as determined by the Board.

R131-1-2. Definitions.

- (1) Terms used in this rule are defined in Section 63-56-5.
- (2) In addition:
- (a) "Executive Director" means the Executive Director of the Capitol Preservation Board or authorized designee.
- (b) "Office" means the staff and facilities of the executivedirector to the Board pursuant to Sections 63C-9-401, and 402.
 - (c) "State" means the State of Utah.

R131-1-3. Maintaining a Register of Architectural/Engineering Firms.

The Board shall select registered and licensed architects and engineers that are interested in being considered for state building projects, from the DFCM register/list, prepared in accordance with Section R23-2-3, Utah Administrative Code.

R131-1-4. Notification of Need for Architectural/Engineering Services.

(1) The Board shall publish or cause to have published its needs for architectural/engineering services in the manner provided in Subsection R23-1-5(2). The public notice shall include the following:

- (a) The closing time and date for the submission of Statement of Qualifications;
- (b) The address of the office to which Statements of Qualifications are to be delivered;
- (c) The address where a more complete project description may be obtained;
 - (d) A brief description of the project; and
 - (e) A notice of any mandatory pre-submittal meetings.
- (2) The architects/engineers shall respond with a Statement of Qualifications for each project.

R131-1-5. Appointment of a Selection Committee.

The Executive Director shall appoint a selection committee to review all applications of interested architectural/engineering firms. The committee shall include representatives of the Board, the Office, the State Building Board, and others as deemed appropriate.

R131-1-6. Preliminary Screening and Evaluation.

- (1) The selection committee shall independently rate each interested firm. A weighted point system shall be used. A ranking of those qualified firms shall be made by using a composite scoring of all the individual rater's scores.
- (2) The following criteria shall be used in the evaluation and ranking of firms for possible awards:
- (a) Competence to perform the services as reflected by technical training and education, specialized experience in providing similar services, and the qualifications and competence of persons who would be assigned to assist with the performance of the services;
- (b) Capacity to perform the services in the required time as reflected by present workload, availability of adequate personnel, equipment, and facilities;
- (c) Past performance as reflected by the evaluation of the services of the architect/engineer; including such factors as control of costs, quality of work, and ability to meet deadlines; and
 - (d) Proximity of firm to the project.

R131-1-7. Interviews with Architectural/Engineering Firms.

- (1) For all projects, interviews shall be held with no less than the top three ranked firms competing for the project design commission. The number of firms interviewed per project may vary according to the size and complexity of the project. Multiple interviews may be held on smaller projects at the discretion of the Executive Director.
- (2) Firms selected to be interviewed shall be provided with as much pertinent information as possible of the job at least one week prior to the interview.
- (3) After composite rankings or interviews are completed, the selection committee shall select the top three and rank them in order of selection.

R131-1-8. Negotiation and Appointment.

(1) The Executive Director shall negotiate with the top-ranked architectural or engineering firm to finalize the details of the project. If there are problems with reaching agreement, the Executive Director shall present a written offer of the terms which

- must then be accepted or rejected in writing by the architectural/engineering firm. If the offer is rejected by the top-ranked firm, the Executive Director may negotiate with the second-ranked firm to obtain an agreement. If negotiations with the second-ranked firm are not able to be successfully concluded, the Office may negotiate with the third-ranked firm.
- (2) Following completion of negotiations, the Executive Director will present the choice of the selected firm to the Board for approval, to enter into a contract with the selected firm. Upon Board approval, the Executive Director will enter into a contract with the selected firm. Other firms who were interviewed shall receive notification of award.

R131-1-9. Role of the Board.

- (1) The Executive Director shall establish and monitor the selection process, may take appropriate steps to verify the acceptability of the procedure, and make changes in procedure at any time as may be determined necessary by the Board.
- (2) At each meeting of the Board, the Executive Director shall submit a list of all architect/engineer contracts entered into, and a description of the method(s) of selection used to the Board as a second review of actions taken.

R131-1-10. Performance Evaluation.

(1) The Executive Director shall, throughout the course of, and at the end of the contract, evaluate the performance of the architectural/engineering firm; verbally and in writing. There shall be at least one verbal review of the architectural/engineering firm's performance on each project, prior to the project's completion. The Executive Director shall also advise the architectural/engineering firm, in writing, about their performance at the end of the project. If the firm wishes to respond to those evaluation(s), it may enter its response(s) in the file.

R131-1-11. Emergency Conditions.

The Executive Director, in consultation with the chairman of the Board, shall determine if it is necessary to respond to any emergency conditions that may occur. He shall also document his decision to take emergency action in writing. The Executive Director may use any reasonable method of awarding architect/engineer design contracts when emergency conditions occur. If the Executive Director determines that a particular specialization is needed, he may appoint any firm(s) he finds may be necessary to accomplish work on the emergency project design.

R131-1-12. Direct Awards.

- (1) The Executive Director may award a contract to an architectural/engineering firm without following the procedures of this rule if:
- (a) The contract is for a project which is integrally related to, or an extension of, a project which was awarded to the architectural/engineering firm;
- (b) The architectural/engineering firm performed satisfactorily on any similar or related project; and
- (c) The Executive Director determines that the direct award is in the best interests of the State.
- (2) The Executive Director shall place written documentation of the reasons for the direct award in the project file and shall report the action to the Board at its next meeting.

R131-1-13. Small Purchases.

- (1) If the Executive Director determines that the services of architects and engineers can be procured for less than \$50,000, or if the estimated construction cost of the project is less than \$500,000, the procedures contained in Subsection (2) below, may be used.
- (2) Before contacting any person to perform the required services, the Executive Director may refer to or examine any current statements of qualifications on file with the Office. Following that, the Executive Director may contact a qualified firm and negotiate a contract for the required services at a fair and reasonable price. If no current statements of qualifications are on file or if the statements on file are, in the judgment of the Executive Director, inadequate to determine a qualified firm, technical proposals or statements of qualifications shall be solicited. If, after negotiations, the parties cannot agree upon a price that, in the Executive Director's judgment, is fair and reasonable, negotiations shall be terminated with that firm and negotiations begun with another qualified firm. This process shall continue until a contract is negotiated that reflects a fair and reasonable price and meets the necessary conditions of the project.

R131-1-14. Alternative Procedures.

- (1) The Board may revise or enhance the procurement process whenever the Executive Director determines that it would be in the best interest of the State. Examples of enhancements or changes which may be made include design competitions and outside representation on selection committees.
- (2) Any exceptions to this rule shall be justified to and approved by the Board.

R131. Capitol Preservation Board (State), Administration. R131-7. State Capitol Preservation Board Master Planning Policy.

<u>R131-7-1. Purpose.</u>

Pursuant to Section 63C-9-402, this rule provides a procedure for the Executive Director to devise and develop a master-planning process for Capitol Hill Facilities; for future capital facilities expansion of the state Capitol grounds, and for projected Capitol Hill facility growth needs.

R131-7-2. Authority.

This rule is authorized under Subsection 63C-9-402(1), which directs the Executive Director to develop, for board approval, a master plan for the state capitol facilities and grounds.

R131-7-3. Policy.

The Executive Director shall prepare annually, and maintain in current form, a 20-year Master Plan and a corresponding annual budget for all existing and planned capital facilities for the Capitol Hill facilities and grounds, which shall reflect maintenance, preservation, restoration, and modification considerations.

R131-7-4. Review of Plan.

The Board will review the State Capitol Preservation Master Plan and associated budgetary requirements at least once yearly, or whenever it considers requests for project funding. The Board, when requested, may also review any design or project, to assist the Executive Director in long-term planning efforts. The Master Plan shall be expected to reflect realistic budgetary perspectives, usage, deterioration, and expectation of future growth that affects projected needs of state Capitol Hill facilities and grounds.

R131-7-5. Coordination with State Budget Policy.

Following approval by the Board, the Executive Director will submit a summary of the Master Plan and annual budget to the Governor's Office of Planning and Budget, for inclusion into the Executive Branch budget, pursuant to Section 63-38-1, et seq., for submission to the Legislature.

PURPOSE OF THE RULE OR REASON FOR THE CHANGE: The division needed to make some changes with respect to advisory peer committees.

SUMMARY OF THE RULE OR CHANGE: Changes are being made to change the person who makes appointments to peer or advisory committees from the director of the division to the executive director of the department. Deletes the requirement that boards accept or reject nominations. This provision was contrary to statute which provides that boards are advisory to the division rather than final decision making bodies. Additional wording changes were made to clarify and simplify the process of appointments.

RULE ANALYSIS

PURPOSE OF THE RULE OR REASON FOR THE CHANGE: The division wants to amend the rules to eliminate the requirement for a quality review provider and allow an individual to perform the quality review.

SUMMARY OF THE RULE OR CHANGE: Changed the term "provider" to "reviewer" throughout the section, thus eliminating the need for an additional layer of regulation. Also make some minor wording modifications to the section.

STATE STATUTORY OR CONSTITUTIONAL AUTHORIZATION FOR THIS RULE: Section 58-31b-101, and Subsections 58-1-106(1) and 58-1-202(1)

ANTICIPATED COST OR SAVINGS TO:

- ♦ THE STATE BUDGET: Minimal costs will be incurred by the division to reprint the rules once they are made effective. Any costs incurred will be absorbed in the division's current budget.
- ♦LOCAL GOVERNMENTS: Potential savings to local government agencies in that any local government agency that hires advanced practice registered nurses (APRNs) will not incur the additional costs of hiring a quality review provider as a result of the changes being proposed.
- ♦OTHER PERSONS: Overall cost savings are anticipated to anyone who is or employs APRNs because the need to pay

for a quality review provider is eliminated and individuals can now provide the service.

COMPLIANCE COSTS FOR AFFECTED PERSONS: The Nurse Practice Act (Title 58, Chapter 31b) requires APRNs to participate in quality review. The cost will vary from free service to hundreds of dollars. By eliminating the provider requirement, the cost should decrease for the licensee.

COMMENTS BY THE DEPARTMENT HEAD ON THE FISCAL IMPACT THE RULE MAY HAVE ON BUSINESSES: The purpose of this proposed rule change is to eliminate an additional layer of expense and bureaucracy by allowing quality reviews to be performed by licensed practitioners knowledgeable in advanced practice registered nursing. The only additional expense to the state budget will be the nominal fee of printing the new rules and there will be no impact on local governments. Although there is the possibility that savings could be passed on to the patients, it is expected that the impact on the public will be neutral. Those in the profession and employers of such professionals will have the potential of saving the current cost of hiring a quality review provider since the service can be rendered by an individual already on staff under the proposed rule amendment. RULE ANALYSIS

PURPOSE OF THE RULE OR REASON FOR THE CHANGE: The division is making the review process for applications more efficient and timely by allowing division staff to review the

majority of applications. Also, the proposed rule recognizes the national pass score in preparation of the EPPP examination becoming computerized. Our current passing score of 70% will not equate with the implementation of the new computerized examination.

SUMMARY OF THE RULE OR CHANGE: In Section R156-61-302a, added that the division will recognize education programs which are accredited by the American Psychological Association (APA) as meeting the educational course work requirements. This proposed change will eliminate the need for board members to review applications from applicants who have graduated from an APA accredited program. In Section R156-61-302c, changes are made to establish the national passing score as the recognized passing score on the Examination for the Professional Practice of Psychology (EPPP).

STATE STATUTORY OR CONSTITUTIONAL AUTHORIZATION FOR THIS RULE: Section 58-61-101, and Subsections 58-1-106(1) and 58-1-202(1)

ANTICIPATED COST OR SAVINGS TO:

- ♦ THE STATE BUDGET: Minimal costs will be imposed by the division to reprint the rules once these proposed changes are made effective. Any costs involved in the printing of rules will be absorbed in the current division budget. Eliminating the board review of the majority of cases will decrease the need for board meetings. The division anticipates three board meetings can be eliminated for a savings of approximately \$1,000 to the division's budget.
- ♦LOCAL GOVERNMENTS: If a local government agency hires someone who graduated from an accredited program, the time to license the individual will be approximately one to two months less, thus the agency will be able to hire the person more quickly.
- ♦OTHER PERSONS: Individuals applying for licensure as a psychologist who have graduated from an accredited program will be able to complete the licensure process within two to three weeks, rather than months. This will allow them to be licensed and collecting a salary much sooner. It should be noted that once the EPPP examination becomes computerized, the testing fee will increase approximately \$100 per candidate.

COMPLIANCE COSTS FOR AFFECTED PERSONS: The proposed changes impose no additional costs. An individual will still need to apply for licensure, but may be approved for a license much sooner than before. It should be noted that once the EPPP examination becomes computerized, the testing fee will increase approximately \$100 per candidate.

COMMENTS BY THE DEPARTMENT HEAD ON THE FISCAL IMPACT THE RULE MAY HAVE ON BUSINESSES: The purpose of this proposed rule is to recognize psychology degrees from institutions with programs accredited by the American Psychological Association and eliminate the need for the board to do a course-by-course analysis of the education of applicants from such an institution. Adoption will permit the division personnel to review the applications. The proposed rule also recognizes the national pass score on the required exam to meet the examination qualifications for licensure.

The impact on the state budget will be a minor expense for printing the rules, which will be more than offset by an elimination of approximately three board meetings a year, with annual savings estimated at \$1,000. Adoption of the amendment will positively impact local governments hiring practitioners of the regulated profession since the period from application to licensure will be reduced by up to two months. Applicants from accredited programs seeking licensure in the regulated profession will benefit from a shrinkage of the time required for application consideration from as much as two months currently to as little as two weeks upon implementation of this amended rule. There will be an additional expense to applicants of approximately \$100 per candidate as a result of the implementation of computerized testing, but this is attributable to the testing organization rather than this amendment--Klare Bachman (Acting Executive Director)

R156. Commerce, Occupational and Professional Licensing. R156-61. Psychologist Licensing Act Rules. R156-61-302a. Qualifications for Licensure - Education

(1) An institution or program of higher education, or a degree qualifying an applicant for licensure as a psychologist, to be recognized by the division in collaboration with the board under Subsection 58-61-304(1)(d), shall be accredited by the Committee on Accreditation of the American Psychological Association or meet the following criteria:

- (a) if located in the United States or Canada, be accredited by a professional accrediting body approved by the Council for Higher Education of the American Council on Education, at the time the applicant received the required earned degree; or
- (b) if located outside of the United States or Canada, be equivalent to an accredited program under Subsection (a), and the burden to demonstrate equivalency shall be upon the applicant; and

- (c) result from successful completion of a program conducted on or based on a formal campus;
- (d) result from a program which includes at least one year of residence at the educational institution;
- (e) if located in the United States or Canada, be an institution having a doctoral psychology program meeting "Designation" criteria, as recognized by the Association of State and Provincial Psychology Boards/National Register Joint Designation Committee, at the time the applicant received the earned degree, or if located outside of the United States or Canada, meet the same criteria by which a program is recognized by the Association of State and Provincial Psychology Boards at the time the applicant received the earned degree;
- (f) have an organized sequence of study to provide an integrated educational experience appropriate to preparation for the professional practice of psychology, and shall clearly identify those persons responsible for the program with clear authority and responsibility for the core and specialty areas regardless of whether or not the program cuts across administrative lines in the educational institution;
- (g) clearly identify in catalogues or other publications the psychology faculty, demonstrate that the faculty is sufficient in number and experience to fulfill its responsibility to adequately educate and train professional psychologists, and demonstrate that the program is under the direction of a professionally trained psychologist;
- (h) grant earned degrees resulting from a program encompassing a minimum of three academic years of full time graduate study with an identifiable body of students who are matriculated in the program for the purpose of obtaining a doctoral degree;
- (i) include supervised practicum, internship, and field or laboratory training appropriate to the practice of psychology;
- (j) require successful completion of a minimum of two semester/three quarter hour graduate level core courses including:
 - (i) scientific and professional ethics and standards;
 - (ii) research design and methodology;
 - (iii) statistics; and
- (iv) psychometrics including test construction and measurement;
- (k) require successful completion of a minimum of two graduate level semester hours/three graduate level quarter hours in each of the following knowledge areas. Course work must have a theoretical focus as opposed to an applied, clinical focus:
- (i) biological bases of behavior such as physiological psychology, comparative psychology, neuropsychology, psychopharmacology, perception and sensation;
- (ii) cognitive-affective bases of behavior such as learning, thinking, cognition, motivation and emotion;
- (iii) social and cultural bases of behavior such as social psychology, organizational psychology, general systems theory, and group dynamics; and
- (iv) individual differences such as human development, personality theory and abnormal psychology.
- (l) require successful completion of specialty course work and professional education courses necessary to prepare the applicant adequately for the practice of psychology.
- (2) An applicant who has received a doctoral degree in psychology by completing the requirements of Subsections (1)(a)

through (i), without completing the core courses required under Subsection (j), or the specialty course work required in Subsection (l) may be allowed to complete the required course work post-doctorally. The supplemental course work shall consist of formal graduate level work meeting the requirements of Subsections (j) and (l) in regularly offered and scheduled classes. University based directed reading courses may be approved at the discretion of the board.

(3) The date of completion of the doctoral degree shall be the graduation date or the date on which all formal requirements for graduation were met as certified by the university registrar.

$R156\mbox{-}61\mbox{-}302\mbox{c}.$ Qualifications for Licensure - Examination Requirements.

- (1) The examination requirements which must be met by an applicant for licensure as a psychologist under Subsection 58-61-304(1)(g) are:
- (a) passing the Examination for the Professional Practice of Psychology (EPPP) developed by the American Association of State Psychology Board (ASPPB) with a passing score [of not less than 70%] as recommended by the ASPPB; and
- (b) passing the Utah Psychology Law Examination with a score of not less than 75%.
- (2) A person may be admitted to the EPPP examination in Utah only after meeting the requirements under 58-61-305, and after receiving written approval from the division.
- (3) If an applicant is admitted to an EPPP examination based upon substantive information that is incorrect and furnished knowingly by the applicant, the applicant shall automatically be given a failing score and shall not be permitted to retake the examination until the applicant submits fees and a correct application demonstrating the applicant is qualified for the examination. If an applicant is inappropriately admitted to an EPPP examination because of a division or board error and the applicant receives a passing score, the results of the examination may not be used for licensure until the deficiency which would have barred the applicant for admission to the examination is corrected.
- (4) An applicant who fails the EPPP examination three times will not be allowed subsequent admission to the examination until the applicant has appeared before the board, developed with the board a plan of study in appropriate subject matter, and thereafter completed the planned course of study to the satisfaction of the board.
- (5) An applicant who is found to be cheating on the EPPP examination or in any way invalidating the integrity of the examination shall automatically be given a failing score and shall not be permitted to retake the examination for a period of at least three years as is determined by the division in collaboration with the board.
- (6) The Utah Psychology Law Examination may be taken only after an applicant has taken the EPPP examination.

RULE ANALYSIS

PURPOSE OF THE RULE OR REASON FOR THE CHANGE: The division needed to define and clarify the provisions of Subsection 58-66-604(1), with respect to the conducting of tough man contests.

SUMMARY OF THE RULE OR CHANGE: A new Section R156-66-604gg, regarding tough man contests, was added. A new Section R156-66-604hh, regarding limitations on tough man contests, was also added. This new section defines the limitations of a tough man contest and requires that contestants supply evidence that they are in good physical condition and test negative for the HIV virus. A new Section R156-66-606 was added which makes participation by a licensee in an ultimate fighting match unprofessional conduct and grounds for revocation of licensure.

STATE STATUTORY OR CONSTITUTIONAL AUTHORIZATION FOR THIS RULE: Sections 58-66-101 and 58-66-604, and Subsections 58-1-106(1) and 58-1-202(1)

ANTICIPATED COST OR SAVINGS TO:

- ♦THE STATE BUDGET: Minimal costs to the division will be incurred by the need to reprint the rules once they are made effective. Any costs incurred will be absorbed in the current division budget. No additional costs or savings are anticipated.
- ♦LOCAL GOVERNMENTS: No costs or savings are anticipated to local governments. The proposed amendments only further clarify how tough man contests are to be held and do not create any costs or savings to local government agencies.
- ♦OTHER PERSONS: No costs or savings are anticipated to the general public. The proposed amendments clarify how a tough man contest will be conducted and prohibits ultimate fighting by any licensee. Minimal costs will be incurred by tough man contestants to obtain a physical examination and a HIV test. The costs incurred by a tough man contestant could vary depending on where the contestant obtains the physical examination and HIV test.

COMPLIANCE COSTS FOR AFFECTED PERSONS: Minimal costs will be incurred by tough man contestants to obtain a physical examination and a HIV test. The costs incurred by a tough man contestant could vary depending on where the contestant obtains the physical examination and HIV test.

COMMENTS BY THE DEPARTMENT HEAD ON THE FISCAL IMPACT THE RULE MAY HAVE ON BUSINESSES: The purpose of this proposed rule amendment is to address a provision in the licensing act requiring the division to write rules regarding the holding of tough man contests. The proposed rules establish certain minimal standards governing such an event and require that the contestants supply evidence that they are in good physical condition and test negative for the HIV virus. The proposed rule further makes participation by a licensee in an ultimate fighting match unprofessional conduct and therefore grounds for revocation of licensure. The proposed amendments will have no impact upon the state budget, local governments, or the general public. The costs of compliance by licensees should be minimal and consist of obtaining a physical examination and HIV test, which steps any person participating in such an event should already have taken--Klare Bachman (Acting Executive Director)

R156. Commerce, Occupational and Professional Licensing. R156-66. Utah Professional Boxing Regulation Act Rules. R156-66-604gg. Tough Man Contests.

<u>In accordance with Subsection 58-66-604(1)</u>, the rules for the conduct of a tough man contest in the state as defined, clarified or established as follows.

Except as provided in Section R156-66-604hh, the provisions of R156-66, the Utah Professional Boxing Regulation Act Rules, including provisions for stopping contests and impounding purses, apply to a tough man contest.

R156-66-604hh. Limitations on Tough Man Contests.

<u>Limitation on participation in a tough man contest shall include the following:</u>

- (1) A tough man contest must begin and end within a period of 48 hours.
- (2) All matches in a tough man match must be scheduled for no more than three rounds of boxing. A round must be one minute in duration.
- (3) A tough man contestant shall wear 16 oz. boxing gloves, training headgear, a mouthpiece and a large abdominal groin protector during each match.
- (4) A tough man contestant may participate in more than one match in a tough man contest, but a tough man contestant shall not box more than a total of 12 rounds in a tough man contest.
- (5) The promoter of the tough man contest shall be required to supply at the time of the weigh in of the tough man contestants, a physical examination on each tough man contestant, conducted by a physician no more than 60 days prior to the tough man contest in a form provided by the division certifying that the tough man contestant is free from any physical or mental condition that indicates the tough man contestant should not engage in activity as a tough man contestant.
- (6) The promoter of the tough man contest shall be required to supply at the time of the weight in of the tough man contestants, a HIV test pursuant to Subsections R156-66-605(1), (2) and (3) for each tough man contestant.
- (7) Other limitations may be imposed by the Division in collaboration with the Utah Boxing Commission in advance of a tough man contest.

R156-66-605. HIV Testing.

In accordance with Subsection 58-66-605(1), provisions under which professional contestants shall produce evidence of a clear HIV test as a condition of participation in a contest are established as follows:

- (1) All professional contestants <u>and tough man contestants</u> shall provide evidence in the form of a competent laboratory examination certificate verifying that the professional contestant is HIV negative at the time of the weigh-in.
- (2) The examination certificate shall certify that the test results were completed within 60 days prior to the contest.
- (3) Any professional contestant <u>and tough man contestant</u> whose HIV test is positive shall be prohibited from participating in a contest as a professional contestant <u>or tough man contestant</u>.

R156-66-606. Ultimate Fighting Prohibition.

In accordance with Subsections 58-66-503(2)(b) and 58-66-604(3)(b), the license of any licensee who publicizes, promotes, conducts, or engages in an ultimate fighting match shall be revoked.

While a Change in Proposed Rule does not have a formal comment period, there is a 30-day waiting period during which interested parties may submit comments. From the end of the waiting period through May 14, 2000, the agency may notify the Division of Administrative Rules that it wants to make the Change in Proposed Rule effective. When an agency submits a Notice of Effective Date for a Change in Proposed Rule, the Proposed Rule as amended by the Change in Proposed Rule becomes the effective rule. The agency sets the effective date. The date may be no fewer than 30 days nor more than 120 days after the publication date of this issue of the *Utah State Bulletin*. Alternatively, the agency may file another Change in Proposed Rule in response to additional comments received. If the Division of Administrative Rules does not receive a Notice of Effective Date or another Change in Proposed Rule, the Change in Proposed Rule filing, along with its associated Proposed Rule, lapses and the agency must start the process over.

RULE ANALYSIS

PURPOSE OF THE RULE OR REASON FOR THE CHANGE: A rule hearing was held on September 28, 1999, addressing many changes to the rules. Based on the public comment, additional changes are being proposed. Also, during the public comment period, several individuals and groups expressed concern with the implementation of the administration of medications section and the requirement of Administrative Guidelines Agreement.

SUMMARY OF THE RULE OR CHANGE: Throughout the rule, the title of the Utah Society of Health-System Pharmacists has been corrected. Corrects the name of the Pharmacy Technician Certification Board. Deleted the requirement for an Administrative Guideline Agreement. Updated the United States Pharmacopeia/National Formulary (USP/NF) to the January 1, 2000, edition. Revised the section regarding pharmacist administration training.

STATE STATUTORY OR CONSTITUTIONAL AUTHORIZATION FOR THIS RULE: Sections 58-17a-101 and 58-37-1, and Subsections 58-1-106(1) and 58-1-202(1)

THIS RULE OR CHANGE INCORPORATES BY REFERENCE THE FOLLOWING MATERIAL: United States Pharmacopeia/National Formulary (USP/NF), through Supplement 1 (January 1, 2000)

ANTICIPATED COST OR SAVINGS TO:

♦THE STATE BUDGET: Minimal cost to the division to reprint the rules once they are made effective. Any cost associated with the reprinting will be absorbed in the division's current budget. By eliminating the Administrative Guidelines Agreement, protocols will be required to be reviewed by the medical and pharmacy boards. These boards generally meet monthly and such a review can be completed during the regularly scheduled meetings.

♦LOCAL GOVERNMENTS: There may be potential savings to local health departments due to a shifting of the administration of immunizations/medications to pharmacies. ♦OTHER PERSONS: If a pharmacist chooses to administer medications, there will be a cost to the pharmacist to complete the training required. Training costs range from zero to \$400 per person, depending on where the classes are taken. The costs of training will be offset by future revenue

generated from administering medications. The division is unable to determine how many pharmacists will choose to administer medications. There are no costs to a pharmacist who chooses not to administer.

COMPLIANCE COSTS FOR AFFECTED PERSONS: Those pharmacists who choose to administer medications will be required to pay for the training. The cost of training ranges from zero to \$400, depending on where the classes are taken.

COMMENTS BY THE DEPARTMENT HEAD ON THE FISCAL IMPACT THE RULE MAY HAVE ON BUSINESSES: The purpose of this proposed rule amendment is to bring the rules into compliance with changes to the licensing act enacted by the legislature and to remove, pending further review, a provision of the amendment to the rules previously proposed setting out a guideline of medications which can be administered by specially trained pharmacists without medical oversight. The protocols for administration of medications by specially trained pharmacists will have to be reviewed by both the medical board and the pharmacy, but such reviews can be conducted during normal board meetings, which will result in no negative impact upon the state budget with the exception of the nominal cost of reprinting the rules. There is a potential savings to local government health departments with the possible shift of the administration of certain immunizations/medications to pharmacies, but it is impossible to estimate the potential positive impact on local governments. There will be no costs to practitioners of the regulated profession unless they choose to become specially trained, in which case the expenses of such training is estimated to range from zero to \$400, with the total costs being impossible to estimate with any degree of certainty without knowledge of how many pharmacists might choose to obtain the training. There will be the potential of savings to the public from possibly lower costs of having certain immunizations/medications currently requiring a visit to a physician being performed by a pharmacist at a pharmacy--Klare Bachman (Acting Executive Director)

R156. Commerce, Occupational and Professional Licensing. R156-17a. Pharmacy Practice Act Rules. R156-17a-313. Continuing Education - Pharmacist.

- (1) In accordance with Subsections 58-1-203(7) and 58-1-308(3)(b), there is created a continuing education requirement as a condition for renewal or reinstatement of pharmacist licenses issued under Title 58, Chapter 17a.
- (2) Continuing education shall consist of 24 hours of qualified continuing professional education in each preceding renewal period.
- (3) The required number of hours of qualified continuing professional education for an individual who first becomes licensed during the two year period shall be decreased in a pro-rata amount equal to any part of that two year period preceding the date on which that individual first became licensed.
- (4) Qualified continuing professional education shall consist of:
- (a) institutes, seminars, lectures, conferences, workshops, various forms of mediated instruction, and programmed learning courses presented by an institution, individual, organization, association, corporation, or agency that has been approved by the American Council on Pharmaceutical Education (ACPE);
- (b) programs accredited by other nationally recognized healthcare accrediting agencies; and
- (c) educational meetings sponsored by the Utah Pharmaceutical Association or Utah Society of <u>Health-System</u>[Health-System] Pharmacists.
- (5) Credit for qualified continuing professional education shall be recognized in accordance with the following:
- (a) a minimum of eight hours shall be obtained through attendance at lectures, seminars or workshops; and
- (b) a minimum of six hours shall be in drug therapy or patient management.
- (6) A licensee shall be responsible for maintaining competent records of completed qualified continuing professional education for a period of four years after close of the two year period to which the records pertain. It is the responsibility of the licensee to maintain such information with respect to qualified continuing professional education to demonstrate it meets the requirements under this section.

R156-17a-314. Continuing Education - Pharmacy Technician.

- (1) In accordance with Subsections 58-1-203(7) and 58-1-308(3)(b), there is created a continuing education requirement as a condition for renewal or reinstatement of pharmacy technician licenses issued under Title 58, Chapter 17a.
- (2) Continuing education shall consist of eight hours of qualified continuing professional education in each preceding renewal period.
- (3) The required number of hours of qualified continuing professional education for an individual who first becomes licensed during the two year period shall be decreased in a pro-rata amount equal to any part of that two year period preceding the date on which that individual first became licensed.
- (4) Qualified continuing professional education shall consist of:

- (a) institutes, seminars, lectures, conferences, workshops, various forms of mediated instruction, and programmed learning courses sponsored or approved by an institution, individual, organization, association, corporation, or agency that has been approved by the American Council on Pharmaceutical Education (ACPE);
- (b) programs accredited by other nationally recognized healthcare accrediting agencies; and
- (c) educational meetings sponsored by the Utah Pharmaceutical Association or the Utah Society of <u>Health-System</u>[Health-System] Pharmacists.
- (5) Documentation of current Pharmacy Technician [Certifying] Certification Board certification will count as meeting the requirement for continuing education.
- (6) Credit for qualified continuing professional education shall be recognized in accordance with the following:
- (a) a minimum of four hours shall be obtained through attendance at lectures, seminars or workshops.
- (7) A licensee shall be responsible for maintaining competent records of completed qualified continuing professional education for a period of four years after close of the two year period to which the records pertain. It is the responsibility of the licensee to maintain such information with respect to qualified continuing professional education to demonstrate it meets the requirements under this section.

R156-17a-502. Unprofessional Conduct.

"Unprofessional conduct" includes:

- (1) violating any provision of the American Pharmaceutical Association Code of Ethics, October 1994, which is hereby incorporated by reference;
- (2) failing to comply with the Food and Drug Administration Compliance Policy Guideline 460.200, March 16, 1992, which is hereby incorporated by reference;
- (3) failing to comply with the continuing education requirements set forth in these rules;
- (4) failing to provide the division with a current mailing address within a reasonable period of time following any change of address;
 - (5) defaulting on a student loan;
- (6) failing to abide by all applicable federal and state law regarding the practice of pharmacy; and
 - (7) failing to comply with administrative inspections[; and
- (8) administering medications without having a current Administrative Guidelines Agreement readily available at each practice site and immediately available to the Division upon request].

R156-17a-612. Operating Standards - Pharmaceutical Wholesaler/Distributor and Pharmaceutical Manufacturer located in Utah.

In accordance with Subsection 58-17a-601(1), the operating standards for pharmaceutical wholesaler/distributor and pharmaceutical manufacturer licensee includes the following:

(1) A separate license shall be obtained for each separate location engaged in the distribution or manufacturing of prescription drugs.

- (2) A separate license shall be obtained for wholesale distribution activity and manufacturing activity.
- (3) The licensee need not be under the supervision of a licensed pharmacist, but shall be under the supervision of a responsible officer or management employee.
- (4) There has not been established minimum requirements for persons employed by persons engaged in the distribution or manufacture of prescription drugs; however, this does not relieve the person who engages in the distribution of prescription drugs within the state or in interstate commerce into or from the state, or those engaged in the manufacture of prescription drugs in the state or in interstate commerce into or from the state from ensuring that persons employed by them have appropriate education, experience, or both to engage in the duties to which they are assigned and do so in a manner which does not jeopardize the public health, safety or welfare.
- (5) All facilities associated with the distribution or manufacture of prescription drugs shall:
- (a) be of suitable size and construction to facilitate cleaning, maintenance and proper operations;
- (b) have storage areas designed to provide adequate lighting, ventilation, sanitation, space, equipment and security conditions;
- (c) have the ability to control temperature and humidity within tolerances required by all prescription drugs and prescription drug precursors handled or used in the distribution or manufacturing activities of the applicant or licensee;
- (d) provide for a quarantine area for storage of prescription drugs and prescription drug precursors that are outdated, damaged, deteriorated, misbranded, adulterated, opened or unsealed containers that have once been appropriately sealed or closed, or in any other way unsuitable for use or entry into distribution or manufacture;
 - (e) be maintained in a clean and orderly condition, and
- (f) be free from infestation by insects, rodents, birds, or vermin of any kind.
- (6) In regard to security, all facilities used for wholesale drug distribution or manufacturing of prescription drugs shall:
 - (a) be secure from unauthorized entry;
- (b) limit access from the outside to a minimum in conformance with local building and life/safety codes, and control access of persons to ensure unauthorized entry is not made;
- (c) limit entry into areas where prescription drugs or prescription drug precursors are held to authorized persons who have a need to be in those areas;
 - (d) be well lighted on the outside perimeter;
- (e) be equipped with an alarm system to permit detection of entry and notification to appropriate authorities at all times when the facility is not occupied for the purpose of engaging in distribution or manufacture of prescription drugs; and
- (f) be equipped with security measures, systems and procedures necessary to provide reasonable security against theft and diversion of prescription drugs or alteration or tampering with computers and records pertaining to prescription drugs or prescription drug precursors.
- (7) In regard to storage, all facilities shall provide for storage of prescription drugs and prescription drug precursors in accordance with the following:
- (a) all prescription drugs and prescription drug precursors shall be stored at appropriate temperature, humidity and other

- conditions in accordance with labeling of such prescription drugs or prescription drug precursors or with requirements in the United States Pharmacopeia/National Formulary (USP/NF), 1995 edition, through Supplement 1[θ], dated [May 15, 1999]January 1, 2000, which is hereby incorporated by reference;
- (b) if no storage requirements are established for a specific prescription drug or prescription drug precursor, the products shall be held in a condition of controlled temperature and humidity as defined in the USP/NF to ensure that its identity, strength, quality, and purity are not adversely affected; and
- (c) there shall be established a system of manual, electromechanical or electronic recording of temperature and humidity in the areas in which prescription drugs or prescription drug precursors are held to permit review of the record and ensure that the products have not been subjected to conditions which are outside of established limits.
- (8) In regard to examination of materials, each facility shall provide that:
- (a) upon receipt, each outside shipping container containing prescription drugs or prescription drug precursors shall be visually examined for identity and to prevent the acceptance of prescription drugs or prescription drug precursors that are contaminated, reveal damage to the containers or are otherwise unfit for distribution; and
- (b) each outgoing shipment shall be carefully inspected for identity of the prescription drug products and to ensure that there is no delivery of prescription drugs that have been damaged in storage or held under improper conditions.
- (9) In regard to returned, damaged, and outdated prescription drugs, each facility shall provide that:
- (a) prescription drugs or prescription drug precursors that are outdated, damaged, deteriorated, misbranded, adulterated, or in any other way unfit for distribution or use in manufacturing shall be quarantined and physically separated from other prescription drugs or prescription drug precursors until they are appropriately destroyed or returned to their supplier;
- (b) any prescription drug or prescription drug precursor whose immediate sealed or outer secondary sealed container has been opened or in any other way breached shall be identified as such and shall be quarantined and physically separated from other prescription drugs and prescription drug precursors until they are appropriately destroyed or returned to their supplier; and
- (c) if the condition or circumstances surrounding the return of any prescription drug or prescription drug precursor cast any doubt on the product's safety, identity, strength, quality, or purity, then the drug shall be appropriately destroyed or returned to the supplier, unless examination, testing, or other investigation proves that the product meets appropriate and applicable standards related to the product's safety, identity, strength, quality, and purity.
- (10) In regard to record keeping, pharmaceutical wholesaler/distributors and pharmaceutical manufacturers shall establish and maintain records of all transactions regarding the receipt and distribution or other disposition of prescription drugs and prescription drug precursors and shall make inventories of prescription drugs and prescription drug precursors and required records available for inspection by authorized representatives of the federal, state and local law enforcement agencies in accordance with the following:
- (a) there shall be a record of the source of the prescription drugs or prescription drug precursors to include the name and

principal address of the seller or transferor, and the address of the location from which the drugs were shipped;

- (b) there shall be a record of the identity and quantity of the prescription drug or prescription drug precursor received, manufactured, distributed or shipped, or otherwise disposed of by specific product and strength;
- (c) there shall be a record of the dates of receipt and distribution or other disposal of any product;
- (d) there shall be a record of the identity of persons to whom distribution is made to include name and principal address of the receiver, and the address of the location to which the products were shipped;
- (e) inventories of prescription drugs and prescription drug precursors shall be made available during regular business hours to authorized representatives of federal, state and local law enforcement authorities;
- (f) required records shall be made available for inspection during regular business hours to authorized representatives of federal, state and local law enforcement authorities, and such records shall be maintained for a period of two years following disposition of the products; and
- (g) records that are maintained on site or immediately retrievable from computer or other electronic means shall be made readily available for authorized inspection during the retention period; or if records are stored at another location, they shall be made available within two working days after request by an authorized law enforcement authority during the two year period of retention.
- (11) In regard to written policies and procedures, pharmaceutical wholesaler/distributors and pharmaceutical manufacturers shall establish, maintain, and adhere to written policies and procedures which shall be followed for the receipt, security, storage, inventory, manufacture, distribution or other disposal of prescription drugs or prescription drug precursors, including policies and procedures for identifying, recording, and reporting losses or thefts, and for correcting all errors and inaccuracies in inventories. In addition, the policies shall include the following:
- (a) a procedure whereby the oldest approved stock of a prescription drug or precursor product is distributed or used first, with a provision for deviation from the requirement if such deviation is temporary and appropriate;
- (b) a procedure to be followed for handling recalls and withdrawals of prescription drugs adequate to deal with recalls and withdrawals due to:
- (i) any action initiated at the request of the Food and Drug Administration of other federal, state or local law enforcement or other authorized administrative or regulatory agency;
- (ii) any voluntary action by the pharmaceutical wholesaler/distributor or pharmaceutical manufacturer to remove defective or potentially defective drugs from the market; or
- (iii) any action undertaken to promote public health, safety or welfare by replacing of existing product with an improved product or new package design;
- (c) a procedure to ensure that a pharmaceutical wholesaler/distributor or pharmaceutical manufacturer prepare for, protect against, and handle any crisis that affects security or operation of any facility in the event of strike, fire, flood, or other

- natural disaster, or other situations of local, state or national emergency:
- (d) a procedure to ensure that any outdated prescription drugs or prescription drug precursors shall be segregated from other drugs or precursors and either returned to the manufacturer, other appropriate party or appropriately destroyed;
- (e) a procedure providing for documentation of the disposition of outdated, adulterated or otherwise unsafe prescription drugs or prescription drug precursors and the maintenance of that documentation available for inspection by authorized federal, state, or local authorities for a period of two years after disposition of the product.
- (12) In regard to responsible persons, pharmaceutical wholesaler/distributors and pharmaceutical manufacturers shall establish, maintain and make available for inspection by authorized federal, state and local law enforcement authorities, lists of all officers, directors, managers, and other persons in charge of wholesale drug distribution, manufacture, storage, and handling, which lists shall include a description of their duties and a summary of their background and qualifications.
- (13) In regard to compliance with law, pharmaceutical wholesalers/distributors and pharmaceutical manufacturers shall:
- (a) operate in compliance with applicable federal, state and local laws and regulations;
- (b) permit the state licensing authority and authorized federal, state, and local law enforcement officials, upon presentation of proper credentials, to enter and inspect their premises and delivery vehicles, and to audit their records and written operating policies and procedures, at reasonable times and in a reasonable manner, to the extent authorized by law; and
- (c) obtain a controlled substance license from the division and register with the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) if they engage in distribution or manufacture of controlled substances, and shall comply with all federal, state and local regulations applicable to the distribution or manufacture of controlled substances.
- (14) In regard to salvaging and processing, pharmaceutical wholesalers/distributors and pharmaceutical manufacturers shall be subject to and shall abide by applicable federal, state and local laws that relate to the salvaging or reprocessing of prescription drug products.
- (15) A person who is engaged in the wholesale distribution or manufacturing of prescription drugs but does not have a facility located within Utah in which prescription drugs are located, stored, distributed or manufactured is exempt from Utah licensure as a pharmaceutical wholesaler/distributor or a pharmaceutical manufacturer, if said person is currently licensed and in good standing in each state of the United States in which that person has a facility engaged in distribution or manufacturing of prescription drugs entered into interstate commerce.

RULE ANALYSIS

PURPOSE OF THE RULE OR REASON FOR THE CHANGE: This amendment is to incorporate changes made as a result of comments received on the original proposed rule.

SUMMARY OF THE RULE OR CHANGE: Deleted definitions that related to the supervision of trainees as this classification of licensure is being eliminated. Eliminates inspector trainee as a classification of licensure except for the ones already granted. The proposed changes allow continued licensure of residential inspectors as limited inspectors rather than as inspector trainees as anticipated under the original rule. Proposed changes further delay the date in which these inspectors would need to obtain a national certification.

(**DAR Note:** The original proposed amendment upon which this change in proposed rule is based was published in the October 15, 1999, issue of the *Utah State Bulletin*.)

STATE STATUTORY OR CONSTITUTIONAL AUTHORIZATION FOR THIS RULE: Section 58-56-1, and Subsections 58-56-4(2), 58-56-6(2)(a), 58-1-106(1), and 58-1-202(1)

ANTICIPATED COST OR SAVINGS TO:

- ♦THE STATE BUDGET: The division anticipates only a very limited savings of division employee time in processing simpler applications for building inspectors.
- ♦LOCAL GOVERNMENTS: These proposed changes may indirectly affect local government entities which hire licensed building inspectors if the local governments absorb the costs of licensure that building inspectors incur (see explanation given under other persons). The proposed changes further delay the national certification requirement so, if anything, they could have a minor positive effect on local governments. ◆OTHER PERSONS: Some building inspector licensees will be affected by the proposed changes. The costs as outlined in the original rule filing will still apply; however, the time period that is allowed to complete the national certification process is extended under the proposed changes.

COMPLIANCE COSTS FOR AFFECTED PERSONS: Some building inspector licensees will be affected by the proposed changes. The costs as outlined in the original rule filing will still apply; however, the time period that is allowed to complete the national certification process is extended under the proposed changes.

COMMENTS BY THE DEPARTMENT HEAD ON THE FISCAL IMPACT THE RULE MAY HAVE ON BUSINESSES: The purpose of this proposed rule amendment is to address issues raised in comments to the proposed new rules governing residential building inspectors. This proposed amendment eliminates the classification of inspector trainee and permits currently licensed inspectors to practice under their existing limited license until it expires or they pass the national certification examination. The state budget may nominally benefit from decreased processing time for the simpler applications required as a result of this rule change. There may be minimal initial savings to local governments who both hire and absorb the licensing costs of inspectors due to the extension of new licensure until the national certification examination is in effect. There should be no discernable impact upon the general public and the impact upon the regulated profession will be a potential initial benefit through the extension of the licensure period but will be offset by the attendant costs of the national certification examination--Klare Bachman (Acting Executive Director)

R156. Commerce, Occupational and Professional Licensing. R156-56. Utah Uniform Building Standard Act Rules. R156-56-102. Definitions.

In addition to the definitions in Title 58, Chapters 1, 55 and 56, as used in Title 58, Chapter 56 or these rules:

- (1) "Building permit" means, for the purpose of determining the building permit surcharge under Subsection 58-56-9(4), a warrant, license or authorization to build or construct a building or structure or any part thereof.
- (2) "Building permit fee" means, for the purpose of determining the building permit surcharge under Subsection 58-56-9(4), fees assessed by an agency of the state or political subdivision of the state for the issuance of permits for construction, alteration, remodeling, and repair and installation including building, electrical, mechanical and plumbing components.
- (3) ["Direct supervision" means that the inspector responsible for supervising an inspector trainee shall be physically present onsite at the time of inspection and the supervising inspector is responsible for any work delegated to the inspector trainee. The inspector trainee may not approve or disapprove any work and may not sign any orders, approvals or permits.
- (4)]"Employed by a local regulator, state regulator or compliance agency" means, with respect to Subsection 58-56-9(1), the hiring of services of a qualified inspector whether by an employer/employee relationship, an independent contractor relationship, a fee-for-service relationship or any other lawful arrangement under which the regulating agency purchases the services of a qualified inspector.
- (5) "Indirect supervision" means that the inspector responsible for supervising an inspector trainee may be remote from the site of inspection and the supervisor reviews the results of the inspection

with the inspector trainee and is responsible for any work delegated to the inspector trainee. The inspector trainee may issue orders, approvals and permits with the approval of the supervisor and may sign orders, approvals and permits with the supervisor's approval.

- ([6]4) "Inspector" means a person employed by a local regulator, state regulator or compliance agency for the purpose of inspecting building, electrical, plumbing or mechanical construction, alteration, remodeling, repair or installation in accordance with the UBC, NEC, IPC and IMC and taking appropriate action based upon the findings made during inspection.
- ([7]5) "Permanently affixed to real property" means a manufactured home or mobile home which has complied with all of the provisions of Section 59-2-602 at the date possession of the manufactured home or mobile home is changed from the dealer to the purchaser.
- ([8]6) "Refuses to establish a method of appeal" means with respect to Subsection 58-56-8(3), that a compliance agency does not in fact adopt a formal written method of appealing uniform building standard matters in accordance with generally recognized standards of due process; or, that the compliance agency does not convene an appeals board and render a decision in the matter within ninety days from the date on which the appeal is properly filed with the compliance agency.
- ([9]7) "Uniform Building Standards" means the UBC, IMC, IPC, and NEC as amended and the HUD Code as amended (See R156-56-701) and NCSBCS.
- ([10]<u>8</u>) "Unprofessional conduct" as defined in Title 58, Chapter 1 is further defined, in accordance with Subsection 58-1-203(5), in Section R156-56-502.

R156-56-302. Licensure of Inspectors.

In accordance with Subsection 58-56-9(1), the licensee classifications, scope of work, qualifications for licensure, and application for license are established as follows:

- (1) License Classifications. Each inspector employed by a local regulator, state regulator, compliance agency, or private agency providing inspection services to a regulator or compliance agency, shall qualify for licensure and be licensed by the division in one of the following classifications:
 - (a) Combination Inspector; or
 - (b) Limited Inspector[; and
 - (c) Inspector Trainee].
- (2) Scope of Work. The scope of work permitted under each inspector classification is as follows:
 - (a) Combination Inspector.
- (i) In accordance with the UBC, NEC, IPC, and IMC, inspect the components of any building, structure or work for which a standard is provided in the specific edition of the aforesaid codes adopted under these rules or amendments to these codes as included in these rules.
- (ii) Determine whether the construction, alteration, remodeling, repair or installation of all components of any building, structure or work is in compliance with the adopted UBC, NEC, IPC, and IMC.
- (iii) After determination of compliance or noncompliance with the UBC, IPC, NEC and IMC, take appropriate action as is provided in the aforesaid codes.
 - (b) Limited Inspector.

- (i) A Limited Inspector may only conduct activities under Subsections (ii), (iii) or (iv) for which the Limited Inspector has maintained current certificates under the UBC, NEC, IPC or IMC as provided under Subsections R156-56-302(3)(b) and R156-56-302(2)(c)(ii).
- (ii) Subject to the limitations of Subsection (i), in accordance with the UBC, NEC, IPC, or IMC, inspect the components of any building, structure or work for which a standard is provided in the specific edition of the aforesaid codes adopted under these rules or amendments to these codes as included in these rules.
- (iii) Subject to the limitations under Subsection (i), determine whether the construction, alteration, remodeling, repair or installation of components of any building, structure or work is in compliance with the adopted UBC, NEC, IPC, or IMC.
- (iv) Subject to the limitations under Subsection (i), after determination of compliance or noncompliance with the UBC, IPC, NEC or IMC, take appropriate action as is provided in the aforesaid codes.
 - (c) [Inspector Trainee] Transitional Provisions.
- (i) [Under the direct supervision of a licensed Combination Inspector or Limited Inspector, for the purpose of training, inspect the construction, alteration, remodeling, repair and/or installation of buildings, electrical components, plumbing components, and/or mechanical components for which a standard is provided in the adopted editions of the UBC, NEC, IPC, or IMC or under amendments to those codes when the regulator, compliance agency, or private agency providing inspection services to a regulator or a compliance agency elects to employ the services of a licensed inspector trainee. Nothing in this subsection shall be interpreted to require a regulator, compliance agency, or private agency to employ the services of a person licensed in the classification inspector trainee.
- (ii) A licensed inspector trainee may not take any action authorized under the UBC, NEC, IPC, and/or IMC upon a finding after inspection of compliance or noncompliance other than to inform the licensed inspector responsible for the supervision while under direct supervision. Thereafter the inspector trainee may perform assigned duties under indirect supervision. Passing examinations as designated in Subsection III may be credited towards the direct supervision hours.
- (iii) An inspector trainee is required to complete the following direct supervision hours in the following areas prior to beginning indirect supervision in each area:
- (A) Uniform Building Code: 100 hours, 70 of which can be satisfied by passing the "Residential UBC Building Inspector Certification", if such certification is available:
- (B) National Electrical Code: 100 hours, 70 of which can be satisfied by passing the "Residential NEC Electrical Inspector Certification", if such certification is available.
- (C) International Plumbing Code: 80 hours, 70 of which can be satisfied by passing the "Residential IPC Plumbing Inspector Certification", if such certification is available.
- (D) International Mechanical Code: 80 hours, 70 of which can be satisfied by passing the "Residential IMC Mechanical Inspector Certification".
- (iv) The supervising licensed inspector is at all times responsible for the work of the inspector trainee while that inspector is training and assigned to be under the direction of that supervisor.

- (v) An inspector trainee license may be issued for a period not to exceed three years and may not be renewed.
 - (vi) Transitional Provisions.
- (A) A license issued to an inspector trainee which license is active at the time of this rule change shall remain effective throughout the term of the original license and shall have authority as specified under the prior rules in effect on July 1, 1999. Thereafter, all persons must qualify for licensure under these rules.
- (ii) An inspector granted a license as a Building Inspector I, Electrical Inspector I, Plumbing Inspector I, Mechanical Inspector I, Combination Inspector II - Limited Commercial Combination, Combination Inspector III, Building Inspector III, Electrical Inspector III, Plumbing Inspector III or Mechanical Inspector III under the prior rules, which license is active at the time of this rule change, shall be issued a replacement license as a Limited Inspector.[have all authority under such license under the prior rules effective on July 1, 1999 to inspect the respective portion of the residence, with or without supervision, continue under the license's normal expiration date and such license may not be renewed. Thereafter, the licensee must qualify for a current classification of licensure under these rules. When this rule becomes effective, each such licensee shall also be issued a supplemental license as an inspector trainee which shall have a term of three years and may not be renewed. During any portion of the term of the supplemental inspector trainee license issued under this section which is still effective after the expiration of the prior level HI license, the inspector may thereafter continue to act as an inspector trainee under indirect supervision in the area that the person was previously licensed with the level III designation.
- ([B]iii) [An inspector granted a Building Inspector I, Electrical Inspector I, Plumbing Inspector I, Mechanical Inspector I, Combination Inspector II - Limited Commercial Combination, or Combination Inspector III license under the prior rules in effect which is active at the time of this rule change shall be issued a replacement license as a Limited Inspector. A Combination Inspector III who is granted a replacement Limited Inspector license granted under this section who has not previously became nationally certified but has passed all four parts of the residential III test promulgated by the Division shall be considered substantially equivalent to national certification as a Combination Dwelling Inspector Certification for three years after the effective date of this rule but must thereafter as a condition of renewal at the normal expiration date become certified with a national certification as listed in Subsection R156-56-302(3)(b).] The state administered examinations upon which prior licenses were granted or upon which new limited inspector licenses may be granted shall be considered as current certification until two years after a national organization offers certification as a residential building inspector, residential electrical inspector, residential plumbing inspector or residential mechanical inspector for codes adopted under these rules. After the state administered examinations are no longer considered current certification, licenses may not be granted or renewed unless the person has obtained current certificates issued by a national organization.
- (3) Qualifications for Licensure. The qualifications for licensure for each inspector classification are as follows:
 - (a) Combination Inspector.

Has passed the examination for and maintained as current the following national certifications for codes adopted under these rules:

- (i) the "Building Inspector Certification" issued by the International Conference of Building Officials;
- (ii) the "Electrical Inspector Certification" issued by the International Conference of Building Officials or the "General Electrical Certification" issued by the International Association of Electrical Inspectors;
- (iii) the "Plumbing Inspector Certification" issued by the International Conference of Building Officials, International Code Council or the International Association of Plumbing and Mechanical Officials or the "Commercial Plumbing Inspector Certification" issued by the International Code Council or International Association of Plumbing and Mechanical Officials; and
- (iv) the "Mechanical Inspector Certification" issued by the International Conference of Building Officials or the "Commercial Mechanical Inspector Certification" issued by the International Association of Plumbing and Mechanical Officials.
 - (b) Limited Inspector.

Has passed the examination for and maintained as current one or more of the following national certifications <u>for codes adopted under these rules</u>, or state administered examinations, if offered:

- (x) the "Residential Mechanical Inspector Certification" issued by the International Conference of Building Officials, or the

"Residential Mechanical Inspector Examination" prepared and administered under the direction of the Division.

- (c) Inspector Trainee.
- (i) Has graduated from high school or has obtained an equivalent certification; and
- (ii) Has passed one or more of the following examinations which are prepared and administered under the direction of the Division, if such examinations are available:
- (A) the "Residential UBC Building Inspector Examination";
- (B) the "Residential NEC Electrical Inspector Examination";
- (C) the "Residential IPC Plumbing Inspector Examination";
- (D) the "Residential IMC Mechanical Inspector Examination"; or

(E) the "Inspector Trainee Examination".]

- (4) Application for License.
- (a) An applicant for licensure shall:
- (i) submit an application in a form prescribed by the division; and
- (ii) pay a fee determined by the department pursuant to Section 63-38-3.2.

RULE ANALYSIS

PURPOSE OF THE RULE OR REASON FOR THE CHANGE: After recent comments with respect to the proposed rules and after a public hearing, the division is proposing two minor changes. The division needs to implement a change made in Title 58, Chapter 56, during the 1999 legislative session which requires bonds for factory built housing dealers.

(DAR Note: H.B. 71 is found at 1999 Utah Laws 42, and was effective May 3, 1999.)

SUMMARY OF THE RULE OR CHANGE: In Subsection R156-56-602(1), deleted the words "or one of equivalent status" with respect to the required bond. It was pointed out there is no criteria for what the equivalent status is and it appears that there is no equivalent status to the primary requirement in the proposed rule. In Subsection R156-56-602(2), changed the word "suffered" to "which may occur" to be more

grammatically correct. Section R156-56-602 is being added with respect to factory built housing dealer bonds. The proposed rule sets the bond amount required for licensure as \$50,000 and defines coverage of the bond as losses suffered as a result of unlawful and unprofessional conduct of a licensee.

RULE ANALYSIS

PURPOSE OF THE RULE OR REASON FOR THE CHANGE: This rule is proposing further changes as a result of comments made during the hearing and comment period.

SUMMARY OF THE RULE OR CHANGE: a) Two additional references are added to the Section R590-170-1 (Authority): Section 31A-23-307, "Title insurance agents' business," and Section 31A-23-310, "Trust obligation for funds collected"; b) Section R590-170-3 changes "premium, fee, or tax" from singular to plural; c) clarification is added to Subsection R590-170-4(4), noting that the nonlicensee signatory must have "specific responsibility for the licensee's trust account";

d) In Subsections R590-170-5(1) and R590-170-5(2), "only include" has been changed to "be limited to"; e) Section R590-170-6 has been significantly changed, replacing most of Subsection R590-170-6(2), and all of Subsections R590-170-6(3) and R590-170-6(4). The changes permit a licensee to either, via a contract between them and the insurer, allow the insurer into their trust accounts to withdraw funds electronically, or, set up a separate fund for each insurer to withdraw funds from electronically. It also requires the insurer to report to the commissioner on January 15 of each year the licensees that they have such a contract with and the line of business involved.

(**DAR Note:** The original proposed amendment upon which this change in proposed rule is based was published in the December 1, 1999, issue of the *Utah State Bulletin*.)

STATE STATUTORY OR CONSTITUTIONAL AUTHORIZATION FOR THIS RULE: Sections 31A-2-201, 31A-23-307, 31A-23-310, 31A-23-312, 31A-25-302, and 31A-25-305

ANTICIPATED COST OR SAVINGS TO:

- ♦ THE STATE BUDGET: This rule will not increase or decrease the fees coming into the department because the change in the rule does not require a rate or form filing. The rule change allows for changes in the agencies financial accounting system that would affect their relationship with the insurer for whom they hold money. They do not affect the relationship of the agency or insurer with the Insurance Department. Therefore, no increase or reduction of department personnel would be required.
- ♦LOCAL GOVERNMENTS: This rule will not affect local government. The rule is regulated by a state government agency to which all fees are paid by its licensees.
- ♦OTHER PERSONS: The new changes will give the licensee (agency) an option to either have a separate trust account for each insurer they do electronic transfer business with, or have one trust account that all of their insurers can withdraw from. COMMENTS BY THE DEPARTMENT HEAD ON THE FISCAL IMPACT THE RULE MAY HAVE ON BUSINESSES: With the new changes made to this rule, the fiscal impact is reduced almost completely. The only expense would be to the insurer in completing a simple report annually to the commissioner and to change or set up contracts with a licensee regarding the standards for the electronic transfer of accounts from a trust account.

R590. Insurance, Administration. R590-170. Fiduciary and Trust Account Obligations. R590-170-1. Authority.

This rule is promulgated by the insurance commissioner pursuant to the authority granted under Subsection 31A-2-201(3) to adopt rules for the implementation of the Utah Insurance Code and under Sections 31A-23-307, 31A-23-310 and 31A-23-312 and 31A-25-305 authorizing the commissioner to establish by rule, records to be kept by licensees.

R590-170-3. Definitions.

For the purposes of this rule the commissioner adopts the definitions as set forth in Section 31A-l-301 and the following:

- (1) "Trust Account" means a checking or savings account where funds are held in a fiduciary capacity.
- (2) "Accounts Receivable" means [the premium, fee, or tax]premiums, fees, or taxes invoiced by a licensee.
- (3) "Accounts Payable" means [the premium or fee]premiums or fees due insurers that a licensee is responsible for invoicing and collecting from insureds on behalf of insurers and licensees and premium taxes due taxing entities.
- (4) "Licensee" means a licensee under Chapters 31A-23 and 31A-25.

R590-170-4. Establishing the Trust Account.

(1) All records relating to a trust account shall be identified with the wording "Trust Account" or words of similar import. These

records include checks, bank statements, general ledgers and records retained by the bank pertaining to the trust account.

- (2) All trust accounts shall be established with a Federal Employer Identification Number rather than a Social Security Number.
- (3) A trust account shall be separate and distinct from operating and personal accounts, i.e., a separate account number, a separate account register, and different checks, deposit and withdrawal slips.
- (4) A non-licensee may not be a signator on a licensee's trust account, unless the <u>non-licensee</u> signatory is an employee of the licesee <u>and has specific responsibility for the licensee's trust account.</u>

R590-170-5. Maintaining the Trust Account.

- (1) Funds deposited into a trust account shall [only include]be limited to: premiums which may include commissions; return premiums; fees or taxes paid with premiums; financed premiums; funds held pursuant to a third party administrator contract; funds deposited with a title insurance agent in connection with any escrow settlement or closing, amounts necessary to cover bank charges on the trust account; and interest on the trust account, except as provided under Subsection 31A-23-307(2)(b).
- (2) Disbursements from a trust account shall [only include]be limited to: premiums paid to insurers; return premiums to policyholders; transfer of commissions and fees; fees or taxes collected with premiums paid to insurers or taxing authority; funds paid pursuant to a third party administrator contract; funds disbursed by a title insurance agent in connection with any escrow settlement or closing; and the transfer of accrued interest.
- (3) Personal or business expenses may not be paid from a trust account, even if sufficient commissions exist in the account to cover these expenses.
- (4) Commissions may not be disbursed from a trust account prior to the beginning of the policy period for which the premium has been collected.
- (5) Commissions attributed to premiums and fees collected must be disbursed from a trust account on a date not later than the first business day of the calendar quarter after the end of the policy period for which the funds were collected.
- (6) Premiums due insurers may not be paid from a trust account unless the premiums directly relating to the amount due have been deposited into, and are being held in, the trust account, or unless funds have been retained in the trust account consistent with Subsection 5 above, or placed by a licensee into the trust account to finance premiums on behalf of insureds.
- (7) Premiums financed by a licensee must be accounted for as a loan with interest charged at no less than the statutory rate for any loan exceeding 90 days, pursuant to Section 31A-23-304.

R590-170-6. Insurers' Access to Trust Accounts.

- (1) Insurer access to <u>licensee</u> trust funds is not prohibited by the trust relationship, however, licensees must take reasonable steps to assure trust funds are protected from misappropriation by limiting access to those trust funds.
- (2) An insurer desiring to access funds in a licensee's trust account [shall]may do so if:[only if the licensee has a separate trust account solely for trust funds deposited for that insurer.

- (3) An insurer shall not access a licensee's trust account that contains trust funds deposited for more than one insurer.
- (4) A licensee shall not allow an insurer to access a trust account that contains trust funds deposited for more than one insurer.
- (a) the contract between the insurer and the licensee allowing electronic funds transfers into or out of the licensee's trust account:
- (i) expressly permits the insurer to withdraw only the amount authorized by the licensee for each transaction; and
- (ii) specific authorization from the licensee of the amount to be withdrawn from the licensee's trust account must be received by the insurer prior to the withdrawal; or
- (b) the licensee provides the insurer electronic funds transfer into or out of a separate trust account set up solely for trust funds deposited for that insurer.
- (3) By implementing electronic funds transfers from a licensee's trust account, the insurer accepts the commissioner's right to oversight of all electronic funds transfers between the insurer and licensees.
- (4) Insurers utilizing electronic funds transfer contracts will annually report to the commissioner the name of each licensee with whom they have such contracts.
 - (a) The report is due January 15 of each year.
- (b) The report will include the name and address of each licensee and the line of business involved, i.e. personal lines, commercial lines, health, life, etc.

As with a Proposed Rule, a 120-Day Rule is preceded by a Rule Analysis. This analysis provides summary information about the 120-Day Rule including the name of a contact person, justification for filing a 120-Day Rule, anticipated cost impact of the rule, and legal cross-references. A row of dots in the text (• • • • •) indicates that unaffected text was removed to conserve space.

A 120-DAY RULE is effective at the moment the Division of Administrative Rules receives the filing, or on a later date designated by the agency. A 120-DAY RULE is effective for 120 days or until it is superseded by a permanent rule.

Because 120-DAY RULES are effective immediately, the law does not require a public comment period. However, when an agency files a 120-DAY RULE, it usually files a PROPOSED RULE at the same time, to make the requirements permanent. Comment may be made on the proposed rule. Emergency or 120-DAY RULES are governed by *Utah Code* Section 63-46a-7 (1996); and *Utah Administrative Code* Section R15-4-8.

SUMMARY OF THE RULE OR CHANGE: To provide for the procurement of architectural and engineering services for the State Capitol.

STATE STATUTORY OR CONSTITUTIONAL AUTHORIZATION FOR THIS RULE: Section 63C-9-301

ANTICIPATED COST OR SAVINGS TO:

♦THE STATE BUDGET: This rule implements requirements for the procurement of architectural and engineering services which are substantially similar to the rules previously promulgated and enforced by the Division of Facilities Construction and Management (DFCM). Therefore, there is no change in cost or savings to the state budget.

LOCAL GOVERNMENTS: This rule implements requirements for the procurement of architectural and engineering services which are substantially similar to the rules previously promulgated and enforced by DFCM. Therefore, there is no change in cost or savings to the local government.

♦OTHER PERSONS: This rule implements requirements for the procurement of architectural and engineering services which are substantially similar to the rules previously promulgated and enforced by DFCM. Therefore, there is no change in cost or savings to other persons.

COMPLIANCE COSTS FOR AFFECTED PERSONS: There will be no change to DFCM. In Subsection 63C-9-301(4) it states that the board shall adopt procurement rules substantially similar to the requirements of Title 63, Chapter 56, Utah Procurement Code.

COMMENTS BY THE DEPARTMENT HEAD ON THE FISCAL IMPACT THE RULE MAY HAVE ON BUSINESSES: There will be no additional fiscal impact by this rule. The Capitol Preservation Board will be essentially adopting DFCM rules.

EMERGENCY RULE REASON AND JUSTIFICATION: REGULAR RULEMAKING PROCEDURES WOULD place the agency in violation of federal or state law.

R131. Capitol Preservation Board (State), Administration. R131-1. Procurement of Architectural and Engineering Services.

R131-1-1. Purpose and Authority.

- (1) As provided by Subsection 63-56-14(1), this rule establishes procedures for the procurement of architectural and engineering services by the State Capitol Preservation Board.
- (2) The Board's authority to adopt rules is provided according to Subsection 63C-9-301(3).
- (3) As required by Subsection 63C-9-301(4), procurement of architectural and engineering services shall be conducted in accordance with this rule, the provisions of Title 63, Chapter 56, or of Title 63A, Chapter 5 as determined by the Board.

R131-1-2. Definitions.

- (1) Terms used in this rule are defined in Section 63-56-5.
 (2) In addition:
- (a) "Executive Director" means the Executive Director of the Capitol Preservation Board or authorized designee.
- (b) "Office" means the staff and facilities of the executivedirector to the Board pursuant to Sections 63C-9-401, and 402.
 - (c) "State" means the State of Utah.

R131-1-3. Maintaining a Register of Architectural/Engineering Firms.

The Board shall select registered and licensed architects and engineers that are interested in being considered for state building projects, from the DFCM register/list, prepared in accordance with Section R23-2-3, Utah Administrative Code.

R131-1-4. Notification of Need for Architectural/Engineering Services.

- (1) The Board shall publish or cause to have published its needs for architectural/engineering services in the manner provided in Subsection R23-1-5(2). The public notice shall include the following:
- (a) The closing time and date for the submission of Statement of Qualifications:

- (b) The address of the office to which Statements of Qualifications are to be delivered;
- (c) The address where a more complete project description may be obtained;
 - (d) A brief description of the project; and
 - (e) A notice of any mandatory pre-submittal meetings.
- (2) The architects/engineers shall respond with a Statement of Qualifications for each project.

R131-1-5. Appointment of a Selection Committee.

The Executive Director shall appoint a selection committee to review all applications of interested architectural/engineering firms. The committee shall include representatives of the Board, the Office, the State Building Board, and others as deemed appropriate.

R131-1-6. Preliminary Screening and Evaluation.

- (1) The selection committee shall independently rate each interested firm. A weighted point system shall be used. A ranking of those qualified firms shall be made by using a composite scoring of all the individual rater's scores.
- (2) The following criteria shall be used in the evaluation and ranking of firms for possible awards:
- (a) Competence to perform the services as reflected by technical training and education, specialized experience in providing similar services, and the qualifications and competence of persons who would be assigned to assist with the performance of the services;
- (b) Capacity to perform the services in the required time as reflected by present workload, availability of adequate personnel, equipment, and facilities;
- (c) Past performance as reflected by the evaluation of the services of the architect/engineer; including such factors as control of costs, quality of work, and ability to meet deadlines; and
 - (d) Proximity of firm to the project.

R131-1-7. Interviews with Architectural/Engineering Firms.

- (1) For all projects, interviews shall be held with no less than the top three ranked firms competing for the project design commission. The number of firms interviewed per project may vary according to the size and complexity of the project. Multiple interviews may be held on smaller projects at the discretion of the Executive Director.
- (2) Firms selected to be interviewed shall be provided with as much pertinent information as possible of the job at least one week prior to the interview.
- (3) After composite rankings or interviews are completed, the selection committee shall select the top three and rank them in order of selection.

R131-1-8. Negotiation and Appointment.

(1) The Executive Director shall negotiate with the top-ranked architectural or engineering firm to finalize the details of the project. If there are problems with reaching agreement, the Executive Director shall present a written offer of the terms which must then be accepted or rejected in writing by the architectural/engineering firm. If the offer is rejected by the top-ranked firm, the Executive Director may negotiate with the second-

ranked firm to obtain an agreement. If negotiations with the second-ranked firm are not able to be successfully concluded, the Office may negotiate with the third-ranked firm.

(2) Following completion of negotiations, the Executive Director will present the choice of the selected firm to the Board for approval, to enter into a contract with the selected firm. Upon Board approval, the Executive Director will enter into a contract with the selected firm. Other firms who were interviewed shall receive notification of award.

R131-1-9. Role of the Board.

- (1) The Executive Director shall establish and monitor the selection process, may take appropriate steps to verify the acceptability of the procedure, and make changes in procedure at any time as may be determined necessary by the Board.
- (2) At each meeting of the Board, the Executive Director shall submit a list of all architect/engineer contracts entered into, and a description of the method(s) of selection used to the Board as a second review of actions taken.

R131-1-10. Performance Evaluation.

(1) The Executive Director shall, throughout the course of, and at the end of the contract, evaluate the performance of the architectural/engineering firm; verbally and in writing. There shall be at least one verbal review of the architectural/engineering firm's performance on each project, prior to the project's completion. The Executive Director shall also advise the architectural/engineering firm, in writing, about their performance at the end of the project. If the firm wishes to respond to those evaluation(s), it may enter its response(s) in the file.

R131-1-11. Emergency Conditions.

The Executive Director, in consultation with the chairman of the Board, shall determine if it is necessary to respond to any emergency conditions that may occur. He shall also document his decision to take emergency action in writing. The Executive Director may use any reasonable method of awarding architect/engineer design contracts when emergency conditions occur. If the Executive Director determines that a particular specialization is needed, he may appoint any firm(s) he finds may be necessary to accomplish work on the emergency project design.

R131-1-12. Direct Awards.

- (1) The Executive Director may award a contract to an architectural/engineering firm without following the procedures of this rule if:
- (a) The contract is for a project which is integrally related to, or an extension of, a project which was awarded to the architectural/engineering firm;
- (b) The architectural/engineering firm performed satisfactorily on any similar or related project; and
- (c) The Executive Director determines that the direct award is in the best interests of the State.
- (2) The Executive Director shall place written documentation of the reasons for the direct award in the project file and shall report the action to the Board at its next meeting.

R131-1-13. Small Purchases.

- (1) If the Executive Director determines that the services of architects and engineers can be procured for less than \$50,000, or if the estimated construction cost of the project is less than \$500,000, the procedures contained in Subsection (2) below, may be used.
- (2) Before contacting any person to perform the required services, the Executive Director may refer to or examine any current statements of qualifications on file with the Office. Following that, the Executive Director may contact a qualified firm and negotiate a contract for the required services at a fair and reasonable price. If no current statements of qualifications are on file or if the statements on file are, in the judgment of the Executive Director, inadequate to determine a qualified firm, technical proposals or statements of qualifications shall be solicited. If, after negotiations, the parties cannot agree upon a price that, in the Executive Director's judgment, is fair and reasonable, negotiations shall be terminated with that firm and negotiations begun with another qualified firm. This process shall continue until a contract is negotiated that reflects a fair and reasonable price and meets the necessary conditions of the project.

R131-1-14. Alternative Procedures.

- (1) The Board may revise or enhance the procurement process whenever the Executive Director determines that it would be in the best interest of the State. Examples of enhancements or changes which may be made include design competitions and outside representation on selection committees.
- (2) Any exceptions to this rule shall be justified to and approved by the Board.

SUMMARY OF THE RULE OR CHANGE: To provide a procedure for the Executive Director to devise and develop a master planning process for Capitol Hill facilities and future Capitol Hill facilities needs.

COMPLIANCE COSTS FOR AFFECTED PERSONS: There will be no change to DFCM. In Subsection 63C-9-301(1)(d)(ii) it states that the board shall review and approve the executive director's long-range master plan for the Capitol Hill facilities and Capitol Hill grounds.

COMMENTS BY THE DEPARTMENT HEAD ON THE FISCAL IMPACT THE RULE MAY HAVE ON BUSINESSES: There will be no additional fiscal impact by this rule. The Capitol Preservation Board will be essentially adopting DFCM rules.

EMERGENCY RULE REASON AND JUSTIFICATION: REGULAR RULEMAKING PROCEDURES WOULD place the agency in violation of federal or state law.

H.B. 330 established the State Capitol Preservation Board. The statute requires the Board to establish rules. This is in response to that requirement.

R131. Capitol Preservation Board (State), Administration.
R131-7. State Capitol Preservation Board Master Planning Policy.

R131-7-1. Purpose.

Pursuant to Section 63C-9-402, this rule provides a procedure for the Executive Director to devise and develop a master-planning process for Capitol Hill Facilities; for future capital facilities expansion of the state Capitol grounds, and for projected Capitol Hill facility growth needs.

R131-7-2. Authority.

This rule is authorized under Subsection 63C-9-402(1), which directs the Executive Director to develop, for board approval, a master plan for the state capitol facilities and grounds.

R131-7-3. Policy.

The Executive Director shall prepare annually, and maintain in current form, a 20-year Master Plan and a corresponding annual budget for all existing and planned capital facilities for the Capitol Hill facilities and grounds, which shall reflect maintenance, preservation, restoration, and modification considerations.

R131-7-4. Review of Plan.

The Board will review the State Capitol Preservation Master Plan and associated budgetary requirements at least once yearly, or whenever it considers requests for project funding. The Board, when requested, may also review any design or project, to assist the Executive Director in long-term planning efforts. The Master Plan shall be expected to reflect realistic budgetary perspectives, usage, deterioration, and expectation of future growth that affects projected needs of state Capitol Hill facilities and grounds.

R131-7-5. Coordination with State Budget Policy.

Following approval by the Board, the Executive Director will submit a summary of the Master Plan and annual budget to the Governor's Office of Planning and Budget, for inclusion into the Executive Branch budget, pursuant to Section 63-38-1, et seq., for submission to the Legislature.

RULE ANALYSIS

Purpose of the rule or reason for the change: Section 59-2-301 requires the county assessor to assess all property located within the county. Subsection 59-1-210(3) authorizes the State Tax Commission to promulgate rules that aide county officials in the performance of any duties relating to the assessment and equalization of property within the county. This is a technical appraisal amendment to provide direction to assessors in determining the market value of aircraft manufacturing tools and dies. This type of equipment is subject to economic, functional, and physical obsolescence, and a percent good schedule was not in place which would produce reasonable market value approximations.

SUMMARY OF THE RULE OR CHANGE: The proposed amendment to Section R884-24P-33 creates a new percent good schedule specifically related to aircraft manufacturing tools and dies. This amendment is necessary to properly estimate market value in the assessment process for tools and dies in the aircraft manufacturing industry.

STATE STATUTORY OR CONSTITUTIONAL AUTHORIZATION FOR THIS RULE: Section 59-2-301

ANTICIPATED COST OR SAVINGS TO:

♦THE STATE BUDGET: The amount of savings or cost to state government is undetermined. The state receives tax revenue for assessing and collecting and for the uniform school fund based on increased or decreased property valuation, including aircraft manufacturing tools and dies assessed under the Property Tax Act. The impetus for this rule amendment is that there is a significant amount of this equipment currently moving into the state. The actual increase in the state budget cannot be determined until all the equipment arrives in Utah. The state performs audits of personal property accounts at the request of counties; however, there should be no additional cost to the audit program. Therefore, it is estimated that the overall cost is minimal due to this amendment. There will be an undetermined positive impact to the state budget from the movement of this equipment into Utah. It will be dependent on the amount, type, and age of the aircraft manufacturing equipment moved to Utah.

LOCAL GOVERNMENTS: The amount of savings or cost to local government is undetermined. Local governments currently receive tax revenue from the personal property of

aircraft manufacturers. Local governmental entities receive tax revenue based on increased or decreased property valuation from the disposal or acquisition of personal property. No total cost or savings could be calculated without a complete inventory of personal property tax rolls in each county, a listing of newly-acquired aircraft tools and dies during 1999, a listing of property that has been removed from personal property rolls during 1999, and a complete list of the equipment which is being moved into Utah. However, it is estimated that the overall cost or savings is minimal due to this amendment. County Assessor's offices statewide will be required to determine if property in their county should be correctly classified as aircraft manufacturing tools and dies. The determination of classification will not require extra resources since all county offices use self-assessing personal property affidavits and it will be listed on the affidavit by the taxpayer. This would only represent a change in the instructions sent with the affidavit to individual business. There should be no significant cost to the assessor's offices. ♦OTHER PERSONS: Each personal property owner is required to file an annual affidavit listing personal property with the county assessor's office. The personal property owners may see a change in value, depending on ownership of the aircraft manufacturing tools and dies. Businesses that currently have this type of equipment in Utah will see a slight decrease in personal property tax liability. In addition, the compliance cost should be minimal due to the fact that this amendment is simply a line-item classification change on the personal property affidavit already filed by the taxpayers. Therefore, it is estimated that the overall compliance cost due to this amendment is minimal.

COMPLIANCE COSTS FOR AFFECTED PERSONS: Each personal property owner is required to file an annual affidavit listing personal property with the county assessor's office. The personal property owners may see a change in value, depending on ownership of the aircraft manufacturing tools and dies. Businesses that currently have this type of equipment in Utah will see a slight decrease in personal property tax liability. In addition, the compliance cost should be minimal due to the fact that this amendment is simply a line-item classification change on the personal property affidavit already filed by the taxpayers. Therefore, it is estimated that the overall compliance cost due to this amendment is minimal.

COMMENTS BY THE DEPARTMENT HEAD ON THE FISCAL IMPACT THE RULE MAY HAVE ON BUSINESSES: As indicated above, the fiscal impact to aircraft manufacturing businesses will be a slight decrease in personal property taxes, but local and state governments may experience a slight increase in personal property tax collections due to the volume of equipment moving into the state. In the aggregate, the fiscal impact is estimated to be minimal.

EMERGENCY RULE REASON AND JUSTIFICATION: REGULAR RULEMAKING PROCEDURES WOULD place the agency in violation of federal or state law.

The Tax Commission cannot comply with the rulemaking procedures of Section 63-46a-4 because it would place the agency in violation of state law. Subsection 59-2-103(1) requires all tangible taxable property to be assessed at fair

market value as of January 1. A significant amount of aircraft manufacturing tools and dies have recently started moving into Utah and will be here on January 1, 2000. Based on discussions with the industry, it was determined that no percent good schedule existed which would accurately value this type of equipment. This emergency rule is to satisfy the fair market value requirement of 59-2-103.

R884. Tax Commission, Property Tax. R884-24P. Property Tax.

R884-24P-33. 2000 Personal Property Valuation Guides and Schedules Pursuant to Utah Code Ann. Section 59-2-301.

- A. Definitions.
- 1. "Acquisition cost" means all costs required to put an item into service, including purchase price, freight and shipping costs; installation, engineering, erection or assembly costs; and excise and sales taxes
- a) Indirect costs such as debugging, licensing fees and permits, insurance or security are not included in the acquisition cost
- b) Acquisition cost may correspond to the cost new for new property, or cost used for used property.
- 2. "Actual cost" includes the value of components necessary to complete the vehicle, such as tanks, mixers, special containers, passenger compartments, special axles, installation, engineering, erection, or assembly costs.
- a) Actual cost does not include sales or excise taxes, maintenance contracts, registration and license fees, dealer charges, tire tax, freight, or shipping costs.
- 3. "Cost new" means the manufacturer's suggested retail price or the actual cost of the property when purchased new. For property purchased used the cost new may be estimated by the taxing authority.
- 4. "Percent good" means an estimate of value, expressed as a percentage, based on a property's acquisition cost or cost new, adjusted for depreciation and appreciation of all kinds.
- a) The percent good factor is applied against the acquisition cost or the cost new to derive taxable value for the property.

- b) Percent good schedules are derived from an analysis of the Internal Revenue Service Class Life, the Marshall and Swift Cost index, and vehicle valuation guides such as NADA.
- B. Each year the Property Tax Division shall update and publish percent good schedules for use in computing personal property valuation.
- 1. Proposed schedules shall be transmitted to county assessors and interested parties for comment before adoption.
- 2. A public comment period will be scheduled each year and a public hearing will be scheduled if requested by ten or more interested parties or at the discretion of the Commission.
- 3. County assessors may deviate from the schedules when warranted by specific conditions affecting an item of personal property. When a deviation will affect an entire class or type of personal property, a written report, substantiating the changes with verifiable data, must be presented to the Commission. Alternative schedules may not be used without prior written approval of the Commission.
- 4. The assessor and the Commission may rely on other publications listing costs new or market values when valuing motor vehicles not found in the source guide recommended by the Commission.
- C. Other taxable personal property that is not included in the listed classes includes:
- 1. Supplies on hand as of January 1 at 12:00 noon, including office supplies, shipping supplies, maintenance supplies, replacement parts, lubricating oils, fuel and consumable items not held for sale in the ordinary course of business. Supplies are assessed at total cost, including freight-in.
- 2. Equipment leased or rented from inventory is subject to ad valorem tax. Refer to the appropriate property class schedule to determine taxable value.
- 3. Property held for rent or lease is taxable, and is not exempt as inventory. For entities primarily engaged in rent-to-own, inventory on hand at January 1 is exempt and property out on rent-to-own contracts is taxable.
- D. Personal property valuation schedules may not be appealed to, or amended by, county boards of equalization.
- E. All taxable personal property is classified by expected economic life as follows:
- 1. Class 1 Short Life Property. Property in this class has a typical life of more than one year and less than four years. It is fungible in that it is difficult to determine the age of an item retired from service.
 - a) Examples of property in the class include:
 - (1) barricades/warning signs;
 - (2) library materials;
 - (3) patterns, jigs and dies;
 - (4) pots, pans, and utensils;
 - (5) canned computer software;
 - (6) hotel linen;
 - (7) wood and pallets; and
 - (8) video tapes.
- b) With the exception of video tapes, taxable value is calculated by applying the percent good factor against the acquisition cost of the property.
- c) Video tapes are valued at \$15.00 per tape for the first year and \$3.00 per tape thereafter.

- 2. Class 2 Computer Dependent Machinery.
- a) Machinery shall be classified as computer dependent machinery if all of the following conditions are met:

- (2) The machine cannot operate without the computer and the computer cannot perform functions outside the machine.
- (3) The machine can perform multiple functions and is controlled by a programmable central processing unit.
- (4) The total cost of the machine and computer combined is depreciated as a unit for income tax purposes.
- (5) The capabilities of the machine cannot be expanded by substituting a more complex computer for the original.
- b) Taxable value is calculated by applying the percent good factor against the acquisition cost of the property.
