EXECUTIVE DOCUMENTS

Under authority granted by the Utah Constitution and various federal and state statutes, the Governor periodically issues **Executive Documents**, which can be categorized as either Executive Orders, Proclamations, and Declarations. Executive Orders set policy for the executive branch; create boards and commissions; provide for the transfer of authority; or otherwise interpret, implement, or give administrative effect to a provision of the Constitution, state law or executive policy. Proclamations call special or extraordinary legislative sessions; designate classes of cities; publish states-of-emergency; promulgate other official formal public announcements or functions; or publicly avow or cause certain matters of state government to be made generally known. Declarations designate special days, weeks or other time periods; call attention to or recognize people, groups, organizations, functions, or similar actions having a public purpose; or invoke specific legislative purposes (such as the declaration of an agricultural disaster).

Calling the Sixty-Second Legislature Into the Seventh Extraordinary Session, Utah Proclamation No. 2017-7E

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, since the close of the 2017 General Session of the 62nd Legislature of the State of Utah, certain matters have arisen which require immediate legislative attention; and

WHEREAS, Article VII, Section 6 of the Constitution of the State of Utah provides that the Governor may, by proclamation, convene the Senate into Extraordinary Session; and

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Gary R. Herbert, Governor of the State of Utah, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Utah, do by this Proclamation call the Senate only of the 62nd Legislature of the State of Utah into the Seventh Extraordinary Session at the Utah State Capitol in Salt Lake City, Utah, on the 20th day of December 2017, at 4:00 p.m., for the following purpose:

For the Senate to consent to appointments made by the Governor to positions within state government of the State of Utah since the close of the 2017 General Session of the Legislature of the State of Utah.

NOTICES OF PROPOSED RULES

A state agency may file a Proposed Rule when it determines the need for a substantive change to an existing rule. With a Notice of Proposed Rule, an agency may create a new rule, amend an existing rule, repeal an existing rule and reenact a new rule. Filings received between <u>December 16, 2017, 12:00 a.m.</u>, and <u>January 02, 2018, 11:59 p.m.</u> are included in this, the <u>January 15, 2018</u>, issue of the *Utah State Bulletin*.

In this publication, each Proposed Rule is preceded by a Rule Analysis. This analysis provides summary information about the Proposed Rule including the name of a contact person, anticipated cost impact of the rule, and legal cross-references.

Following the Rule Analysis, the text of the Proposed Rule is usually printed. New rules or additions made to existing rules are underlined (example). Deletions made to existing rules are struck out with brackets surrounding them ([example]). Rules being repealed are completely struck out. A row of dots in the text between paragraphs (.....) indicates that unaffected text from within a section was removed to conserve space. Unaffected sections are not usually printed. If a Proposed Rule is too long to print, the Office of Administrative Rules may include only the Rule Analysis. A copy of each rule that is too long to print is available from the filing agency or from the Office of Administrative Rules.

The law requires that an agency accept public comment on Proposed Rules published in this issue of the *Utah State Bulletin* until at least February 14, 2018. The agency may accept comment beyond this date and will indicate the last day the agency will accept comment in the Rule Analysis. The agency may also hold public hearings. Additionally, citizens or organizations may request the agency hold a hearing on a specific Proposed Rule. Section 63G-3-302 requires that a hearing request be received by the agency proposing the rule "in writing not more than 15 days after the publication date of the proposed rule."

From the end of the public comment period through May 15, 2018, the agency may notify the Office of Administrative Rules that it wants to make the Proposed Rule effective. The agency sets the effective date. The date may be no fewer than seven calendar days after the close of the public comment period nor more than 120 days after the publication date of this issue of the *Utah State Bulletin*. Alternatively, the agency may file a Change in Proposed Rule in response to comments received. If the Office of Administrative Rules does not receive a Notice of Effective Date or a Change in Proposed Rule, the Proposed Rule lapses.

The public, interest groups, and governmental agencies are invited to review and comment on Proposed Rules. Comment may be directed to the contact person identified on the Rule Analysis for each rule.

PROPOSED RULES are governed by Section 63G-3-301, Rule R15-2, and Sections R15-4-3, R15-4-4, R15-4-5a, R15-4-9, and R15-4-10.

Standards and Testing of Motor Fuel

NOTICE OF PROPOSED RULE

(Repeal and Reenact) DAR FILE NO.: 42422 FILED: 12/28/2017

RULE ANALYSIS

PURPOSE OF THE RULE OR REASON FOR THE CHANGE: The purpose of this rule change is to adopt the 2017 version of the NIST Handbook which establishes the national standards regarding motor fuel. While the Department of Agriculture and Food (Department) is adopting most of the national standards, this rule also specifies areas of the national standard which the Department is not adopting. It is necessary to make these changes to ensure that our motor fuel is meeting the national standards which will facilitate the continued participation in interstate commerce. Additionally, many of the requirements of the previous rule will be made unnecessary with the adoption of the national standards and are being removed.

SUMMARY OF THE RULE OR CHANGE: This rule adopts the 2017 version of the NIST Handbook 130 which establishes the uniform engine fuels and automotive lubricant regulations. This rule eliminates unnecessary permitting requirements that have previously been required. It specifies specific areas where the state is not going to adopt the national standard and instead have state specific standards. This rule proposes a standard color code be adopted by gasoline stations. It clarifies that the state will adopt the ASTM specification D4814-17 for automotive spark-ignition engine fuel.

STATUTORY OR CONSTITUTIONAL AUTHORIZATION FOR THIS RULE: Section 4-33-104 and Subsection 4-2-103(i)

TITLE OF MATERIALS INCORPORATED BY REFERENCE:

◆ Updates National Institute of Standards and Technology Handbook 130, "Uniform Laws and Regulations in the Area of Legal Metrology and Engine Fuel Quality, Chapter IV, Part G, "Uniform Engine Fuels and Automotive Lubricants Regulation", published by National Institute of Standards and Technology, 11/01/2016

ANTICIPATED COST OR SAVINGS TO:

♦ THE STATE BUDGET: This purposed rule change is not anticipated to have a cost or saving to the state. This rule will not change the time or manner in which inspections are done nor does it require the state to do any additional testing to what the state is already conducting.

- ♦ LOCAL GOVERNMENTS: There are no anticipated costs or benefits to local governments as this rule neither requires action from nor provides benefits to local governments.
- ♦ SMALL BUSINESSES: This proposed rule change will have an affect on various types of businesses because of the various industries that are involved in the production of motor and automotive fuel. It is anticipated this rule change will have an affect on petroleum refineries, gasoline stations, and petroleum transporters. There are no anticipate cost to refineries because this rule does not proscribe the refineries take any additional actions to comply. It is anticipated that the standardization of a color code for the lids at filling stations will have an estimated cost of up to \$40 per year depending on how many types of fuel are being sold at the gasoline stations. The adoption of the ASTM specification D4814-17 for automotive spark-ignition fuel is a saving to the petroleum refineries because currently these refineries are equipped to refine to the 85 octane specifications. This proposed rule change allows for that to continue regardless of changes to the national standards saving the refineries an inestimable amount in retooling costs in order to meet the octane specification. The adoption of the national water tolerance level instead of the previous zero water tolerance standard could lead to a potential savings by avoiding having tanks serviced due to the presence of water. These benefits inestimable due having no way of estimating who would have been out of compliance under the previous rule.
- ♦ PERSONS OTHER THAN SMALL BUSINESSES, BUSINESSES, OR LOCAL GOVERNMENTAL ENTITIES: Consumers will see a benefit in knowing that the fuel they receive is meeting a national standard. The addition of the color code requirement will help to prevent the possibilities of consumers accidentally receiving the wrong type of fuel.

COMPLIANCE COSTS FOR AFFECTED PERSONS: The compliance cost for those affected will be minimal, an estimated \$40 a year to meet the standardized color code.

COMMENTS BY THE DEPARTMENT HEAD ON THE FISCAL IMPACT THE RULE MAY HAVE ON BUSINESSES: This proposed rule change clarifies the requirements for the industry by adopting a national standard, while at the same time this rule acknowledges the special needs of the state and establishes some exemption to the national standards to fit those needs of the industry in the state. This proposed rule change meets the needs of the industry, and continues to protect the consumer by ensuring that fuel being purchased is of the grade and quality that is being advertised. The additional requirements of a standardized color code will protect the consumer and will clarify for transporters where to place which type of fuel. The adoption of a particular standard in relation to the spark-ignition engine fuel in the state will give added security to the refineries in the state that the standard is not going to be changing for them even if the national standard changes.

Appendix 2: Regulatory Impact to Non-Small Businesses

There are approximately 1,100 gasoline station registered in the state of Utah (NAICS 447110, NAICS 447190). Approximately 300 of these gasoline stations are non-small business. All gasoline stations will have to comply with the standardized color coding. The cost associated with the regulation is the cost of the paint necessary to paint the lids to the different fuel types in accordance with the color code and the time of it will take an employee to paint the lids for the tanks. As it will be necessary to repaint the lids every year, there will be an ongoing cost of \$40 per year.

There are a total of seven petroleum refineries (NAICS 3241100 operating in the Utah. These businesses will experience a fiscal savings associated with the adoption of the ASTM specification D4814-17. The full impact to these non-small businesses cannot be estimated as the necessary data are unavailable.

The Commissioner of the Department of Agriculture and Food, LuAnn Adams, has reviewed and approved this fiscal analysis.

R70. Agriculture and Food, Regulatory Services. R70-940. Standards and Testing of Motor Fuel. R70-940-1. Authority and Scope.

[A. Promulgated under Authority of Section 4-33-4 and Subsection 4-2-2(1)(j).

B. Scope: This rule establishes the requirements for the blending and sale of motor fuel in the state of Utah.

R70-940-2. Standards.

Motor fuels are to meet the following standards:

A. "Octane." (R+M)/2. ASTM D-4814 (ASTM -- American Standard of Testing Materials).

B. "Vapor Pressure." ASTM D-323 on Reid Vapor-Pressure and ASTM's Information Document on Oxygenated Fuels, Section 4.2.1.

- C. "Distillation." ASTM D-86 and ASTM revised D-4814 relative to alcohol blends (along with ASTM's Information Document on Oxygenated Fuels). Additionally, Gasoline and Gasoline-Ethanol Blends shall meet the following requirements:
- (1) The most recent version of ASTM D 4814, "Standard Specification for Automotive Spark--Ignition Engine Fuel," except that volatility standards for unleaded gasoline blended with ethanol-shall meet but not be more restrictive than those adopted under the rules, regulations, and Clean Air Act waivers of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (which includes rules promulgated by the State, and Federally-approved State Implementation Plans-(SIP's)). Gasoline blended with ethanol shall be blended under any of the following three options:
- (a) The base gasoline used in such blends shall meet the requirements of ASTM D 4814 and shall have a minimum distillation temperature of 77 deg C (170 deg F) at 50 volume percent-evaporated, or

- (b) The base gasoline shall meet the requirements of ASTM D 4814 and the blend shall have a minimum distillation temperature of 66 deg C (150 deg F) at 50 volume percent-evaporated, or
- (c) The base gasoline used in such blends shall meet all the requirements of ASTM D 4814 except distillation, and the blend shall meet the requirements of ASTM D 4814, except for vapor pressure.
- (2) Blends of gasoline containing 9-10 percent ethanolshall not exceed the ASTM D 4814 vapor pressure limits by more than 1.0 psi from June 1 through September 15 of each calendar year. Gasoline containing less than 9 percent ethanol by volume must comply with D4814 vapor pressure limits during the period. Gasoline containing up to 10 percent ethanol by volume shall not exceed the ASTM D 4814 vapor pressure limits by more than 1.0 psi from September 16 through May 31 of successive years.
 - D. "Water Tolerance." ASTM D-4814.
- E. "Phase Separation." Must be homogenous, no phase separation.
 - F. "Corrosivity." ASTM D-4814.
 - G. "Benzene." ASTM D-3606.
 - H. "Flash Point." ASTM D-93 or D-56.
 - I. "Gravity." ASTM D-1298.
- J. "Sulfur." (X-ray method) ASTM D-2622, 1266, 1552, 2622 or 4294.
 - K. "Aromatics." ASTM D-1319.
 - L. "Leads." ASTM D-3237.
 - M. "Cloud point." ASTM D-2500.
 - N. "Conductivity." ASTM D-2624.
 - O. "Cetane" ASTM D-976 or 4737.
- P. "Cosolvents." Methanol or ethanol based fuels shall include such cosolvents as are required to increase the water tolerance of the finished gasoline blend to the level specified in R70-940-2-D above.
- Q. "Method of Operation." Equipment shall be operated only in the manner that is obviously indicated by its construction or that is indicated by instructions on the equipment.
- R. "Maintenance of Equipment." All equipment in service and all mechanisms and devices attached thereto or used inconnection therewith shall continuously be maintained in proper-operating condition throughout the period of such service.
- S. "Product Storage Identification." The fill connection for any petroleum product storage tank or vessel supplying retail motor fuel devices shall be permanently, plainly, and visibly marked as to product contained. When the fill connection device is marked by means of color code, the color key shall be conspicuously displayed at the place of business.

R70-940-3. Labels.

- All motor fuel kept, offered or exposed for sale or sold containing at least one percent by volume ethanol must be labeled in a prominent, conspicuous manner," "This fuel contains up to 10%-ETHANOL":
- A. Letters on the label must be at least 1 1/2 inches high and in contrasting colors.
- B. Labels must be located on the face of each dispenser near the area designating the grade of the product.

R70-940-4. Preparation.

All storage tanks and equipment must be purged and eleansed before using methanol, ethanol or ether blend motor fuels.

R70-940-5. Water Content.

All storage tanks must be kept free from water content.

R70-940-6. Bill of Lading.

- Bulk sales of all motor fuels shall be accompanied by a copy of the bill of lading and a delivery ticket containing the following information:
 - A. Name and address of the vendor and purchaser.
 - B. Date delivered.
- C. Quantity delivered and the quantity upon which the price is based.
- D. Identification of the product sold, including grade and indicating the percent of methanol, ethanol or ethers in the blend.
- E. The above information must be available at each retail outlet and furnished to the inspector upon request.

R70-940-7. Blending.

- A. Blending of motor fuels will be done only at facilities equipped to accurately measure the products to be blended. The finished blend must meet the requirements of octane, vapor pressure, distillation, and other standards as outlined by ASTM.
- (1) The Department may issue a temporary approval for the blending of gasoline and ethanol provided that the operator has a Department-approved plan in place to assure the blended product meets the referenced requirements. The temporary approval shall not exceed 12 months.
- B. At retail locations, a separate fixed tank or a method approved by the Utah State Department of Agriculture and Food shall be used for blending the "methanol or ethanol-based fuel" into the gasoline.

R70-940-8. Fuel Shortage.

- The Commissioner of Agriculture and Food may waive the standard in R70-940-2(C)for a county if there is sufficient evidence that a motor fuel shortage is imminent and the standard is determined to be a primary cause.]
- (1) Promulgated and enforced by authorities outlined in Utah Code, Title 4 Chapter 33 Motor Fuel Inspection Act.
- (2) Scope: This rule establishes motor fuel performance specifications and monitoring standards to ensure consumer confidence in fuel quality.

R70-940-2. Standards.

- (1) Gasoline and gasoline-ethanol blends shall have a minimum Anti-Knock Index (AKI) of 85.
- (2) The Department adopts by reference motor fuel regulations outlined in the 2017 version of NIST Handbook 130; "Uniform Laws and Regulations in the area of legal metrology and engine fuel quality", Chapter IV, Part G, "Uniform Engine Fuels and Automotive Lubricants Regulation" with the following exceptions:
- (a) Section 2.1.1, the Department adopts ASTM specification D4814-17, "Standard Specification for Automotive Spark-Ignition Engine Fuel".

- (b) Section 2.1.2, Gasoline-Ethanol blends shall not exceed ASTM D4814-17 Table 1 vapor pressure limits by more than:
- (i) 1.0 psi, when gasoline-ethanol blends contain nine to ten volume percent ethanol from June 1st through Sept 15th.
- (ii) 1.0 psi, when gasoline-ethanol blends contain one up to and including fifteen volume percent ethanol for volatility classes A, B, C, and D from September 16th through May 31st.
- (iii) 0.5 psi, for gasoline-ethanol blends containing one up to and including fifteen volume percent ethanol for volatility class E from September 16th through May 31st.
- (iv) Vapor pressure exceptions will remain in effect until. ASTM incorporates changes to the vapor pressure maximums for gasoline-ethanol blends.
- (c) Section 2.2, the Department adopts by reference ASTM D975-17 "Standard Specification for Diesel Fuel Oils".
- (d) Section 4.4.2, If the standard color code is adopted, no color key posting is required

R70-940-3. Storage Tank Preparation.

- (1) Retail storage tanks and equipment must be cleaned and purged prior to first introduction of fuel meant for sale or,
- (2) Purged when switching from one type or grade of fuel to another.
- (3) Access to the bottom of a retail storage tank shall remain unobstructed such that any phase separated water content may be measured or detected from the fill connection.

R70-940-4. Certification, Documentation, and Labeling.

- (1) Certification and documentation of motor fuels shall be made in accordance with 16CFR Part 306, "Automotive Fuel Ratings, Certification, and Posting".
- (2) Labeling shall be regulated in accordance with requirements in the 2017 version of NIST Handbook 130; "Uniform Laws and Regulations in the area of legal metrology and engine fuel quality", Chapter IV, Part G, "Uniform Engine Fuels and Automotive Lubricants Regulation".

Requirements for a Satellite Service Operation

NOTICE OF PROPOSED RULE

RULE ANALYSIS

PURPOSE OF THE RULE OR REASON FOR THE CHANGE: The purpose of this amendment is to allow for healthcare corporations, that own more than one licensed hospital in Utah, to have up to two satellite freestanding emergency departments attached to one hospital, but not to exceed the number of licensed hospitals the healthcare corporation owns. The Health Facility Committee reviewed and approved this rule amendment on 11/08/2017.

SUMMARY OF THE RULE OR CHANGE: The purpose of this amendment is to allow for healthcare corporations, that own more than one licensed hospital in Utah, to have up to two satellite freestanding emergency departments attached to one hospital, but not to exceed the number of licensed hospitals the healthcare corporation owns.

STATUTORY OR CONSTITUTIONAL AUTHORIZATION FOR THIS RULE: Title 26, Chapter 21

ANTICIPATED COST OR SAVINGS TO:

- ♦ THE STATE BUDGET: State government hospital licensing process was thoroughly reviewed. This proposed rule amendment will not change how many total satellite emergency departments can be licensed in Utah, therefore, the proposed rule amendment is not expected to impact state revenues or expenditures.
- ♦ LOCAL GOVERNMENTS: Local governments city business licensing requirements were considered. This proposed rule amendment will not change how many total satellite emergency departments can be licensed in Utah, therefore, the proposed rule is not expected to impact local government's revenues or expenditures.
- ♦ SMALL BUSINESSES: After conducting a thorough analysis, it was determined that this proposed rule amendment will not result in a fiscal impact to small businesses budgets because all licensed hospitals in Utah employ more than 50 people.
- PERSONS OTHER THAN SMALL BUSINESSES, BUSINESSES, OR LOCAL GOVERNMENTAL ENTITIES: This rule amendment could lead to a benefit for healthcare corporations that own more than one licensed hospital as it may provide greater flexibility as to the placement of satellite emergency departments, however, with all the variables, this is an inestimable benefit. Individuals in need of emergency department services may benefit from having a satellite emergency department in their area. This possibly could lead to better outcomes from serious emergency health issues which may lead to lower health costs in the future, however, with all the variables, this is an inestimable benefit. There would be no anticipated increased cost for health insurance companies. Appendix 3: Regulatory Impact to Non-Small Businesses

Businesses, individuals, local governments, and persons that are not small businesses: This rule amendment could lead to benefit for healthcare corporations that own more than one licensed hospital as it may provide greater flexibility as to the placement of satellite emergency departments however with all the variables this is an inestimable benefit. Individuals in need of emergency department services may benefit from having a satellite emergency department in their area. This possibly could lead to better outcomes from serious emergency health issues which may lead to lower health cost in future however with all the variables this is an inestimable benefit. There would be no anticipated increased cost for health insurance companies. Better outcomes from serious emergency health issues may lead to lower cost for health insurance companies in future, however, with all the variables, this also is an inestimable benefit.

Historically in Utah, there have only been 3 or 4 licensed satellite emergency departments and the long term plan for each was to eventually build a hospital and absorb the emergency department into the new hospital.

R432. Health, Family Health and Preparedness, Licensing.

R432-2. General Licensing Provisions.

R432-2-5. Requirements for a Satellite Service Operation.

- (1) A "satellite operation" is a health care treatment service that:
- (a) is administered by a parent facility within the scope of the parent facility's current license,
- (b) is located further than 250 yards from the licensed facility or other areas determined by the department to be a part of the provider's campus,
 - (c) does not qualify for licensing under Section 26-21-2, and
- (d) is approved by the Department for inclusion under the parent facility's license and identified as a remote service.
- (2) A licensed health care facility that wishes to offer a satellite operation shall submit for Department review a program narrative and one set of construction drawings. The program narrative shall define at least the following:

Small Businesses

- (a) location of the remote facility (street address);
- (b) capacity of the remote facility;
- (c) license category of the parent facility;
- (d) service to be provided at the remote facility (must be a service authorized under the parent facility license);
- (e) ancillary administrative and support services to be provided at the remote facility; and
- (f) International Building Code occupancy classification of the remote facility physical structure.
- (3) Upon receipt of the satellite service program narrative and construction drawings, the Department shall make a determination of the applicable licensing requirements including the need for licensing the service. The Department shall verify at least the following items:
- (a) There is only a single health care treatment service provided at the remote site and that it falls within the scope of the parent facility license;
- (b) The remote facility physical structure complies with all construction codes appropriate for the service provided;
- (c) All necessary administrative and support services for the specified treatment service are available, on a continuous basis during the hours of operation, to insure the health, safety, and welfare of the clients.
- (4) If a facility qualifies as a single satellite service treatment center the Department shall issue a separate license identifying the facility as a "satellite service" of the licensed parent facility. This license shall be subject to all requirements set forth in R432-2 of the Health Facility Rules.
- (5) A parent facility that wishes to offer more than one health care service at the same remote site shall either obtain a satellite service license for each service offered as described above or obtain a license for the remote complex as a free-standing health care facility.
- (6) A satellite facility is not permitted within the confines of another licensed health care facility.
- (7) A licensed hospital is limited to one emergency department satellite location. <u>If a healthcare corporation owns and</u> operates more than one hospital in the State of Utah;
- (a) it may have up to two emergency department satellite locations associated with a licensed hospital; and
- (b) the health care corporation's total number of emergency department satellite locations may not exceed the total number of licensed hospitals it owns and operates in the State of Utah.

 - (a) occupancy of a new facility;
 - (b) change of ownership; or
 - (c) change in license category.
- (2) Before the Department may issue a [new]change of ownership license, the prospective licensee shall provide documentation that:

- (a) all patient care records, personnel records, staffing schedules, quality assurance committee minutes, in-service program records, and other documents required by applicable rules remain in the facility and have been transferred to the custody of the new licensee.
- (b) the existing policy and procedures manual or a new manual has been adopted by the facility governing body before change of ownership occurs.
- (c) new contracts for professional or other services not provided directly by the facility have been secured.
 - (d) new transfer agreements have been drafted and signed.
- (e) written documentation exists of clear ownership or lease of the facility by the new owner.
- ([3]1) [Upon sale or other transfer of ownership,]the licensee shall provide the new owner with a written accounting, prepared by an independent certified public accountant, of all patient funds being transferred, and obtain a written receipt for those funds from the new owner.
- (g) Nursing Care and Small Health Care Facilities shall provide a certificate from the Division of Medicaid and Health Financing's Bureau of Financial Services noting the current owner has no outstanding monies owed to the division.
- ([4]3) A prospective licensee is responsible for all uncorrected rule violations and deficiencies including any current plan of correction submitted by the previous licensee unless a revised plan of correction, approved by the Department, is submitted by the prospective licensee before the change of ownership becomes effective.
- ([5]4) If a license is issued to the new owner the previous licensee shall return his license to the Department within five days of the new owner's receipt of the license.
- ([6]5) Upon verification that the facility is in compliance with all applicable licensing rules, the Department shall issue a new license effective the date compliance is determined as required by R432-2-9.

R495. Human Services, Administration. R495-885. Employee Background Screenings. R495-885-1. Authority and Purpose.

(1) This Rule is authorized by Sections 62A-1-118 and 62A-2-120.

- (2) This Rule clarifies the standards for Department of Human Services' employee and volunteer background screening.
- (3) This Rule is created to hold DHS employees and volunteers to high standards of conduct, protect children and vulnerable adults, and promote public trust.

R495-885-2. Definitions.

- (1) "BCI" means the Bureau of Criminal Identification, and is the designated state agency of the Division of Criminal Investigation and Technical Services Division, within the Department of Public Safety, responsible to maintain criminal records in the State of Utah.
 - (2) "Child" is defined in Section 62A-2-101.
- (3) "Department" or "DHS" means the Department of Human Services.
 - (4) "Direct Access" is defined in Section 62A-2-101.
- (5) "Director" means the Director of each DHS Office or Division, and includes the Director's designee.
 - (6) "Directly Supervised" is defined in 62A-2-101.
- (7) "Employee" means a prospective employee who has received a job offer from DHS or a current employee of DHS, and includes paid interns.
- (8) "Executive Director" means the Executive Director of DHS or the Deputy Director designated by the Executive Director.
 - (9) "FBI rap back" is defined in Section 53-10-108.
- (10) "Fingerprints" means an individual's fingerprints as copied electronically through a live-scan fingerprinting device or on two ten-print fingerprint cards.
- (11) "Volunteer" means an individual who donates services without pay or other compensation, except expenses actually and reasonably incurred and pre-approved by the supervising agency, and includes unpaid interns.
 - (12) "Vulnerable adult" is defined in Section 62A-2-101.

R495-885-3. Employees and Volunteers with Direct Access.

- (1) The Department finds that a criminal history or identification as a perpetrator of abuse or neglect is directly relevant to an individual's employment or volunteer activities within DHS.
- (2) All Department employees and volunteers who may have direct access and who may not be directly supervised at all times must have an annual background screening clearance in accordance with Sections 62A-1-118 and 62A-2-120, which shall include retention of fingerprints by BCI for FBI rap back.
- (3) Department employees and volunteers who may have direct access and may not be directly supervised at all times shall:
- (a) Submit a background screening application to their respective Division or Office on a form created by the Department; and
- (b) Submit fingerprints to the Department via a DHS-operated live-scan machine or;
- two ten-print fingerprint cards produced by a law enforcement agency, an agency approved by the BCI, or another entity pre-approved by the Department
- (c) not be required to submit fingerprints to DHS if they have submitted fingerprints for retention
- (i) to BCI for an Office or Division clearance, and the Office or Division ensures that the minimum standards set forth in Section 62A-2-120 are enforced; or
- (ii) to the Department of Health for employees and volunteers of the Utah State Developmental Center per code, or

- (iii) to the Office of Licensing as an individual associated with a license as long as the fingerprints are retained by BCI for FBI rap back.
- (4) The DHS Office of Licensing shall access information to perform the background checks described in Sections 62A-1-118 and 62A-2-120.
- (a) The DHS Office of Licensing will not duplicate fingerprint-based criminal background checks on Department employees or volunteers who have a current fingerprint-based criminal background clearance pursuant to R495-885-3(3).
- (b) The fingerprints submitted by DHS employees who are required to obtain a background screening pursuant to Section 62A-2-120 as an individual associated with a licensee shall be utilized to perform the screening required by this R495-885. Screening results shall be reviewed in accordance with both the standards required by Section 62A-2-120 and this R495-885.
- (5) Except as described in R495-885-5, Department employees and volunteers who would automatically be denied a background screening approval as described in Section 62A-2-120(5) (a) are not eligible for work with the Department.
- (6) Except as described in R495-885-5, Department employees and volunteers who have any offense or finding described in Section 62A-2-120(6)(a) are not eligible for work with the Department.
- (7) Each Division and Office shall develop and implement a protocol to ensure renewal background screening applications are submitted to the DHS Office of Licensing annually for all database systems that are not included in the FBI rap back fingerprint process.

R495-885-4. Employees and Volunteers with No Direct Access.

- (1) The Department finds that a criminal history is directly relevant to an individual's employment activities within DHS.
- (2) The Department is not authorized to perform the checks described in Sections 62A-1-118 and 62A-2-120 for employees with no direct access.
- (3) Each Division and Office will identify which of their positions includes no potential for direct access that is not directly supervised.
- (4) Each employee who does not potentially have direct access shall submit an "Authorization and Waiver for Criminal History Check" form to a Department of Human Resources Management, DHS Field Office authorizing DHRM to perform name-based background checks.
- (5) Except as described in R495-885-5, Department employees who would automatically be denied a background screening approval based upon the offenses described in Section 62A-2-120(5)(a) are not eligible for work with the Department.
- (6) Except as described in R495-885-5, Department employees who have any offense described in Section 62A-2-120(6) (a) are not eligible for work with the Department.
- (7) Volunteers who do not have a background screening clearance pursuant to R495-885-3 will be directly supervised.

R495-885-5. Background Screening Review.

(1) The Office of Licensing or the Department of Human Resources Management, DHS Field Office shall notify the Director of the background screening results of each prospective employee, employee, and volunteer.

- (2) The Director shall review the background screening results of each prospective employee, employee, and volunteer.
- (3) Review criteria for prospective or probationary employees and volunteers:
- (a) Automatic denial offenses outlined in 62A-2-120(5)(a) are not eligible for review by the DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee:
- (b) The Director has sole discretion to determine whether to deny employment or refer a prospective or probationary employee or volunteer with the following background screening findings to the DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee:
 - (i) All other circumstances outlined in 62A-2-120(6)(a), or
- (ii) any MIS supported or substantiated findings (for individuals with direct access only)
- (c) The determinations of the Director and the DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee are final, and a prospective or probationary employee or volunteer has no right to appeal.
 - (4) Review process for non-probationary employees:
- (a) The following background screening findings shall be submitted to the Director:
 - (i) Automatic denial offenses outlined in 62A-2-120(5)(a),
 - (ii) All other circumstances outlined in 62A-2-120(6)(a), or
 - (iii) any MIS supported or substantiated findings.
- (b) The Director may consult with the Executive Director and/or the Office of Licensing, and shall evaluate whether the non-probationary employee may present a risk of harm to a child or vulnerable adult or does not meet DHS high standards of conduct or promote public trust.
- (c) The Executive Director may, in his/her sole discretion, approve the non-probationary employee for continued employment, including defining permissible and impermissible DHS-wide work-related activities, or consult the Department of Human Resource Management regarding termination of employment. The determination of the Executive Director is final.

R495-885-6. DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee.

- (1) The Director of the following Department divisions and offices shall appoint one member and one alternate to serve on the DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee:
 - (a) the Executive Director's Office;
 - (b) the Division of Aging and Adult Services;
 - (c) the Division of Child and Family Services;
 - (d) the Division of Juvenile Justice Services;
 - (e) the Division of Services for People with Disabilities;
 - (f) the Division of Substance Abuse and Mental Health;
 - (g) the Office of the Public Guardian; and
 - (i) the Office of Licensing.
- (2) DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee members and alternates shall be professional staff persons who are familiar with the programs they represent.
- (3) The appointed Office of Licensing member shall chair the DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee as a non-voting member.
 - (4) [Five]Four voting members shall constitute a quorum.
- (5) The DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee shall conduct a comprehensive review of a

prospective or probationary employee or volunteer's background screening application, criminal history records, abuse, neglect or exploitation records, and related circumstances, in accordance with Section 62A-2-120(6).

R495-885-7. DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Process.

- (1) The Office or Division may inform the prospective or probationary employee or volunteer that the results of a background screening indicate they have a criminal history or supported or substantiated findings of abuse or neglect, and the employee or volunteer may:
- (a) voluntarily withdraw a pending employment or volunteer application;
 - (b) voluntarily terminate probationary employment; or
- (c) request further review and submit any written statements or records that the employee or volunteer wants the DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee to consider, including but not limited to non-redacted documents relating to the results, the nature and seriousness of the offense or incident; the circumstances under which the offense or incident occurred; the age of the employee or volunteer when the offense or incident occurred; whether the offense or incident was an isolated or repeated incident; whether the offense or incident directly relates to abuse of a child or vulnerable adult, evidence of rehabilitation, counseling, psychiatric treatment received, or additional academic or vocational schooling completed.
- (i) an employee or volunteer who wants the DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee to consider documents relating to the screening results shall submit the documents to the Office or Division within 15 calendar days of notification by the Office of Division.
- (2) The Office or Division shall gather information from a prospective or probationary employee or volunteer who requests review and submit it to the DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee.
- (a) The Division may redact any personally identifying information of the prospective or probationary employee or volunteer that does not compromise the content of the review.
- (3) The DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee shall evaluate the information provided by the Office or Division and any information provided by the prospective or probationary employee or volunteer. The DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee shall consider:

the date of the offense or incident;

- (a) the nature and seriousness of the offense or incident;
- (b) the circumstances under which the offense or incident occurred;
- (c) the age of prospective or probationary employee or volunteer when the offense or incident occurred;
- (d) whether the offense or incident was an isolated or repeated incident;
- (e) whether the offense or incident directly relates to abuse of a child or vulnerable adult,
- (f) whether approval would likely create a risk of harm to a child or a vulnerable adult;
- (g) whether the information may be relevant to the employment or volunteer activities of that person;

- (h) whether the relevant information should be relied upon to deny employment or volunteer activities, and
- (i) that the background screening approval may be transferred to other DHS Offices or Divisions.
- (4) The DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee may approve the background screening of a prospective or probationary employee or volunteer only after a simple majority of the voting members of the DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee determines that approval will not likely create a risk of harm to a child or vulnerable adult or the prospective employee does not meet DHS high standards of conduct or promote public trust, and identify permissible and impermissible DHS-wide work-related activities.
- (5) The DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee shall recommend denial of the background screening of a prospective or probationary employee or volunteer when it finds that approval will likely create a risk of harm to a child or vulnerable adult in any DHS Office or Division or the prospective or probationary employee or volunteer does not meet DHS high standards of conduct or promote public trust.
- (6) Except as described below, a prospective employee or a volunteer whose background screening has been denied shall not be accepted as a volunteer or hired as an employee. A probationary employee whose background screening has been denied shall have no direct access and employment shall be terminated.
- (a) A Director may, in his/her sole discretion, appeal the decision of the DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee to the Executive Director.

R495-885-8. Division/Office Responsibilities.

- (1) The Department shall notify the DHS Office of Licensing within five months of the termination of each employee for whom fingerprints have been retained under Section 62A-2-120 to enable the Office of Licensing to notify BCI and ensure the destruction of fingerprints.
- (2) Each Division and Office shall ensure that an employee or volunteer who previously was screened based upon having no direct access shall, prior to having any direct access, be screened and approved in accordance with R495-885.

R495-885-9. Compliance.

RULE ANALYSIS

PURPOSE OF THE RULE OR REASON FOR THE CHANGE: During the 2017 General Session, H.B. 51 was passed. This was an overall cleanup bill of the Title 41, Chapter 22. This title and chapter have not been cleaned up since 1987. H.B. 51 (2017) removed items that were no longer valid and added language for laws in existing code sections. Section 41-22-33 currently reads: "(1) A fee set by the board in accordance with Section 63J-1-504 shall be added to the registration fee required to register an offhighway vehicle under Section 41-2-8 to help fund the offhighway vehicle safety and education program." The Division of Motor Vehicles is currently collecting a \$2 fee, for the Division of Utah State Parks and Recreation's off-highway vehicles (OHV) safety and education program. amendment brings the Division of Parks and Recreation into compliance with Section 41-22-33.

SUMMARY OF THE RULE OR CHANGE: Annual OHV registration fees are currently set at \$18 per off-highway motorcycles (OHM), Type I and Type II OHV's and \$22 per snowmobile registration. In addition to the registration fee, several additional fees are charged including \$1.50 to the School and Institutional Trust Lands Administration (SITLA) for OHV impacts to Trust Lands, \$1 Division of Motor Vehicle (DMV) electronic fee, \$4 DMV sticker fee, \$1 Utah Highway Patrol (UHP) Aero Bureau and a \$0.50 Search and Rescue fee. OHV owners must also pay an age-based fee in lieu of property tax assessment to their county of residence prior to registering an OHV. With the passing of H.B. 51, making these changes would bring the Division of Parks and Recreation into compliance with Section 41-22-33.

STATUTORY OR CONSTITUTIONAL AUTHORIZATION FOR THIS RULE: Section 41-22-8

ANTICIPATED COST OR SAVINGS TO:

- ♦ THE STATE BUDGET: There is no anticipated cost or savings to the state budget. The DMV was already collecting a \$2 fee. This was a cleanup amendment from H.B. 51 (2017) and brings the Division of Parks and Recreation into compliance with Section 41-22-33.
- ♦ LOCAL GOVERNMENTS: There is no anticipated cost or savings to local governments. This does not affect local governments as it was part of the cleanup of Section 41-22-33 per H.B. 51 (2017).
- ♦ SMALL BUSINESSES: There is no anticipated cost or savings to small businesses. This was a cleanup for H.B. 51 (2017) for Section 41-22-33.
- ♦ PERSONS OTHER THAN SMALL BUSINESSES, BUSINESSES, OR LOCAL GOVERNMENTAL ENTITIES: There is no anticipated cost or savings to persons other than small businesses, businesses, or local government entities.

This was part of H.B. 51 (2017) which is a cleanup of Section 41-22-33. The fee was previously being collected by the DMV.

COMPLIANCE COSTS FOR AFFECTED PERSONS: The \$2 fee has previously been being collected by the DMV, so the compliance costs are not new. This amendment was part of a cleanup for Section 41-22-33 from H.B. 51 (2017).

RULE ANALYSIS

PURPOSE OF THE RULE OR REASON FOR THE CHANGE: During the 2017 General Session, the Utah Legislature enacted S.B. 130 which made numerous changes to the laws governing the Utah Universal Service Fund (UUSF). This rule filing represents the third round of rulemaking the Public Service Commission (PSC) has engaged in to fully implement the legislation. This filing will create a new Rule R746-8 that will replace three existing rules that are being simultaneously filed for repeal: Rules R746-341, R746-343, and R746-360. The PSC began a stakeholder process by issuing a draft rule for informal comment in July 2017. The PSC received and considered all of the comments received in that informal process before initiating this rulemaking process. All of those comments, including additional explanation of this rule filing by the PSC, are available at this website:

https://psc.utah.gov/2017/07/06/docket-no-17-r008-01/.

SUMMARY OF THE RULE OR CHANGE: In conjunction with the separately filed repeals for Rules R746-341, R746-343, and R746-360, this rule enacts the necessary provisions of those rules while making changes to update the rules to be consistent with S.B. 130 (2017). This rule provides updated definitions to be consistent with both state and federal law governing universal service. This rule reenacts current rule language regarding the contribution method for the UUSF, adding new provisions clarifying that prepaid wireless providers are not required to submit more than one surcharge per access line per month, and establishing reporting requirements for exemptions claimed. This rule allows providers to remit assessments every six months, instead of every month, if assessments total less than \$1,000 per This rule implements references to statutory requirements enacted by S.B. 130 for UUSF distributions. This rule establishes procedures for wireless eligible telecommunications providers to receive distributions from the Lifeline program, as provided for in S.B. 130. This rule reenacts, without modification, the existing rules governing UUSF support for a deaf, hard of hearing, or severely speech impaired person. (EDITOR'S NOTE: The proposed repeal of Rule R746-341 is under Filing No. 42423, the proposed repeal of Rule R746-343 is under Filing No. 42425, and the

proposed repeal of Rule R746-360 is under Filing No. 42426 in this issue, January 15, 2018, of the Bulletin.)

STATUTORY OR CONSTITUTIONAL AUTHORIZATION FOR THIS RULE: Section 54-3-1 and Section 54-4-1 and Section 54-8b-10 and Section 54-8b-15

ANTICIPATED COST OR SAVINGS TO:

- ♦ THE STATE BUDGET: None--The PSC and the Division of Public Utilities are already administering the UUSF programs. These changes, in conjunction with the changes made by S.B. 130 (2017), did not increase the costs to those two agencies to administer the UUSF programs.
- ♦ LOCAL GOVERNMENTS: None--Local governments do not pay into, or receive distributions from, any UUSF programs. Local governments do not play any role in administering any UUSF programs.
- ♦ SMALL BUSINESSES: This rule may provide financial benefit to some small businesses. Some providers of telecommunications service will be eligible for UUSF low-income Lifeline disbursements where they were not eligible for those disbursements before. This rule does not impact UUSF surcharge amounts, but simply reenacts already existing rule language relating to the surcharge pursuant to S.B. 130 (2017). The provision allowing UUSF remittances every six months instead of monthly, in some instances, should reduce UUSF compliance costs for some telecommunications providers.

Appendix 2: Regulatory Impact to Non-Small Businesses

This newly enacted rule, accompanied by three rule repeals may result in some cost benefit to businesses, but that potential benefit is impossible to calculate in advance of the rule's effectiveness. Some of the streamlined compliance procedures, such as less frequent submissions to the Utah Universal Service Fund for telecommunications providers whose monthly submissions are less than \$1,000, and the elimination of some monthly and semi-annual reports, should ease compliance burdens. It is impossible to know who will qualify for those provisions and how that eased burden might translate into operational savings.

Additionally, some customers of telecommunications service who are not currently eligible for the \$3.50 monthly Lifeline distribution will become eligible under this rule. It is impossible to calculate how many customers will become eligible.

Additionally, it is impossible to predict the extent to which telecommunications providers will made adjustments to rate plans in connection with that new eligibility. Providers will be required to show that the customers receive a benefit from the distribution, but each provider has discretion to provide that benefit in different ways.

R746. Public Service Commission, Administration.

R746-8. Utah Universal Public Telecommunications Service Support Fund (UUSF).

R746-8-100. Authority, Purpose, and Organization.

- (1) This rule is adopted under:
- (a) Utah Code Section 54-8b-10; and
- (b) Utah Code Section 54-8b-15.
- (2) This rule:
- (a) governs the methods, practices, and procedures by which:
 - (b) the UUSF is created, maintained, and funded; and
- (c) funds are disbursed from the UUSF to qualifying access line providers.
 - (3) This rule is organized into the following Parts:
 - (a) Part 100: Authority, Purpose and Organization;
 - (b) Part 200: Definitions;
 - (c) Part 300: UUSF Funding; and
 - (d) Part 400: UUSF Distributions.

R746-8-200. Definitions.

- (1)(a) "Access line" is defined at Utah Code Subsection 54-8b-2(1), and is used in this rule, R746-8, to the extent consistent with federal law.
- (b) For purposes of applying the statutory definition of "access line," the term "connection" is defined at Utah Code Subsection 54-8b-15(1) and is used in this rule, R746-8, to the extent consistent with federal law.
- (c)(i) Providers of access lines and functionally equivalent connections are hereafter referred to jointly as "providers."
- (ii) Access lines and connections are hereafter referred to jointly as "access line" or "access lines."
- (2)(a) "Affordable base rate" or "ABR" means the monthly retail rate that a rate-of-return regulated provider is required to charge on a per-access line basis in order to receive ongoing disbursements from the UUSF.
- (b) "Affordable base rate" may include, if itemized in the provider's Commission-approved tariff.
 - (i) the applicable UUSF surcharge;
 - (ii) mandatory extended area service fees; or
 - (iii) state subscriber line fees.
 - (c) "Affordable base rate" does not include:
 - (i) municipal franchise fee(s):
 - (ii) tax(es); or
- (iii) any incidental surcharge(s) other than those identified in R746-8-200(2)(b):
 - (A) included in a Commission-approved tariff; or
 - (B) authorized under these rules.
- (3) "Broadband internet access service" is defined at Utah Code Subsection 54-8b-15(1).
- (4) "Carrier of last resort" is defined at Utah Code Subsection 54-8b-15(1).
- (5) "Eligible telecommunications carrier" or "ETC" means a provider that, if seeking to participate in the state Lifeline program:
- (a) is designated as an eligible telecommunications carrier by the commission in accordance with 47 U.S.C. Section 214(e); or
- (b) is designated by the FCC as a Lifeline Broadband Provider (LBP).
- (6) "Designated support area" means the geographic area used to determine a provider's UUSF support distribution, including, at a minimum, the provider's entire certificated service territory located in the State of Utah.
- _____(7) The acronym "FCC" means the Federal Communications Commission.
 - (8) "Facilities-based provider" means a provider that uses:
 - (a) its own facilities;
- (b) essential facilities or unbundled network elements obtained from another provider; or
- (c) a combination of its own facilities and essential facilities or unbundled network elements obtained from another provider.
- (9)(a) "Household" means any individual or group of individuals living together at the same address as one economic unit.
- (b) "Economic unit" means all adult individuals contributing to and sharing in the income and expenses of a household.
- (10) "Lifeline subscriber" means an individual who qualifies for state subsidization of an access line through participation in a program for low-income individuals that is recognized by the FCC.

- (11) "Non-rate-of-return regulated" is defined at Utah Code Subsection 54-8b-15(1).
- (12) "Rate-of-return regulated" is defined at Utah Code Subsection 54-8b-15(1).
- (13) "Wholesale broadband internet access service" is defined at Utah Code Subsection 54-8b-15(1).

R746-8-300. UUSF Funding.

The following sections in the 300 series address UUSF Funding.

R746-8-301. Calculation and Application of UUSF Surcharge.

- (1) The Utah Universal Public Telecommunications
 Service Support Fund (UUSF) shall be funded as follows:
- (a) Unless Subsection R746-8-301(3) applies, providers shall remit to the Commission \$0.36 per month per access line that, as of the last calendar day of each month, has a place of primary use in Utah in accordance with the Mobile Telecommunications Sourcing Act, 4 U.S.C. Sec. 116 et seq.
- (b)(i) "Place of primary use" means the street address representative of where the customer's use of the telecommunications service primarily occurs.
- (ii) A provider of mobile telecommunications service shall consider the customer's place of primary use to be the customer's residential street address or primary business street address.
- (iii) A provider of non-mobile telecommunications service shall consider the customer's place of primary use to be:
- (A) the customer's residential street address or primary business street address; or
 - (B) the customer's registered location for 911 purposes.
 - (c) A provider may collect the surcharge:
 - (i) as an explicit charge to each end-user; or
- (ii) through inclusion of the surcharge within the enduser's rate plan.
- (d) A provider that offers a multi-line service shall apply the surcharge to each concurrent real-time voice communication call session that an end-user can place to or receive from the public switched telephone network.
- (e)(i) A provider that offers prepaid access lines or connections that permit access to the public telephone network shall remit to the Commission \$0.36 per month per access line for such service (new access lines or connections, or recharges for existing lines or connections) purchased on or after January 1, 2018.
- (ii) Subsection R746-8-301(1)(e)(i) operates in lieu of Subsection R746-8-301(1)(a) in that a provider who is required to make a remittance for an access line under Subsection R746-8-301(1)(e)(i) is not required to make an additional remittance for the same access line under Subsection R746-8-301(1)(a).
- (iii)(A) Multiple recharges of a single prepaid access line during a single month do not trigger multiple remittance requirements.
- (B) \$0.36 per month is both the maximum and minimum amount of remittance necessary for any single access line.
- (2)(a) A provider shall remit to the Commission no less than 98.69 percent of its total monthly surcharge collections.
- (b) A provider may retain a maximum of 1.31 percent of its total monthly surcharge collections to offset the costs of administering this rule.

- (3)(a) Subject to Subsection R746-8-301(3)(b), a provider may omit the UUSF surcharge with respect to an access line that is described in Subsection R746-8-301(1), and:
- (i) generates revenue that is subject to a universal service fund surcharge in a state other than Utah for the relevant month for which the provider omits the UUSF surcharge; or
- (ii) for the relevant month for which the provider omits the UUSF surcharge, was not used to access Utah intrastate telecommunications services.
- (b) A provider that omits any UUSF surcharge pursuant to Subsection R746-8-301(3)(a) shall:
- (i) maintain documentation for at least 36 months that the omission complied with Subsection R746-8-301(3)(a); and
- (ii) consent to any audit of the documentation requested by the:
 - (A) Commission; or
 - (B) Division of Public Utilities.
- (c) A provider who omits any UUSF surcharge pursuant to Subsection R746-8-301(3)(a) shall report monthly to the Division of Public Utilities, using a method approved by the Division, the number of omissions claimed pursuant to each Subsection R746-8-301(3)(a)(i) and R746-8-301(3)(a)(ii).

R746-8-302. UUSF Surcharge Remittances.

- <u>Providers shall remit surcharge assessments to the Commission as follows:</u>
- (1) If, over a period of six months, the average monthly UUSF surcharge assessments total \$1,000 or more, the provider shall remit the funds:
 - (a) on a monthly basis; and
 - (b) within 45 days of the last calendar day of each month.
- (2) If, over a period of six months, the average UUSF surcharge assessments are less than \$1,000 per month, the provider shall accrue the UUSF surcharge assessments and submit the accrued assessments every six months.

R746-8-400. UUSF Distributions.

The following sections in the 400 series address UUSF Distributions.

R746-8-401. Rate-of-Return Regulated Providers.

- (1) A rate-of-return regulated provider is eligible for ongoing UUSF support pursuant to Utah Code Section 54-8b-15 if the provider:
 - (a) is a carrier of last resort;
 - (b) is in compliance with Commission orders and rules;
- (c) unless a petition brought pursuant to Subsection R746-8-401(2) is granted after adjudication, charges, at a minimum, \$18 per access line;
- (d) offers Lifeline service on terms and conditions prescribed by the Commission;
 - (e) operates as a facilities-based provider, not a reseller; and
- (f) in compliance with R746-8-401(3), demonstrates through an adjudicative proceeding that its costs as established in Utah Code Section 54-8b-15 exceed its revenues as established in Utah Code Section 54-8b-15.
- (2)(a) A rate-of-return regulated provider may petition the Commission to deviate from the affordable base rate set forth in Subsection R746-8-401(1)(c).

- (b) A rate-of-return regulated provider that files a petition to deviate from the affordable base rate shall:
- (i) demonstrate that the affordable base rate is not reasonable in the provider's designated support area; or
- (ii) impute income up to the affordable base rate in calculating the provider's UUSF disbursement.
- (3) The calculation of a rate-of-return regulated provider's ongoing UUSF distribution shall conform to the following standards:
- (a) The provider's state rate-of-return shall be equal to the weighted average cost of capital rate-of-return prescribed by the FCC for rate-of-return regulated carriers, as of the date of the provider's application for support, and as follows:
 - (A) beginning July 1, 2016: 11.0%
 - (B) beginning July 1, 2017: 10.75%;
 - (C) beginning July 1, 2018: 10.5%;
 - (D) beginning July 1, 2019, 10.25%;
 - (E) beginning July 1, 2020, 10.0%; and
 - (F) beginning July 1, 2021, 9.75%.
- (b) The provider's depreciation costs shall be calculated as established in Utah Code Section 54-8b-15.
- (4) Yearly following a change in the FCC rate-of-return, unless the provider files with the Commission a petition for review of its UUSF disbursement, the Division shall make a recommendation of whether each provider's monthly distribution should be adjusted according to:
- (a) the current FCC rate-of-return as set forth in R746-8-401(3)(a); and
- (b) the provider's financial information from its last Annual Report filed with the Commission.

R746-8-402. Non-rate-of-return Regulated Providers.

- (1) A non-rate-of-return regulated provider may be eligible for ongoing UUSF support for the deployment and management of networks capable of providing access lines, connections, or broadband internet access, upon application to the Commission, if the provider:
 - (a) is a carrier of last resort; and
 - (b) is in compliance with Commission orders and rules.
- (2) Upon receipt of an application brought under R746-8-402, the Commission shall establish the appropriate criteria for the entitlement to, and the disbursement of, UUSF funds to non-rate-of-return regulated providers.

R746-8-403. Lifeline Support.

- (1) In addition to any disbursement calculated under R746-8-401 or R746-8-402, an ETC may receive an ongoing distribution through ongoing participation in a Commission-approved Lifeline program upon a specific finding of public interest by the Commission.
- (2)(a) The support claimed under this Subsection R746-8-403 may not exceed \$3.50 per Lifeline subscriber per month of subscription to a service that:
- (i)(A) meets FCC broadband Lifeline requirements as set forth in 47 C.F.R. 54.408; and
- (B) for wireless Lifeline, allows, at no charge beyond the basic monthly fee, unlimited texting and at least 750 voice minutes per month; or
- (ii)(A) meets FCC broadband Lifeline requirements as set forth in 47 C.F.R. 54.408; and
 - (B) does not include a voice component.

- (b) Lifeline distributions will be based on eligible Lifeline subscribers as of the first day of each month, with no prorated discounts.
- (3) An ETC that is approved to participate in the Commission Lifeline program shall:
- (a) provide potential Lifeline subscribers with application materials and information;
- (b) provide service to any customer who is verified as eligible for participation through:
 - (i) the FCC's national verifier system; or
- (ii) if the FCC's national verifier system is not yet operational, the program administrator with which the Commission contracts to administer the initial and continued eligibility verification of state Lifeline participants;
 - (c) waive, for Lifeline subscribers, the following charges:
- (i) customer security deposits, if the customer voluntarily elects to receive toll blocking; and
- (ii) within any 12-month period, the first nonrecurring service charge for:
- (A) changing local exchange usage service to Lifeline service; and
- (B) changing from flat rate service to message rate service; and
- (d)(i) add the Lifeline discount to a customer's account within five (5) business days of notification of the customer's eligibility under FCC Lifeline requirements; and;
- (ii) remove the Lifeline discount from a Lifeline subscriber's account within five (5) business days of notification of the Lifeline subscriber's ineligibility under FCC Lifeline requirements; and
- (e) submit to the Division by May 1 of each year, a complete Lifeline subscriber list, as defined by the FCC.
- (4) An ETC participating in the Commission Lifeline program may not:
- (a) disconnect Lifeline telephone service for nonpayment of toll service;
- (b) require a Lifeline subscriber to purchase additional services from the ETC; or
- (c) prohibit a Lifeline subscriber from purchasing additional services from the ETC, unless the participant fails to comply with the ETC's terms and conditions for those additional services.

R746-8-404. One-time UUSF Distribution.

A non-rate-of-return regulated carrier of last resort may apply for a one-time UUSF distribution pursuant to Utah Code Subsection 54-8b-15(3)(d).

R746-8-405. UUSF Support for Deaf, Hard of Hearing, or Severely Speech Impaired Person.

- (1) This rule governs a program to provide telecommunication devices and services to qualifying deaf, hard of hearing, or severely speech impaired persons
 - (2) Definitions.
 - (a) "Applicant" means a person applying for:
- (i) a telecommunication device for the deaf, hard of hearing, or severely speech impaired;
 - (ii) a signal device; or
 - (iii) another assistive communication device.
 - (b) "Audiologist" means a person who:
 - (i)(A) has a master's or doctoral degree in audiology; or

- (B) is licensed in audiology in Utah; and
- (ii) holds a Certificate of Clinic Competence in Audiology from the American Speech/Language/Hearing Association or its equivalent.
- (c) "Deaf" means hearing loss that requires the use of a TDD to communicate effectively on the telephone.
- (d). "Hard of hearing" means hearing loss that requires use of a TDD to communicate effectively on the telephone.
- (e) "Otolaryngologist" means a licensed physician specializing in ear, nose, and throat medicine.
- (f) "Recipient" means a person who is approved to receive a TDD, signal device, personal communicator, or other assistive communication device.
 - (g) "Speech language pathologist" means a person who:
- (i) has a master's or doctoral degree in Speech Language Pathology; and
- (ii) holds a Certificate of Clinical Competence in Speech/Language Pathology from the American Speech Language Hearing Association or its equivalent.
- (h) "Severely Speech Impaired" means a speech handicap or disorder that renders speech on an ordinary telephone unintelligible.
- (i) "Signal device" means a mechanical device that alerts a deaf, deaf-blind, or hard of hearing person of an incoming telephone call.
- (j) "Telecommunications Device for the Deaf" or "TDD" means an electrical device for use with a telephone that utilizes:
 - (i) a key board;
 - (ii) an acoustic coupler;
 - (iii) a display screen;
 - (iv) a braille display; or
- (v) a tablet device or unlocked cellular telephone that is equipped with applications that allow a user to transmit and receive messages.
 - (3) Eligibility.
 - (a) At a minimum, applicants shall demonstrate that they:
 - (i) live within the State of Utah;
 - (ii) are
 - (A) deaf;
 - (B) hard of hearing; or
 - (C) severely speech impaired;
- (iii) are eligible for assistance under a low-income public assistance program; and
- (iv) are able to send and receive messages with a TDD or other appropriate assistive device.
- (b) Qualification under Subsection R746-8-405(3)(a)(ii) shall be established by the certification of:
 - (i) a person who is licensed to practice medicine;
 - (ii) an audiologist;
 - (iii) an otolaryngologist;
 - (iv) a speech/language pathologist; or
 - (v) qualified personnel within a state agency.
 - (4) Distribution process.
- (a) If approved by the Commission to receive an assistive device, the applicant shall:
- (i) unless Subsection R746-8-405(4)(b) applies, sign an agreement and conditions of acceptance form supplied by the Commission; and
- (ii) report, as instructed by the Commission, for training and receipt of the approved device.

- (b) If the recipient is a minor or is unable to sign the agreement and conditions of acceptance form, the recipient's legal guardian may sign.
 - (5) Ownership and Liability.
- (a)(i) An assistive device provided under this rule remains the property of the State of Utah.
- (ii) A recipient shall not remove an assistive device from the state of Utah for a period of time longer than 90 days unless the recipient obtains the written consent of the Commission.
 - (b) A recipient shall be solely responsible for the costs of:
- (i) repair of an assistive device, other than for normal wear and tear;
 - (ii) replacement of an assistive device;
 - (iii) paper required by an assistive device;
 - (iv) telephone and internet service; and
 - (v) light bulbs required by an assistive device.
- (c) If an assistive device requires repair, the recipient shall return it to the Commission and may not make private arrangements for repair.
- (6) Termination of Use. A recipient, or if applicable, the recipient's guardian, shall return an assistive device to the Commission if the recipient:
 - (a) no longer intends to reside in Utah;
 - (b) becomes ineligible pursuant to R746-8-405(3); or
 - (c) is notified by the Commission to return the device.

R746-8-405a. New Technology Equipment Distribution Program (NTEDP).

- (1) Authority and Purpose.
- (a) This rule section is promulgated pursuant to Utah Code Subsection 54-8b-10(3)(b).
 - (b) The purposes of the NTEDP are:
- (i) to explore the feasibility of using tablet devices and/or unlocked cellular telephones to address the telecommunication needs of the deaf, hard of hearing, and severely speech-impaired communities;
- (ii) to determine how best to manage a program in which tablet devices and/or unlocked cellular telephones are provided; and
- (iii) to determine the level of support services that would be required if tablet devices and/or unlocked cellular telephone devices are provided.
- (2) Duration. The NTEDP shall terminate no later than December 31, 2018.
 - (3) Participation.
- (a) An individual who wishes to participate in the NTEDP shall:
- (i) submit a completed application form to the Relay Utah office;
 - (ii) provide medical documentation of:
 - (A) deafness;
 - (B) hardness of hearing; or
 - (C) severe speech impairment;
- (iii) demonstrate that the individual is receiving assistance from a low-income public assistance program administered by a state agency:
- (iv)(A) if applying for a tablet, certify that the individual has consistent access to a WiFi network; or

- (B) if applying for an unlocked cellular telephone, certify. that the individual has a service plan in place with a wireless telecommunications provider; and
- (v) certify that the individual is able and willing to comply with Subsection (4).
- (b) Priority may be given to applicants who have previously participated in the Commission's Relay Utah program.
- (c) An applicant who is not selected to participate may request to be placed on a waiting list.
 - (d) Participation shall be limited as follows:
- (i) From the inception of the program through June 30, 2017, no more than 25 participants, as follows:
- (A) no more than 8 deaf individuals who are at least 13 years old;
- (B) no more than 8 hard of hearing individuals who are at least 13 years old;
- (C) no more than 8 severely speech impaired individuals who are at least 13 years old; and
- (D) at least one deaf, hard of hearing, or severely speech impaired individual who is under 13 years of age.
- (ii) From July 1, 2017 through the conclusion of the program, up to 10 additional participants in each six-month period.
 - (4) Participant obligations.
- (a) An individual who is chosen to participate in the NTEDP shall:
- (i) participate in an entrance interview with the Relay Utah office;
- (ii) complete online surveys as instructed by the Relay Utah office;
- (iii) promptly comply with all instructions from the Relay Utah office to download apps;
- (iv) promptly respond to requests from the Relay Utah office for information and feedback;
 - (v) maintain the device in the storage case provided;
- (vi) retain all original device packaging, instructions, and information;
- (vii) contact the manufacturer's customer service department for assistance with technical support;
 - (viii) promptly report to the Relay Utah office:
 - (A) software and hardware failures; and
 - (B) damage to the device;
- (ix) take financial responsibility for loss of, or damage to, the device if caused by the individual's misuse or negligence; and
- (x) immediately return the device to the Relay Utah office if the individual:
 - (A) moves from the State of Utah;
- (B) is disqualified by the Relay Utah office from further participation in the NTEDP; or
- (C) chooses to terminate the individual's participation in the NTEDP.
- (b) An individual who is chosen to participate in the NTEDP may not:
 - (i) reformat or attempt to reformat the device;
- (ii) allow any other person to use the device, except as necessary to assist the participant with telecommunications; or
- (iii) install software, apps, or other programs not authorized by the Relay Utah office.

(c) A participant who fails to comply with this Subsection

(4) may be disqualified from further participation in the NTEDP.

(5) All devices distributed as part of the NTEDP shall.

(5) All devices distributed as part of the NTEDP shall remain the property of the State of Utah Public Service Commission.

RULE ANALYSIS

PURPOSE OF THE RULE OR REASON FOR THE CHANGE: During the 2017 General Session, the Utah Legislature enacted S.B. 130 which made numerous changes to the laws governing the Utah Universal Service Fund (UUSF), including the laws governing the Lifeline program. This rule is being repealed in conjunction with a separate filing enacting Rule R746-8, which enacts the necessary Lifeline Program provisions consistent with S.B. 130. (EDITOR'S NOTE: The proposed new Rule R746-8 is under Filing No. 42424 in this issue, January 15, 2018, of the Bulletin.)

SUMMARY OF THE RULE OR CHANGE: Rule R746-341 is repealed in its entirety, and the rules governing the Lifeline program are set forth in the new Rule R746-8 that is filed concurrently with this repeal.

STATUTORY OR CONSTITUTIONAL AUTHORIZATION FOR THIS RULE: Section 54-3-1 and Section 54-4-1 and Section 54-8b-10 and Section 54-8b-15

R746. Public Service Commission, Administration. | R746-341. Lifeline Rule.

R746-341-1. Applicability.

This Rule applies to each telecommunications corporation that is designated as an eligible telecommunications carrier (ETC) by the Commission, pursuant to 47 U.S.C. 214.

R746-341-2. Definitions.

- A. "Account holder" -- means the person responsible to pay the Lifeline account bills.
- B. "Applicant" -- means an ETC's customer, residing in an ETC's service area, who fills out an application for Lifeline service.
- C. "ETC" -- means an eligible telecommunications carrier.
- D. "Federal ETC" -- means an ETC that qualifies for, and participates in, only the federal Lifeline program.
- E. "Federal Poverty Guidelines" -- means the poverty guidelines issued each year by the Department of Health and Human Services and published in the Federal Register.
- F. "Household" -- means a single person or group of individuals who meet the definition of mutual support contained in the federal Lifeline rules established pursuant to 47 U.S.C. 214.
- G. "Income" -- means income as defined in 47 CFR Section 54.400 and includes gross income, whether earned or uncarned, received by all members of the household including, but not limited to, salary before deductions. Income shall not include student financial aid, military housing and cost-of-living allowances, or irregular-income from occasional small jobs.
- H. "Lifeline" -- means either federal or state programsdefined by 47 CFR Section 54.401(a) and this rule.

- I. "NLAD" -- means the National Lifeline Accountability Database as provided for in 47 CFR Section 54.404.
- J. "Participant" -- means an ETC's customer currently-receiving a Lifeline benefit.
- K. "Program administrator" -- means the state government agency with which the Commission contracts to administer the initial eligibility verification and continued eligibility verification, of the State Lifeline participants.
- L. "State ETC" -- means an ETC that participates in both the federal and state Lifeline programs.

R746-341-3. Eligibility Requirements.

- A. Initial Program-Based Criteria -- An ETC shall provide Lifeline telephone service to an applicant's household which, using an approved application form, is verified by either the program-administrator (for State ETCs), or by a federal ETC, in compliance with the procedures set forth in 47 CFR 54.410(e), to be eligible for public assistance under one of the following or its successor programs:
 - -1 Medicaid:
- 2. Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP or Food Stamps);
 - -3. Supplemental Security Income (SSI);
 - 4. Federal Public Housing Assistance (Section 8); or
 - 5. Veterans Pension and Survivors Pension Benefit.
- B. Tribal Residents -- A consumer who lives on Tribal lands is eligible for Lifeline service as a "qualifying low-income consumer" as defined by Section 54.400(a) and as an "eligible resident of Tribal lands" as defined by Section 54.400(e) if that consumer meets the qualifications for Lifeline specified Section A. or if the consumer, one or more of the consumer's dependents, or the consumer's household participates in one of the following Tribal-specific federal assistance programs:
 - Bureau of Indian Affairs General Assistance;
- 2. Tribally-Administered Temporary Assistance for Needy-Families (TTANF);
 - 3. Head Start (if income eligibility criteria are met); or
- 4. Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations-
- C. Initial Income-Based Criteria -- An ETC shall provide Lifeline telephone service to an applicant who certifies via supporting documentation (to either the ETC for federal ETC customers, or the program administrator for state ETC customers), under penalty of perjury, that the applicant's household income is at or below 135-percent of the then applicable Federal Poverty Guidelines.
- 1. Income-based eligibility is based on family size and actual income; therefore, an applicant shall certify, under penalty of perjury, the number of individuals residing in the household.
- 2. An applicant shall certify, under penalty of perjury, that the documentation presented accurately represents the applicant's annual household income. The following documents, or any combination of these documents, are acceptable for Lifeline certification;
 - a. Prior year's state, federal, or tribal tax return;
- b. Current year-to-date earnings statement from anemployer or three consecutive months of paycheck stubs within the previous twelve months;
 - c. Social Security statement of benefits;
 - d. Veterans Administration statement of benefits;
 - e. Retirement/pension statement of benefits;

- f. Unemployment/Workers Compensation statement ofbenefits:
- g. Federal or tribal notice letter of participation in Bureau of Indian Affairs General Assistance; or
- h. Divorce decree or child support wage assignment-statement.
- D. In order to be approved as a qualifying low-incomeeonsumer, an applicant must not already be receiving a Lifelineservice, and there must not be anyone else in the applicant's household subscribed to a Lifeline service.
- E. Eligibility Certification -- The application form for participation shall be supplied by the ETC or the program-administrator and shall be consistent with both the federal requirements, then in effect, and any additional information requirements of the program administrator, and shall include:
- 1. a statement, under penalty of perjury, as to whether the person is participating in one of the programs listed in Subsection-R746-341-3(A) or qualifies under other federal eligibility criteria; or a statement, under penalty of perjury, as to whether the person's-household income is at or below 135 percent of the current Federal-Poverty Guidelines;
- 2. if qualified by income-based criteria, a statement, under penalty of perjury, that identifies the number of individuals residing in the household and affirms that the documentation presented to support eligibility accurately represents the applicant's household income;
- 3. a statement that if the applicant is later shown to have submitted false information in an attempt to qualify for the Lifeline program, the applicant shall be responsible to re-pay the benefits received; and
- 4. the signature of the applicant, either physical or electronic.
- F. False Certification Penalties -- A participant who does not qualify, but who has submitted false documentation or statements to qualify for the Lifeline program, is responsible to re-pay the value of the benefits received to the state Lifeline program, and is subject to whatever penalties are then current for the federal Lifeline program.
- G. Tribal Land Lifeline Discounts This rule does not govern or otherwise affect the Tribal Land Lifeline Discount program.

R746-341-4. Duties of the Program Administrator.

- A. Initial Eligibility
- 1. The program administrator shall process all applications submitted for participation in the state Lifeline telephone service program. The program administrator shall check the NLAD for pre-existing participation if possible. The program administrator shall-inform the applicant and the state ETC of the results of the application process.
- B. Annual Eligibility Verification
- 1. The program administrator shall verify on an annual basis the continuing eligibility status of state ETC Lifeline telephone service participants. The annual eligibility verification shall be performed on the participant list as defined by the FCC in its May 22, 2013 Public Notice in Docket No. 11-42 and any subsequent FCC guidance.
- 2. The annual eligibility verification shall be performed by the program administrator using the same process as outlined in the deenrollment process in R746-341-4.C. and in accordance with 47 CFR Section 54.410(f)(3).

- 3. The program administrator shall provide results of the annual recertification efforts to the ETCs pursuant to 47 CFR Section 54.410(f)(4) and will provide all necessary FCC Form 555 information to ETCs no later than five days prior to the first business day of the anniversary enrollment month of the participant.
 - C. De-Enrollment Process
- 1. The program administrator shall manage the deenrollment process for state ETC Lifeline participants who are nolonger eligible for the program. Upon an initial finding that a Lifeline recipient is no longer eligible to participate in the state the Lifeline program, the program administrator shall send a notice to the participant explaining the participant's Lifeline telephone service-benefit will be discontinued after 60 days unless the participant verifies continuing eligibility before that date. The notice shall include the reason(s) for the recipient being ineligible and a description of the options available to the recipient to demonstrate eligibility.
- 2. At the end of 60 days, if the participant has not demonstrated continuing eligibility, the program administrator shall-notify the relevant state ETC to discontinue the ineligible participant's Lifeline telephone service benefit. The benefit must be discontinued in the month following notification; thus the next month's benefit cannot be provided.
- 3. Ineligible past participants may reapply for the Lifeline program, but must do so by submitting a completed application to the program administrator for state program participation, or to a federal ETC for federal only participation, in accordance with the application process in R746-341-3.
- D. Participants Switching Between ETCs -- When a current Lifeline telephone service participant desires to change to a different ETC's Lifeline telephone service, the participant and ETCs shall follow the established NLAD procedures. A participant who is not able to complete the switch due to unresolved problems may seek the assistance of the Division of Public Utilities requesting help in resolving the issue.
- E. Documentation Retention The program administrator shall retain income and program eligibility certification documentation, in electronic format, for as long as required by then current federal Lifeline policies. Copies of the relevant documentation shall be made available on request to auditors from either the federal Lifeline telephone service program or the state Lifeline telephone service program.

R746-341-5. Duties of ETCs.

- A. State ETCs
- 1. Each state ETC shall, monthly, send to the programadministrator changes in the status of the Lifeline participants to whom the state ETC provides Lifeline telephone service, including, but not limited to:
 - a. participants changing residence locations (addresses);
 - b. participants switching carriers; or
 - e. customers who no longer receive telephone service.
- 2. The records sent shall contain the full identifying-information for each participant as required by the program-administrator's policies.
- 3. Each state ETC shall provide information to potential applicants regarding how to receive an application from the program administrator. This information shall be provided in person, on the

phone, in written format at the ETC's offices, and online at the ETC's website.

- 4. Each state ETC shall add the Lifeline discount to a eustomer's account, as directed by the program administrator, within five business days.
- 5. Each state ETC shall remove the Lifeline discount from a participant's account as directed by the program administrator within five business days of notification of the participant's incligible status.
- 6. Each state ETC shall update the NLAD whenever it implements changes in a participants' Lifeline status in accordance with the requirements for NLAD updates found in 47 CFR Section 54.404.
- 7. If a Lifeline participant seeks to switch service to a different ETC, the program administrator shall be notified by the participant of their desire to switch Lifeline providers. Once informed by the program administrator of the applicant's eligibility, the involved ETCs shall follow all applicable NLAD procedures to accomplish the participant's desired switch.
- 8. Annually, each state ETC shall send the program-administrator the participant list as defined by the FCC in its May 22, 2013 Public Notice in Docket No. 11-42 and any subsequent FCC-guidance. The list shall be provided to the program administrator by May 1 of each year. The list shall contain the identifying information as required by the program administrator's policies.
- 9. If a state ETC has a reasonable basis to believe a Lifeline telephone service participant no longer qualifies for Lifeline service, the ETC shall promptly inform the program administrator and provide the documentation, or reason, for its belief.
- 10. A state ETC shall cooperate with the Division of Public Utilities to resolve Lifeline service complaints the Division brings to the state ETC's attention.
- B. Federal ETCs
- Each designated federal ETC shall operate in the State of Utah subject to the conditions outlined in the commission order granting ETC status, the applicable provisions of this rule, and in accordance with the federal Lifeline program requirements.
- 1. Each federal ETC shall update the NLAD to reflect the ETC's initial eligibility verification decision and the participant's Lifeline status whenever the federal ETC adds or removes a Lifeline eustomer.
- 2. Each federal ETC shall update the NLAD with allchanges in the ETC's participants' Lifeline status.
- 3. If a Lifeline participant seeks to switch service to a different ETC the ETCs shall follow all applicable NLAD procedures to accomplish the participant's desired switch.
- 4. A federal ETC shall cooperate with the Division of Public Utilities to resolve Lifeline service complaints the Division of Public Utilities brings to a federal ETC's attention.

R746-341-6. State Lifeline Telephone Service Features.

- A. Discounts -- Lifeline telephone service provided by state ETCs shall consist of dial tone line, usage charges or their equivalent, and authorized Extended Area Service (EAS) charges, less a discount of \$3.50 and all other matching funds established by the Federal-Communication Commission.
- B. Service Characteristics -- State Lifeline telephone service shall include all features listed in Utah Code Ann. Section 54-8b-2(2).

- C. Deposits -- When eustomer security deposits areotherwise required they shall be waived for Lifeline telephone service participants if the customer voluntarily elects to receive toll blocking.
- D. Nonrecurring Charge Waiver -- Lifeline telephoneservice participants shall receive a waiver of the nonrecurring service charge for changing the type of local exchange usage service to-Lifeline service, or changing from flat rate service to message rateservice, or vice versa, but only one such waiver shall be allowedduring a given 12-month period.
- E. Disconnection -- Lifeline telephone service shall not be disconnected for nonpayment of toll service.
- F. Restrictions -- Lifeline telephone service shall be subject to the following restrictions:
- 1. Lifeline telephone service shall only be provided to the applicant's principal residence.
- 2. A Lifeline telephone service participant shall only receive a Lifeline discount on one single residential access line.
- G. Other Services A Lifeline telephone service participant may not be required to purchase other services from the state ETC, nor prohibited from purchasing other services unless the participant has failed to comply with the state ETC's terms and conditions for those services.

R746-341-7. Federal Lifeline Telephone Service Features.

Federal Lifeline telephone service consists of those features and conditions set forth in the applicable commission docket in which the federal ETC status was granted, as modified by subsequent orders and R746-341.E

R746-341-8. State ETC Reporting Requirements.

- Reporting Requirements -- State ETCs shall submit, to the Division of Public Utilities, a semi-annual report, for the periods-through June 30 and December 31, of each year, containing a-description of the state ETC's Lifeline program. The reports shall also contain monthly information on:
- A. the forgone revenue resulting from the discounts-provided to Lifeline participants, if any;
 - B. the amounts of administrative expenses;
 - C. interest accrual amounts on Lifeline funds, if any;
- D. the number of Lifeline telephone service participants by exchange area per month; and
 - E. a detailed report of outreach efforts.

R746-341-9. Funding of Lifeline.

Cost Recovery -- The total cost of providing the state portion of Lifeline telephone service, including commission approved administrative costs of the state ETCs and the costs incurred by the program administrator, shall be recovered and funded as provided in Utah Code Ann. Section 54-8b-15.

R746-341-10. Collection and Disbursement of Lifeline Funds.

State ETC Payment -- Within 30 days after the review audit of a state ETC's semi-annual report by the Division of Public Utilities results in a favorable recommendation, the Public Service Commission shall disburse an amount equal to the ETC's semi-annual Lifeline-program expenses and Lifeline discounts granted. For amounts the Division of Public Utilities disallows, the state ETC may petition the

Commission to open a docket to examine the reasonableness of the denied amounts.

RULE ANALYSIS

PURPOSE OF THE RULE OR REASON FOR THE CHANGE: During the 2017 General Session, the Utah Legislature enacted S.B. 130 and as a result of that new law, the Public Service Commission (PSC) is repealing some of its telecommunications rules and reenacting them in a new rule.

SUMMARY OF THE RULE OR CHANGE: Rule R746-343 governing the Utah Universal Service Fund (UUSF) support for a deaf, hard of hearing, or severely speech impaired person is repealed in its entirety. This rule is reenacted without any changes in the new Rule R746-8 that is filed concurrently with this repeal. R746. Public Service Commission. Administration.

[R746-343. Rule for Deaf, Severely Hearing or Speech Impaired Person.

R746-343-1. Purpose and Authority.

This rule is to establish a program as required in Section 54-8b-10 which will provide telecommunication devices to certified deaf, or severely hearing or speech impaired persons, who qualify under certain conditions, and to provide a dual relay system using third party intervention to connect deaf or severely hearing or speech impaired persons with normal hearing persons by way of telecommunication devices.

R746-343-2. Definitions.

- A. Definitions
- 1. "Applicant" is a person applying for a-Telecommunication Device for the Deaf, signal device, or other-communication device.
- 2. "Audiologist" is a person who has a Master's or Doctoral degree in Audiology, is licensed in Audiology in Utah, and holds the Certificate of Clinic Competence in Audiology from the American-Speech/Language/Hearing Association, or its equivalent.
- 3. "Deaf" is a hearing loss that requires the use of a TDD to communicate effectively on the telephone.
- 4. "Provider" is a service provider who agrees to be, if determined by the Public Service Commission, the administrator of the program or a portion of the program.

- 5. "Distribution center" is a facility authorized by the provider to distribute TDDs and signal devices, personal communicators, or other devices required by a recipient to communicate effectively on the telephone.
- 6. "Dual relay system" is the provision of voice and teletype communication between users of TDDs and other parties.
- 7. "Otolaryngologist" is a licensed physician specializing in ear, nose and throat medicine.
- 8. "Recipient" is a person who receives a TDD, signal-device, personal communicator, or other device to communicate-effectively on the telephone.
- 9. "Speech language pathologist" is a person who has a Master's or Doctoral degree in Speech Language Pathology in Utah, and holds the Certificate of Clinical Competence in Speech/Language Pathology from the American Speech Language Hearing Association, or its equivalent.
- 10. "Severely hearing impaired" is a hearing loss that-requires use of TDD to communicate effectively on the telephone.
- 11. "Severely Speech Impaired" is a speech handicap, or disorder, that renders speech on an ordinary telephone unintelligible.
- 12. "Signal device" is a mechanical device that alerts a deaf, deaf-blind, or severely hearing impaired person of an incoming-telephone call.
- 13. "Telecommunications Device for the Deaf, or TDD, is an electrical device for use with a telephone that utilizes a key board. It may also have an acoustic coupler, display screen or braille display to transmit and receive messages.
- 14. "Telephone relay center" is a facility administered by the provider to provide dual relay service.
- 15. "Commission" is the Utah Public Service Commission.

R746-343-3. Eligibility Requirements.

- A. An applicant is eligible if he is deaf, severely hearing impaired, or severely speech impaired and is eligible for assistance under a low income public assistance program. The impairment must be established by the certification on an application form by a person who is permitted to practice medicine in Utah, an audiologist, otolaryngologist, speech/language pathologist, or qualified personnel-within a state agency. The applicant must provide evidence that they are currently eligible, though it is not necessary that they be participating in a low income public assistance program.
- C. The provider may require additional documentation to determine applicant's eligibility.
- D. During the training session required in Section R746-343-8, Training, the applicant must demonstrate an ability to send and receive messages with a TDD or other appropriate devices.

R746-343-4. Approval of an Application.

- A. Approved Application--
- 1. When an original application has been approved, the provider shall inform the applicant in writing of:
 - a. when the original application has been approved;
- b. the location of the distribution center or designated place where the applicant may receive a TDD;
- e. the date and time of the training session as required in Section R746-343-8.
- 2. When the request for a replacement TDD, signal device, or other device has been approved, the provider or the distribution

eenter shall inform the recipient of the procedure for obtaining a-replacement device.

B. Denied Applications--If an original application orreplacement request is denied, the provider shall inform the applicant in writing of the reasons for the denial and of applicable procedures for appeal. Denial notices shall be sent by mail. The notice shall beaccompanied by instructions on the review process.

R746-343-5. Review by the Provider.

- A. An applicant or recipient whose request for an original or replacement device has been denied may request that the provider review the decision.
- B. The request for review shall be in writing and shall specify the basis for review and must be received by the provider within 30 days of the receipt of the notice of denial.
- C. Within ten days of receiving the request for review, the provider shall inform the applicant or recipient in writing of the disposition of the request.

R746-343-6. Review by the Commission.

A. Within 20 days of the notice of denial from the provider for review, the applicant or recipient may request in writing a hearing by the Commission. The request shall specify the reasons for challenging the decision.

R746-343-7. Distribution Process.

- A. Distribution Centers shall:
- 1. Upon notice from the provider, distribute TDDs, signal devices, or other specified devices, to persons determined eligible-under Section R746-343-3, Eligibility Requirements, and who reside in Utah;
- 2. Require each recipient or legal guardian to sign anagreement, Condition of Acceptance, form supplied by the provider;
- 3. Forward completed application forms and agreement-forms to the provider;
- 4. Inform the provider of those applicants who fail to report for training and receipt of devices.
- B. The provider shall implement a program to facilitatedistribution of devices and provide training as required.
- C. Neither the distribution center nor the provider shall be responsible for providing replacement paper for devices, the payment of the recipient's monthly telephone bill, purchase or lease cost of recipient's telephone, or the cost of replacement light bulbs for signal devices.

R746-343-8, Training.

A. The provider shall be responsible for seeing that training is provided to each recipient and legal guardian, or significant other, in accordance with guidelines established by the provider.

R746-343-9. Replacement Devices.

A. The distribution center shall provide devices to persons determined by the provider to be eligible under Sections R746-343-3, Eligibility Requirements, and R746-343-8, Training, accept devices that need repair, and deliver devices returned by recipients to a repair center designated by the provider.

R746-343-10. Ownership and Liability.

- A. TDDs, signal devices, and other devices provided by this program are the property of the state.
- B. A recipient or guardian shall return a TDD, signal device, or other device, to the provider or distribution center when the recipient no longer intends to reside in Utah, is no longer qualified for the program, does not need the device, or has been notified by the provider to return the device.
- C. Other than normal usage, recipients are liable for damage to or loss of a device issued under conditions of acceptance.

R746-343-11. Out of State Use.

No person shall remove a TDD, signal device, or other-device from the state for a period longer than 90 days without written permission of the provider.

R746-343-12. Dual Relay Service--Telephone Relay Center.


- A. A telephone relay center shall provide dual relay service seven days a week, 24 hours a day, including holidays.
- B. A telephone relay center shall hire operators withspecialized communication skills who shall be salaried employees.
- C. A telephone relay center shall require the operators to relay each message accurately, except as otherwise specifically provided in Section R746-343-14, Criminal Activity.

R746-343-13. Confidentiality and Privacy Requirements.

- A. Except as otherwise specifically provided in Section R746-343-14, Criminal Activity, a telephone relay center shall protect the privacy of persons to whom relay services are provided and shall require each operator to maintain the confidentiality of each telephone message.
- B. The confidentiality and privacy of persons to whom relay services are provided will be protected by means of the following:
- 1. The relay center shall not maintain any form ofpermanent copies of messages relayed by their operators or allow the content of telephone messages relayed by their operators to becommunicated to non-staff members.
- 2. Persons using the relay system shall not be required to provide identifying information until the party they are calling is on line, and shall only be required to identify themselves to the extent-necessary to fulfill the purpose of their call.
- 3. Relay operators shall not leave messages with third-parties unless instructed to do so by the person making the call.
- 4. Persons using the relay system may file complaints about the relay service to the telephone relay center or the provider, who shall review each complaint.

R746-343-14. Criminal Activity.

- A. Relay operators shall not knowingly transmit telephone messages that are made in furtherance of a criminal activity as defined by Utah or federal law.
- B. The confidentiality and privacy requirements of Section R746-343-13, Confidentiality and Privacy Requirements, do not apply to telephone conversations made in furtherance of a criminal activity as defined by Utah or federal law.

(e) A participant who fails to comply with this Subsection (4) may be disqualified from further participation in the NTEDP. (5) All devices distributed as part of the NTEDP shallremain the property of the State of Utah Public Service Commission. R746. Public Service Commission, Administration.

[R746-360. Universal Public Telecommunications Service Support Fund.

R746-360-1. General Provisions.

- A. Authorization -- Section 54-8b-15 authorizes the Commission to establish an expendable trust fund, known as the Universal Public Telecommunications Service Support Fund, the "universal service fund," "USF" or the "fund," to promote equitable cost recovery and universal service by ensuring that customers have access to basic telecommunications service at just, reasonable and affordable rates, consistent with the Telecommunications Act of 1996.
- B. Purpose -- The purposes of these rules are:
- 1. to govern the methods, practices and procedures by which:
- a. the USF is created, maintained, and funded by end-user surcharges applied to retail rates;
- b. funds are collected for and disbursed from the USF to qualifying telecommunications corporations so that they are able to recover the reasonable and prudent costs of providing basic telecommunications service while charging just, reasonable and affordable rates; and.
- 2. to ensure funds collected and disbursed from the USF are used efficiently and in the public interest.
- C. Application of the Rules -- The rules apply to all retail providers that provide intrastate public telecommunications services.

R746-360-2. Definitions.

- A. Affordable Base Rate (ABR) -- means the monthly per line retail rates, charges or fees for basic telecommunications service which the Commission determines to be just, reasonable, and affordable for a designated support area. The Affordable Base Rateshall be established by the Commission. The Affordable Base Ratedoes not include the applicable USF retail surcharge, municipal-franchise fees, taxes, and other incidental surcharges.
- B. Average Revenue Per Line -- means the average revenue for each access line computed by dividing the sum of all revenuederived from a telecommunications corporation's provision of publictelecommunications services, including, but not limited to, revenuesreceived from the provision of services in both the interstate andintrastate jurisdictions, whether designated "retail," "wholesale," orsome other categorization, all revenues derived from providingnetwork elements, services, functionalities, etc. required under the-Federal Telecommunications Act of 1996, Pub. L. 104-104,110 Stat.56 or the Utah Telecommunications Reform Act, Laws of Utah 1995, Chapter 269, all support funds received from the Federal Universal-Service Support Fund, and each and every other revenue source orsupport or funding mechanism used to assist in recovering the costs of providing public telecommunications services in a designated support area by that telecommunications corporation's number of access lines in the designated support area.
- C. Basic Telecommunications Service -- means a local-exchange service consisting of access to the public switched network; touch-tone, or its functional equivalent; local flat-rated, unlimited-usage, exclusive of extended area service; single-party service with-telephone number listed free in directories that are received free; access to operator services; access to directory assistance, lifeline and

- telephone relay assistance; access to 911 and E911 emergency-services; access to long-distance carriers; access to toll limitation-services; and other services as may be determined by the Commission.
- D. Designated Support Area means the geographic area used to determine USF support distributions. A designated support area, or "support area," need not be the same as a USF proxy model's geographic unit. The Commission will determine the appropriate designated support areas for determining USF support requirements. Unless otherwise specified by the Commission, the designated support area for a rate-of-return regulated Incumbent telephone corporation shall be its entire certificated service territory located in the State of High-
- E. Facilities-Based Provider -- means a telecommunications corporation that uses its own facilities, a combination of its own-facilities and essential facilities or unbundled network elements-obtained from another telecommunications corporation, or a telecommunications corporation which solely uses essential facilities or unbundled network elements obtained from another telecommunications corporation to provide public telecommunications services-
- F. Geographic Unit -- means the geographic area used by a USF proxy cost model for calculating costs of public-telecommunications services. The Commission will determine the appropriate geographic area to be used in determining public-telecommunications service costs.
- G. Net Fund Distributions means the difference between the gross fund distribution to which a qualifying telecommunications corporation is entitled and the gross fund surcharge revenues collected by that company, when the former amount is greater than the latter amount.
- H. Net Fund Contributions -- means the difference between the gross fund distribution to which a qualifying telecommunications corporation is entitled and the gross fund surcharge revenues generated by that company, when the latter amount is greater than the former amount.
- I. USF Proxy Model Costs -- means the total, jurisdictionally unseparated, cost estimate for public-telecommunications services, in a geographic unit, based on the forward-looking, economic cost proxy model(s) chosen by the Commission. The level of geographic cost disaggregation to be used for purposes of assessing the need for and the level of USF support within a geographic unit will be determined by the Commission. These models shall be provided by the Commission by January 2, 2001.
- J. Universal Service Fund (USF or fund) -- means the-Universal Public Telecommunications Service Support Fundestablished by 54-8b-15 and set forth by this rule.

R746-360-3. Duties of Administrator.

- A. Selection of Administrator -- The Division of Public-Utilities will be the fund administrator. If the Division is unable to fulfill that responsibility, the administrator, who must be a neutral third party, unaffiliated with any fund participant, shall be selected by the Commission.
- B. Cost of Administration -- The cost of administration shall be borne by the fund; unless administered by a state agency.
- C. Access to Books Upon reasonable notice, the administrator shall have access to the books of account of all-telecommunications corporations and retail providers, which shall be

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used to verify the intrastate retail revenue assessed in an end-usersurcharge, to confirm the level of eligibility for USF support and to ensure compliance with this rule.

- D. Maintenance of Records -- The administrator shall-maintain the records necessary for the operation of the USF and this rule.
- E. Report Forms -- The administrator shall develop report forms to be used by telecommunications corporations and retail-providers to effectuate the provisions of this rule and the USF. An officer of the telecommunications corporation or retail provider shall attest to and sign the reports to the administrator.
- F. Administrator Reports -- The administrator shall file-reports with the Commission containing information on the average-revenue per line calculations, projections of future USF needs, analyses of the end-user surcharges and Affordable Base Rates, and-recommendations for calculating them for the following 12-month-period. The report shall include recommendations for changes indetermining basic telecommunications service, designated supportareas, geographic units, USF proxy cost models and ways to improve fund collections and distributions.
- G. Periodic Review -- The administrator, under the direction of the Commission, shall perform a periodic review of fund recipients to verify eligibility for future support and to verify compliance with all applicable state and federal laws and regulations.
- H. Proprietary Information -- Information received by the administrator which has been determined by the Commission to be proprietary shall be treated in conformance with Commission-practices.
- I. Information Requested -- Information requested by the administrator which is required to assure a complete review shall be provided within 45 days of the request. Failure to provide information within the allotted time period may be a basis for withdrawal of future support from the USF or other lawful penalties to be applied.

R746-360-4. Application of Fund Surcharges to Customer Billings.

- (1)(a) "Access line" is defined at Utah Code Subsection 54-8b-2(1) and is used in this rule, R746-360, to the extent-consistent with federal law.
- (b) For purposes of applying the statutory definition of "access line," the term "connection" is defined at Utah Code-Subsection 54-8b-15(1)(e) and is used in this rule, R746-360, to the extent consistent with federal law.
- (e)(i) Providers of access lines and providers of connections are hereafter referred to jointly as "providers."
- (ii) Access lines and connections are hereafter referred to jointly as "access lines."
- (2) Through December 31, 2017, providers shall remit to the Commission 1.65 percent of billed intrastate retail rates.
- (3) As of January 1, 2018, the Utah Universal Public-Telecommunications Service Support Fund (UUSF) shall be funded as follows:
- (a) Unless Subsection R746-360-4(5) applies, providers shall remit to the Commission \$0.36 per month per access line that, as of the last calendar day of each month, has a place of primary use in Utah in accordance with the Mobile Telecommunications—Sourcing Act, 4 U.S.C. Sec. 116 et seq.

- (b)(i) "Place of primary use" means the street addressrepresentative of where the customer's use of the telecommunications service primarily occurs.
- (ii) A provider of mobile telecommunications serviceshall consider the customer's place of primary use to be theeustomer's residential street address or primary business streetaddress.
- (iii) A provider of non-mobile telecommunications—service shall consider the customer's place of primary use to be:
- (A) the customer's residential street address or primary business street address; or
 - (B) the customer's registered location for 911 purposes.
 - (c) A provider may collect the surcharge:
 - (i) as an explicit charge to each end-user; or
- (ii) through inclusion of the surcharge within the enduser's rate plan.
- (d) A provider that offers a multi-line service shall apply the surcharge to each concurrent real-time voice communication eall session that an end-user can place to or receive from the public switched telephone network.
- (e) A provider that offers prepaid access lines or connections that permit access to the public telephone network shall remit to the Commission \$0.36 per month per access line for such service (new access lines or connections, or recharges for existing lines or connections) purchased on or after January 1, 2018.
- (4)(a) A provider shall remit to the Commission no less than 98.69 percent of its total monthly surcharge collections.
- (b) A provider may retain a maximum of 1.31 percent of its total monthly surcharge collections to offset the costs of administering this rule.
- (5)(a) Subject to Subsection R746-360-4(5)(b), a provider may omit the UUSF surcharge with respect to an access line that is described in Subsection R746-360-4(3), and:
- (i) generates revenue that is subject to a universal service fund surcharge in a state other than Utah for the relevant month for which the provider omits the UUSF surcharge; or
- (ii) for the relevant month for which the provider omitsthe UUSF surcharge, was not used to access Utah intrastatetelecommunications services.
- (b) A provider that omits any UUSF surcharge pursuant to Subsection R746-360-5(a) shall:
- (i) maintain documentation for at least 36 months that the omission complied with Subsection R746-360-5(a); and
- (ii) consent to any audit of the documentation requested by the:
 - (A) Commission; or
 - (B) Division of Public Utilities.

R746-360-5. Fund Remittances and Disbursements.

- A. Remitting Surcharge Revenues --
- 1. Telecommunications corporations, not eligible for USF support funds, providing telecommunications services subject to USF surcharges shall collect and remit surcharge revenues to the Commission as follows:
- a. if the average monthly USF surcharge collections over the prior six months was ten dollars or greater, within 45 days after the end of each month,

- b. if the average monthly USF surcharge collections over the prior six months was less than ten dollars, the telecommunications corporation may accrue the USF surcharge collections and submit the accrued collections on a semiannual basis.
- 2. Telecommunications corporations eligible for USF-support funds shall make remittances as follows:
- a. Prior to the end of each month, the fund administrator shall inform each qualifying telecommunications corporation of the estimated amount of support that it will be eligible to receive from the USF for that month.
- b. Net fund contributions shall be remitted to the Commission within 45 calendar days after the end of each month. If the net amount owed is not received by that date, remedies, including withholding future support from the USF, may apply.
- 3. The Commission will forward remitted revenues to the Utah State Treasurer's Office for deposit in a USF account.
- B. Distribution of Funds -- Net Fund distributions toqualifying telecommunications corporations for a given month shall be made 60 days after the end of that month, unless withheld for failure to maintain qualification or failure to comply with Commission orders or rules.

R746-360-6. Eligibility for Fund Distributions.

- A. Qualification --
- 1. To qualify to receive USF support funds, a telecommunications corporation shall be designated an "eligible-telecommunications carrier," pursuant to 47 U.S.C. Section 214(e), and shall be in compliance with Commission orders and rules. Each-telecommunications corporation receiving support shall use that support only to provide basic telecommunications service and any other services or purposes approved by the Commission.
- 2. Additional qualification criteria for Incumbent telephone eorporations In addition to the qualification criteria of R746-360-6A.1.;
- a. Non-rate-of-return Incumbent telephone corporations, except Incumbent telephone corporations subject to pricing flexibility pursuant to 54-8b-2.3 shall make Commission approved, aggregate-rate reductions for public telecommunications services, provided in the State of Utah, equal to each incremental increase in USF distribution amounts received after December 1, 1999.
- b. Rate-of-return Incumbent telephone corporations shall complete a Commission review of their revenue requirement and public telecommunications services' rate structure prior to any change in their USF distribution which differs from a prior USF distribution, beginning with the USF distribution for December, 1999.
- B. Rate Floor.
- 1. Unless a petition brought pursuant to Subsection (B)(2) is granted after adjudication, to be eligible for USF subsidization, a telecommunications corporation shall charge, at a minimum, \$18 per line for basic telecommunications service.
- 2.a. A telecommunications corporation may petition the Commission to deviate from the Affordable Base Rate set forth in this Subsection (B)(1).
- b. A telecommunications corporation that files a petitionunder this Subsection (B)(2)(a) shall:
- i. demonstrate that the Affordable Base Rate is not-reasonable in the particular geographic area served; or

- ii. impute income up to the Affordable Base Rate inealculating the telecommunications corporation's state USFsubsidization.
- C. Lifeline Requirement -- A telecommunicationseorporation may qualify to receive distributions from the fund only if it offers Lifeline service on terms and conditions prescribed by the Commission.
- D. Exclusion of Resale Providers Only facilities-based providers, will be eligible to receive support from the fund. Where service is provided through one telecommunications corporation's resale of another telecommunications corporation's service, supportmay be received by the latter only.

R746-360-7. Calculation of Fund Distributions in Non-rate-of-Return Regulated Incumbent Telephone Corporation Territories.

- A. Use of Proxy Cost Models -- The USF proxy cost-model(s) selected by the Commission and average revenue per line-will be used to determine fund distributions within designated support areas
- B. Use of USF Funds --Telecommunications corporations shall use USF funds to support each primary residential line in active service which it furnishes in each designated area.
 - C. Determination of Support Amounts --
- 1. Incumbent telephone corporation Monies from the fund will equal the numerical difference between USF proxy model cost-estimates of costs to provide residential Basic Telecommunications-Service in the designated support area and the product of the-Incumbent telephone corporation's Average Revenue per line, for the designated support area, times the number of Incumbent telephone-corporation's active residential access lines in the designated support area.
- 2. Telecommunications corporations other than Incumbent telephone corporations Monies from the fund will equal the Incumbent telephone corporation's average residential access line-support amount for the respective designated support area, determined by dividing the Incumbent telephone corporation's USF monies for the designated support area by the Incumbent telephone corporation's active residential access lines in the designated support area, times the eligible telecommunications corporation's number of active residential access lines.
- D. Lifeline Support -- Eligible telecommunications corporations shall receive additional USF funds to recover any discount granted to lifeline customers, participating in a Commission approved Lifeline program, that is not recovered from federal lifeline support mechanisms.
- E. Exemptions -- Telecommunications corporations may petition to receive an exemption for any provision of this rule or to receive additional USF support, for use in designated support areas, to support additional services which the Commission determines to be consistent with universal service purposes and permitted by law.

R746-360-8. Calculation of Fund Distributions in Rate-of-Return Incumbent Telephone Corporation Territories.

- (A) Determination of Support Amounts --
- (1) Incumbent telephone corporation Monies from the fund will equal the numerical difference between the Incumbent-telephone corporation's total embedded costs of providing public

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telecommunications services, for a designated support area, less the product of the Incumbent telephone corporation's Average Revenue-Per Line, for the designated support area, times the Incumbent telephone corporation's active access lines in the designated support area. To the extent the Commission finds that inclusion of any cost-will result in an inefficient use of USF funds or in a use of USF funds that is inconsistent with the public interest, such cost will be excluded from total embedded costs. Total embedded costs shall include a-weighted average rate of return on capital of the intrastate and interstate jurisdictions. For example, in the case of an Incumbent telephone corporation whose costs are allocated fifty percent to each jurisdiction and whose interstate return is 11.25 percent and whose intrastate return authorized by the Commission is 9 percent, the weighted average return on capital would be 10.125 percent.

- (a) In order to determine the interstate return on capital to ealculate the weighted average rate of return on capital for Incumbent telephone corporations, the Commission shall:
- (i) use the prior year return reported by the National-Exchange Carriers Association (NECA) to the Federal-Communications Commission (FCC) on FCC Form 492 for Incumbent telephone corporations that do separations between intrastate and interstate jurisdictions under 47 CFR Part 36. In the event that the Incumbent local telephone corporation uses a future test period as provided in Utah Code Ann. Subsection 54-4-4(3)(b)(i), the interstate return for these Incumbent telephone corporations shall be the average of the actual return for the prior three years as reported on FCC Form 492.
- (ii) use NECA's most recent interstate allocation computation filed at the FCC under 47 CFR Part 69.606 and the actual interstate return on capital reported by NECA as described in R746-360-8 A.1.a.i. for average schedule Incumbent telephone corporations.
- (iii) use the actual interstate return of an Incumbent-telephone corporation's relevant tariff group reported to the FCC in its most recent FCC Form 492A for Incumbent telephone corporations that are regulated on a price-cap basis in the interstate jurisdiction.
- (2) Telecommunications corporations other than Incumbent telephone corporations Monies from the fund will equal therespective Incumbent telephone corporation's average access line-support amount for the designated support area, determined by dividing the Incumbent telephone corporation's USF monies for the designated support area by the Incumbent telephone corporation's active access lines in the designated support area, times the eligible telecommunications corporation's number of active access lines in the designated support area.
- (B) Lifeline Support -- Eligible telecommunicationscorporations shall receive additional USF funds to recover anydiscount granted to lifeline customers, participating in a Commissionapproved Lifeline program, that is not recovered from federal lifeline support mechanisms.
- (C) Exemptions -- Telecommunications corporations may petition to receive an exemption for any provision of this rule or to receive additional USF support, for use in designated support areas, to support additional services which the Commission determines to be consistent with universal service purposes and permitted by law.

R746-360-9. One-Time Distributions From the Fund.

A. Applications for One-Time Distributions— Telecommunications corporations, whether they are or are not-receiving USF funds under R746-360-7 or R746-360-8, potential eustomers not presently receiving service because facilities are not available, or eustomers receiving inadequate service may apply to the Commission for one-time distributions from the fund for extension of service to a customer, or customers, not presently served or foramelioration of inadequate service.

- 1. These distributions are to be made only in extraordinary eircumstances, when traditional methods of funding and service-provision are infeasible.
 - 2. One-time distributions will not be made for:
 - a. New subdivision developments;
- b. Property improvements, such as cable placement, when associated with curb and gutter installations; or
- e. Seasonal developments that are exclusively vacation-homes.
- i. Vacation home is defined as: A secondary residence which is primarily used for recreation and is unoccupied for a period of four consecutive weeks per year.
- 3. An application for a one-time distribution may be filed with the Commission by an individual or group of consumers desiring telephone service or improved service, a telecommunications corporation on behalf of those consumers, the Division of Public-Utilities, or any entity permitted by law to request agency action. An application shall identify the service(s) sought, the area to be served and the individuals or entities that will be served if the one-time-distribution is approved.
- 4. Following the application's filing, affected telecommunications corporations shall provide engineering, facilities, eosts, and any other pertinent information that will assist in the Commission's consideration of the application.
- 5. In considering the one-time distribution application, the Commission will examine relevant facts including the type and grade of service to be provided, the cost of providing the service, the demonstrated need for the service, whether the customer is within the service territory of a telecommunications corporation, whether the proposed service is for a primary residence, the provisions for service or line extension currently available, and other relevant factors to determine whether the one-time distribution is in the public interest.
- B. Presumed Reasonable Amounts and Terms -- Unlessotherwise ordered by the Commission, the maximum one-timedistribution will be no more than \$10,000 per customer for customers of rate-of-return regulated companies. For customers of non-rate of return companies, the maximum one-time distribution shall beealculated so that the required customer payments would equal thepayments required from a customer of a rate-of-return regulatedeompany. The Commission will presume a company's service or line extension terms and conditions reasonable, for a subscriber inconnection with one-time universal service fund distribution requests, if the costs of service extension, for each extension, are recovered as follows:
- 1. For rate-of-return regulated Local Exchange Carriers who request USF One-Time Distribution support for facility placement: The first \$2,500 of cost coverage per account is provided by the company; and for cost amounts exceeding \$2,500 per account up to two times the statewide average loop investment per account for rate-of-return regulated telecommunication companies, as determined annually by the Division of Public Utilities, the company will pay 50 percent of the costs of the project.
- 2. For non-rate-of-return Local Exchange Carriers who-request USF One-Time Distribution support for facility placement the

first \$2,500 of cost coverage per account is provided by the company; and all other costs are shared between the customer and the fund as provided herein.

- 3. For projects that exceed \$2,500 per account, but are equal to or less than \$10,000 per account, the customer shall pay 25 percent of the costs that exceed \$2,500. For projects that exceed \$10,000 per account, but are equal to or less than \$20,000 per account, the customer shall pay 50 percent of the costs that are greater than \$10,000 plus the previously calculated amount. For projects exceeding \$20,000 per account the customer shall pay 75 percent of the cost above \$20,000 until the State Universal Service Support Fund has paid the maximum amount as provided herein, any project costs above that level will be paid for 100 percent by the customer.
- 4. The State Universal Service Support Fund shall pay the difference between the sum of the defined company contributions plus eustomer contribution amounts and the total project cost up to the maximum amount provided herein. To the extent the Commission finds that inclusion of any cost will result in an inefficient use of USF funds or in a use of USF funds that is inconsistent with the public interest, such cost will be excluded from the total project cost.
- 5. Other terms and conditions for service extension shall be reviewed by the Commission in its consideration of an application and may be altered by the Commission in order to approve the use of universal service funds through the requested one-time distribution.
- C. Combination of One-Time Distribution Funds with Additional Customer Funds and Future Customer Payment Recovery
- 1. At least 51 percent of the potential customers must be full-time residents in the geographic area being petitioned for and must be willing to pay the initial up-front contribution to the project as ealculated by the Commission or its agent.
- 2. Qualified customers in the area shall be notified by the telecommunications corporation of the nature and extent of the-proposed service extension including the necessary customer-contribution amounts to participate in the project. Customer-contribution payments shall be made prior to the start of construction. In addition to qualified customers, the Local Exchange Company-needs to make a good faith effort to contact all known property owners within the geographic boundaries of the proposed project and invite them to participate on the same terms as the qualified customers. Local Exchange Companies may ask potential customers to help in the process of contacting other potential customers.
- 3. New developments and empty lots will not be considered in the cost analysis for USF construction projects unless the property owner is willing to pay the per account costs for each lot as specified in this rule.
- 4. Potential customers who are notified and initially decline participation in the line extension project, but subsequently decide to participate, prior to completion of the project, may participate in the project if they make a customer contribution payment, prior to-completion of the project, of 105 percent of the original customer-contribution amount.
- 5. For a period of five years following completion of a project, new customers who seek telecommunications service in the project area, shall pay a customer contribution payment equal to 110 percent of the amount paid by the original customers in the project.

- 6. The telecommunications corporation shall ensure that all eustomer contribution payments required by R746-360-9(C)(3), (4), and (5) are collected. Funds received through these payments shall be sent to the universal service fund administrator. The company is responsible for tracking and notification to the Commission when the USF has been fully compensated. All monies will be collected and reported by the end of each calendar year, December 31st.
- 7. For each customer added during the five-year period following project completion, the telecommunications corporation and new customers shall bear the costs to extend service pursuant to the company's service or line extension terms and conditions, up to the telecommunications corporation's original contribution per customer for the project and the customer contributions required by this rule. The company may petition the Commission for a determination of the recovery from the universal service fund and the new customer for costs which exceed this amount.
- D. Impact of Distribution on Rate of Return Companies A one-time distribution from the fund shall be recorded on the books of a rate base, rate of return regulated LEC as an aid to construction and treated as an offset to rate base.
- E. Notice and Hearing -- Following notice that a one-time distribution application has been filed, any interested person may-request a hearing or seek to intervene to protect his interests.
- F. Bidding for Unserved Areas -- If only one-telecommunications corporation is involved in the one-time-distribution request, the distribution will be provided based on the-reasonable and prudent actual or estimated costs of that company. If additional telecommunications corporations are involved, the-distribution will be determined on the basis of a competitive bid. The estimated amount of the one-time distribution will be considered in evaluating each bid. Fund distributions in that area will be based on the winning bid.

R746-360-10. Altering the USF Charges and the End-User-Surcharge Rates.

The uniform surcharge shall be adjusted periodically tominimize the difference between amounts received by the fund and amounts disbursed.

RULE ANALYSIS

PURPOSE OF THE RULE OR REASON FOR THE CHANGE: The purpose of this proposed rule is to set forth procedures governing the submission of data research requests to the Utah Data Research Center (Center), to establish criteria for how the Center will prioritize the data research requests it receives, and to set minimum standards for the information that must be included in a data research request.

SUMMARY OF THE RULE OR CHANGE: During the 2017 General Session, the Utah Legislature passed the Utah Data Research Center Act, S.B. 194 (Act). The Act creates the Center as a centralized, standardized governance structure for the purpose of facilitating data-driven decision-making for education and employment policy and research within the Specifically, the Center is granted access to deidentified information from several participating agencies and entities for the purpose of carrying out research and analysis into K-12 education, postsecondary education, and workforce data and outcomes. The Center replaces the similar, less centralized arrangement that was in place under the auspices of the Utah Data Alliance. The Act instructs the Department of Workforce Services (Department) to make rules establishing a process for submitting data research requests, as well as criteria for how those requests will be prioritized by the Center and the information the Center will require as part of each request. This proposed rule identifies the Center's website as the mechanism for submitting data research requests. This proposed rule also maintains the distinction, spelled out in the Act, between primary requesters (agencies or entities from which the Center is required to accept data research requests) and ancillary requesters (all other persons or entities, including members of the general public). The Act permits the Center to charge the cost of completing a data research request to an ancillary requester. This proposed rule makes clear that ancillary requesters must execute a payment agreement with the Center as a condition of the Center's obligation to complete a request submitted by an ancillary requester. This proposed rule also generally gives priority to primary requesters over ancillary requesters in evaluating their requests. In addition, this proposed rule prioritizes requests that are more likely to provide meaningful policy guidance or to lead to findings likely to be of greater interest to the broader public, as well as requests for which the data being sought is more readily available to the Center.

Each data research request is evaluated on these criteria and assigned a score by the Center; the Center then completes each request in order based on this evaluation. The Center has the discretion to deviate from the criteria in cases of compelling public interest as demonstrated by the requester. Finally, this proposed rule specifies the information that must be included in a data research request, including the identity of the requester, the requester's thesis, the research question(s) being investigated, the specific data to be analyzed, and the timeframe for fulfilling the request. If an ancillary requester fails to include this information, the Center may delay or deny the request. The Department has specific authority to make rules governing the Center's operations pursuant to Subsection 35A-14-302(9)(a).

STATUTORY OR CONSTITUTIONAL AUTHORIZATION FOR THIS RULE: Section 35A-14-302

ANTICIPATED COST OR SAVINGS TO:

- ♦ THE STATE BUDGET: No costs or savings are anticipated because the fee for data research requests was in place previously, and because the program as outlined by the Legislature is intended to be revenue-neutral for the state budget. - (b) "Ancillary requester" means one of the following, as set forth in Utah Code Ann. Section 35A-14-302:
 - (i) A state government entity that is not a primary requester;
 - (ii) A political subdivision of the state;
 - (iii) A private entity; or
 - (iv) A member of the public.
- (c) "Requester" means a person making a data research request.

R982-800-102. Data Research Request Procedures.

- (1) Data research requests shall be submitted via an electronic form available on the center's website.
- (2) Each data research request must include the information set forth in Section R982-800-104. If the requester fails to include that information:
- (a) In the case of a primary requester, the center shall seek the necessary additional information and clarification from the requester, and may decline to act on the request until the necessary additional information and clarification is received;
 - (b) In the case of an ancillary requester, the center may:
- (i) Seek the necessary additional information and clarification from the requester, and may decline to act on the request until the necessary additional information and clarification is received; or
- (ii) Deny the request and provide to the requester the reason(s) for the denial of the request.
- (3)(a) If the center accepts a data research request from an ancillary requester, the center shall submit to the ancillary requester a payment agreement setting forth at least the following:
- (i) The reasonable estimated cost of completing the data research request; and
- (ii) The obligation of the ancillary requester to pay the full cost of completing the data research request, even if the full cost differs from the reasonable estimated cost.
- (b) The ancillary requester shall execute the payment agreement and return it to the center. If the ancillary requester fails or refuses to execute and return the payment agreement, the center may decline the data research request.

R982-800-103. Criteria for Priority of Data Research Requests.

- (1) The director, with consultation by the advisory board, shall use the following criteria to determine the priority of the data research requests the center receives:
 - (a) The type of requester;
- (b) The potential of the requester's research to lead to meaningful policy changes or other meaningful impacts for members of the general public; and
 - (c) The availability of the data being requested.
- (2) The director, with consultation by the advisory board, shall evaluate the criteria described in Subsection (1) and assign a numerical score for each data research request. - (d) A specific description of the data the requester is seeking, including the date range(s) and the variable(s) being studied; and
- (e) Any applicable timeframes or deadlines by which the requester seeks to obtain the data being requested.
- (2) The center may request other information in addition to the information listed in Subsection (1).

None of the 50 facilities that provide outpatient hospital services will see a fiscal impact because this change solely removes provisions of the Prepaid Mental Health Plan (PMHP) waiver that do not apply to criteria in the rule. This change, therefore, is a clarification.

R414. Health, Health Care Financing, Coverage and Reimbursement Policy.

R414-3A. Outpatient Hospital Services.

R414-3A-1. Introduction and Authority.

This rule defines the scope of outpatient hospital services available to Medicaid members for the treatment of disorders other than mental disease. This rule is authorized under Section 26-18-3 and governs the services allowed under 42 CFR 440.20.

R414-3A-2. Definitions.

- (1) "Outpatient" is defined in 42 CFR 440.20.
- (2) "Outpatient hospital" is a facility that:
- (a) is in, or physically connected to, a hospital licensed by the Department as a general hospital, as defined by Subsection 26-21-2(11), and meets the standards set forth in Rule R432-100 and 42 CFR Part 482;
- (b) meets participation requirements in the Medicare program; and
- (c) has a Medicaid provider agreement with the Department.[
- (3) "Prepaid Mental Health Plan" (PMHP) means the Medicaid mental and substance use disorder managed care plan that eovers inpatient and outpatient mental health services, and outpatient substance use disorder services for PMHP-enrolled Medicaid members.

R414-3A-3. Member Eligibility Requirements.

Outpatient hospital services are available to categorically and medically needy individuals.

R414-3A-4. Program Access Requirements.

- (1) An outpatient hospital must:
- (a) Be licensed or formally-approved as a hospital by an officially designated authority for state-standard setting;
- (b) Meet participation requirements in Medicare as a hospital;
- (c) Be a hospital that accepts a Medicaid member for treatment and accepts responsibility to make sure the member receives all medically necessary services from Medicaid providers; and
- (d) Accept financial responsibility for any services a member receives from a non-Medicaid provider.

[R414-3A-5. Prepaid Mental Health Plan.

- A Medicaid member who resides in a county covered by the PMHP may only obtain outpatient mental health and substance usedisorder services from an approved PMHP unless:
- (1) The Medicaid member is eligible under the Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnostic, and Treatment (EPSDT) Program and is in the care or custody of the State of Utah;
- (2) Services are provided during a period of presumptive eligibility. When a member is presumptively eligible, all services are billed directly to the State on a fee-for-service basis.

R414-3A-[6]5. Services.

- (1) Services appropriate in the outpatient hospital setting encompass medically necessary diagnostic, therapeutic, rehabilitative, or palliative medical services and supplies.
 - (2) Outpatient hospital services include:
- (a) the service of nurses or other personnel necessary to complete the service and provide member care during the provision of service;
- (b) the use of hospital facilities, equipment, and supplies; and
- (c) the technical portion of clinical laboratory and radiology services.
- (3) Cosmetic or reconstructive procedures are set forth in Section R414-1-29.
- (4) Sleep studies are available only in a sleep disorder center accredited by the American Academy of Sleep Medicine.
- (5) Hyperbaric oxygen therapy is limited to service in a facility in which the hyperbaric unit is accredited by the Undersea and Hyperbaric Medical Society. Hyperbaric oxygen therapy is therapy that places the member in an enclosed pressure chamber for medical treatment

R414-3A-[7]6. Prior Authorization.

Prior authorization is required on certain medical and surgical procedures in accordance with Section R414-1-14.

R414-3A-[8]7. Cost Sharing.

Each Medicaid member is responsible for a copayment as established in the Utah Medicaid State Plan and incorporated by reference in Rule R414-1.

R414-3A-[9]8. Reimbursement for Services.

Reimbursement for outpatient hospital services is in accordance with Attachment 4.19-B of the Utah Medicaid State Plan, which is incorporated by reference in Rule R414-1.

Because of its temporary nature, a **120-D**_{AY} **R**_{ULE} is not codified as part of the *Utah Administrative Code*.

The law does not require a public comment period for 120-Day Rules. However, when an agency files a 120-Day Rule, it may file a Proposed Rule at the same time, to make the requirements permanent.

Emergency or 120-Day Rules are governed by Section 63G-3-304, and Section R15-4-8.

PURPOSE OF THE RULE OR REASON FOR THE CHANGE: Section R495-885-9 states that the Department of Human Services (DHS) will set an implementation schedule to be in compliance no later then 12/31/2017. This will not be in place until 06/30/2018.

SUMMARY OF THE RULE OR CHANGE: Section R495-885-9 needs to change the date from 12/31/2017 to 06/30/2018. Mandatory committee participation is reduced from five voting members to four. (EDITOR'S NOTE: A corresponding proposed amendment to Rule R495-885 is under Filing No. 42417 in this issue, January 15, 2018, of the Bulletin.)

STATUTORY OR CONSTITUTIONAL AUTHORIZATION FOR THIS RULE: Section 62A-1-118 and Section 62A-2-120

EMERGENCY RULE REASON AND JUSTIFICATION:

REGULAR RULEMAKING PROCEDURES WOULD place the agency in violation of federal or state law.

JUSTIFICATION: DHS will be out of compliance since the rule states that the implementation schedule needs to be in place no later then 12/31/2017. It will not be in place until 06/30/2018, due to delays in the development and implementation of the automated process that will be used to process these clearances.

R495. Human Services, Administration.

 ${\bf R495\text{--}885.}\ Employee\ Background\ Screenings.$

R495-885-1. Authority and Purpose.

- (1) This Rule is authorized by Sections 62A-1-118 and 62A-2-120.
- (2) This Rule clarifies the standards for Department of Human Services' employee and volunteer background screening.
- (3) This Rule is created to hold DHS employees and volunteers to high standards of conduct, protect children and vulnerable adults, and promote public trust.

R495-885-2. Definitions.

- (1) "BCI" means the Bureau of Criminal Identification, and is the designated state agency of the Division of Criminal Investigation and Technical Services Division, within the Department of Public Safety, responsible to maintain criminal records in the State of Utah.
 - (2) "Child" is defined in Section 62A-2-101.
- (3) "Department" or "DHS" means the Department of Human Services.
 - (4) "Direct Access" is defined in Section 62A-2-101.
- (5) "Director" means the Director of each DHS Office or Division, and includes the Director's designee.
 - (6) "Directly Supervised" is defined in 62A-2-101.
- (7) "Employee" means a prospective employee who has received a job offer from DHS or a current employee of DHS, and includes paid interns.
- (8) "Executive Director" means the Executive Director of DHS or the Deputy Director designated by the Executive Director.
 - (9) "FBI rap back" is defined in Section 53-10-108.
- (10) "Fingerprints" means an individual's fingerprints as copied electronically through a live-scan fingerprinting device or on two ten-print fingerprint cards.
- (11) "Volunteer" means an individual who donates services without pay or other compensation, except expenses actually and reasonably incurred and pre-approved by the supervising agency, and includes unpaid interns.
 - (12) "Vulnerable adult" is defined in Section 62A-2-101.

R495-885-3. Employees and Volunteers with Direct Access.

- (1) The Department finds that a criminal history or identification as a perpetrator of abuse or neglect is directly relevant to an individual's employment or volunteer activities within DHS.
 - (2) All Department employees and volunteers who may

have direct access and who may not be directly supervised at all times must have an annual background screening clearance in accordance with Sections 62A-1-118 and 62A-2-120, which shall include retention of fingerprints by BCI for FBI rap back.

- (3) Department employees and volunteers who may have direct access and may not be directly supervised at all times shall:
- (a) Submit a background screening application to their respective Division or Office on a form created by the Department; and
- (b) Submit fingerprints to the Department via a DHS-operated live-scan machine or:
- two ten-print fingerprint cards produced by a law enforcement agency, an agency approved by the BCI, or another entity pre-approved by the Department
- (c) not be required to submit fingerprints to DHS if they have submitted fingerprints for retention
- (i) to BCI for an Office or Division clearance, and the Office or Division ensures that the minimum standards set forth in Section 62A-2-120 are enforced; or
- (ii) to the Department of Health for employees and volunteers of the Utah State Developmental Center per code, or
- (iii) to the Office of Licensing as an individual associated with a license as long as the fingerprints are retained by BCI for FBI rap back.
- (4) The DHS Office of Licensing shall access information to perform the background checks described in Sections 62A-1-118 and 62A-2-120.
- (a) The DHS Office of Licensing will not duplicate fingerprint-based criminal background checks on Department employees or volunteers who have a current fingerprint-based criminal background clearance pursuant to R495-885-3(3).
- (b) The fingerprints submitted by DHS employees who are required to obtain a background screening pursuant to Section 62A-2-120 as an individual associated with a licensee shall be utilized to perform the screening required by this R495-885. Screening results shall be reviewed in accordance with both the standards required by Section 62A-2-120 and this R495-885.
- (5) Except as described in R495-885-5, Department employees and volunteers who would automatically be denied a background screening approval as described in Section 62A-2-120(5) (a) are not eligible for work with the Department.
- (6) Except as described in R495-885-5, Department employees and volunteers who have any offense or finding described in Section 62A-2-120(6)(a) are not eligible for work with the Department.
- (7) Each Division and Office shall develop and implement a protocol to ensure renewal background screening applications are submitted to the DHS Office of Licensing annually for all database systems that are not included in the FBI rap back fingerprint process.

R495-885-4. Employees and Volunteers with No Direct Access.

- (1) The Department finds that a criminal history is directly relevant to an individual's employment activities within DHS.
- (2) The Department is not authorized to perform the checks described in Sections 62A-1-118 and 62A-2-120 for employees with no direct access.
- (3) Each Division and Office will identify which of their positions includes no potential for direct access that is not directly supervised.
 - (4) Each employee who does not potentially have direct

- access shall submit an "Authorization and Waiver for Criminal History Check" form to a Department of Human Resources Management, DHS Field Office authorizing DHRM to perform name-based background checks.
- (5) Except as described in R495-885-5, Department employees who would automatically be denied a background screening approval based upon the offenses described in Section 62A-2-120(5)(a) are not eligible for work with the Department.
- (6) Except as described in R495-885-5, Department employees who have any offense described in Section 62A-2-120(6) (a) are not eligible for work with the Department.
- (7) Volunteers who do not have a background screening clearance pursuant to R495-885-3 will be directly supervised.

R495-885-5. Background Screening Review.

- (1) The Office of Licensing or the Department of Human Resources Management, DHS Field Office shall notify the Director of the background screening results of each prospective employee, employee, and volunteer.
- (2) The Director shall review the background screening results of each prospective employee, employee, and volunteer.
- (3) Review criteria for prospective or probationary employees and volunteers:
- (a) Automatic denial offenses outlined in 62A-2-120(5)(a) are not eligible for review by the DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee:
- (b) The Director has sole discretion to determine whether to deny employment or refer a prospective or probationary employee or volunteer with the following background screening findings to the DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee:
 - (i) All other circumstances outlined in 62A-2-120(6)(a), or
- (ii) any MIS supported or substantiated findings (for individuals with direct access only)
- (c) The determinations of the Director and the DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee are final, and a prospective or probationary employee or volunteer has no right to appeal.
 - (4) Review process for non-probationary employees:
- (a) The following background screening findings shall be submitted to the Director:
 - (i) Automatic denial offenses outlined in 62A-2-120(5)(a),
 - (ii) All other circumstances outlined in 62A-2-120(6)(a), or
 - (iii) any MIS supported or substantiated findings.
- (b) The Director may consult with the Executive Director and/or the Office of Licensing, and shall evaluate whether the non-probationary employee may present a risk of harm to a child or vulnerable adult or does not meet DHS high standards of conduct or promote public trust.
- (c) The Executive Director may, in his/her sole discretion, approve the non-probationary employee for continued employment, including defining permissible and impermissible DHS-wide work-related activities, or consult the Department of Human Resource Management regarding termination of employment. The determination of the Executive Director is final.

R495-885-6. DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee.

(1) The Director of the following Department divisions and offices shall appoint one member and one alternate to serve on the

DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee:

- (a) the Executive Director's Office;
- (b) the Division of Aging and Adult Services;
- (c) the Division of Child and Family Services;
- (d) the Division of Juvenile Justice Services;
- (e) the Division of Services for People with Disabilities;
- (f) the Division of Substance Abuse and Mental Health;
- (g) the Office of the Public Guardian; and
- (i) the Office of Licensing.
- (2) DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee members and alternates shall be professional staff persons who are familiar with the programs they represent.
- (3) The appointed Office of Licensing member shall chair the DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee as a non-voting member.
 - (4) [Five] Four voting members shall constitute a quorum.
- (5) The DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee shall conduct a comprehensive review of a prospective or probationary employee or volunteer's background screening application, criminal history records, abuse, neglect or exploitation records, and related circumstances, in accordance with Section 62A-2-120(6).

R495-885-7. DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Process.

- (1) The Office or Division may inform the prospective or probationary employee or volunteer that the results of a background screening indicate they have a criminal history or supported or substantiated findings of abuse or neglect, and the employee or volunteer may:
- (a) voluntarily withdraw a pending employment or volunteer application;
 - (b) voluntarily terminate probationary employment; or
- (c) request further review and submit any written statements or records that the employee or volunteer wants the DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee to consider, including but not limited to non-redacted documents relating to the results, the nature and seriousness of the offense or incident; the circumstances under which the offense or incident occurred; the age of the employee or volunteer when the offense or incident occurred; whether the offense or incident was an isolated or repeated incident; whether the offense or incident directly relates to abuse of a child or vulnerable adult, evidence of rehabilitation, counseling, psychiatric treatment received, or additional academic or vocational schooling completed.
- (i) an employee or volunteer who wants the DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee to consider documents relating to the screening results shall submit the documents to the Office or Division within 15 calendar days of notification by the Office of Division.
- (2) The Office or Division shall gather information from a prospective or probationary employee or volunteer who requests review and submit it to the DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee.
- (a) The Division may redact any personally identifying information of the prospective or probationary employee or volunteer that does not compromise the content of the review.
- (3) The DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee shall evaluate the information provided by the

Office or Division and any information provided by the prospective or probationary employee or volunteer. The DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee shall consider:

- the date of the offense or incident;
- (a) the nature and seriousness of the offense or incident;
- (b) the circumstances under which the offense or incident occurred:
- (c) the age of prospective or probationary employee or volunteer when the offense or incident occurred:
- (d) whether the offense or incident was an isolated or repeated incident;
- (e) whether the offense or incident directly relates to abuse of a child or vulnerable adult,
- (f) whether approval would likely create a risk of harm to a child or a vulnerable adult;
- (g) whether the information may be relevant to the employment or volunteer activities of that person;
- (h) whether the relevant information should be relied upon to deny employment or volunteer activities, and
- (i) that the background screening approval may be transferred to other DHS Offices or Divisions.
- (4) The DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee may approve the background screening of a prospective or probationary employee or volunteer only after a simple majority of the voting members of the DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee determines that approval will not likely create a risk of harm to a child or vulnerable adult or the prospective employee does not meet DHS high standards of conduct or promote public trust, and identify permissible and impermissible DHS-wide work-related activities.
- (5) The DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee shall recommend denial of the background screening of a prospective or probationary employee or volunteer when it finds that approval will likely create a risk of harm to a child or vulnerable adult in any DHS Office or Division or the prospective or probationary employee or volunteer does not meet DHS high standards of conduct or promote public trust.
- (6) Except as described below, a prospective employee or a volunteer whose background screening has been denied shall not be accepted as a volunteer or hired as an employee. A probationary employee whose background screening has been denied shall have no direct access and employment shall be terminated.
- (a) A Director may, in his/her sole discretion, appeal the decision of the DHS Employee and Volunteer Comprehensive Review Committee to the Executive Director.

R495-885-8. Division/Office Responsibilities.

- (1) The Department shall notify the DHS Office of Licensing within five months of the termination of each employee for whom fingerprints have been retained under Section 62A-2-120 to enable the Office of Licensing to notify BCI and ensure the destruction of fingerprints.
- (2) Each Division and Office shall ensure that an employee or volunteer who previously was screened based upon having no direct access shall, prior to having any direct access, be screened and approved in accordance with R495-885.

R495-885-9. Compliance.

The Department will set an implementation schedule to be in

compliance with this rule no later than [December 31, 2017]June 30, 2018.
